e are so proud to introduce this 150-year brief history of the Yarra Yarra Rowing Club. It's a story about a rowing club, but also about our great city of Melbourne and its beautiful river. It's story about national rowing and world history. And it's a story about ordinary people who have done amazing things in pursuit of making the boat go just that little bit faster.

The Club was started by a group of Melbourne drapery store employees who had successfully campaigned to shorten the working week. The new-found Saturday afternoon gave these men access to a new world of recreation and sport. They wasted no time setting up a rowing club (and other sporting clubs!).

Continuously active for 150 years, the Club's fortunes have remained steady in the face of world events: wars, the Depression, women's liberation, and now a global pandemic. But looking at 150 years of Annual Reports, there are three consistent themes:

Commitment to rowing and all it brings: joy, heartbreak, early mornings, hard work, comradeship, competition and personal connection. Our historical archive contains a proud record of many wins; and recognition of all those rowers who competed without getting the win.

Commitment to safety and camaraderie with other clubs. Yarra Yarra members have been part of some of the great rowing developments including safety committees, joint regattas, combined crews, and participation in local, national and international racing.



Look after the boats! For 150 years members have been in collisions, landing mishaps, and handling snafus: back in the 1940s they pointed out that every pound spent on repairs was a pound that could not be spent on new boats. Sounds familiar.... But seriously, the Club has had a constant focus on fielding a fleet of high-quality boats maintained in excellent racing condition.


We believe the Club is well placed for a great future. Once the impact of the pandemic recedes, we have a vibrant entry-level program, strong development and senior pathways, great coaching, a well-managed fleet of high-quality boats, strong governance, great partnerships in the rowing community, and a committed membership. Lets close now, oar we'll be late

uring 1871, the Early Closing Association concluded a successful campaign for Melbourne drapery shops to close early on Saturday. With their new-found leisure time, a group of shop assistants met for a drink at the Bull and Mouth Hotel. At this meeting, they agreed to establish a new rowing club; and 50 members signed up on the day. At the same meeting, a cricket club was also formed.

During the early days, membership was limited to members of the Early Closing Association, but in 1873 membership was opened to men "in all walks of life". The new name "Yarra Yarra Rowing Club" was adopted at the same time.

The newly formed Yarra Yarra Rowing Club bought four new "Gig Fours", which were house by James Edwards, a local boat builder who has premises on the Yarra River at Princes Bridge.

After Edwards, the Club rented space at Greenland and Sons Boathouse, which was destroyed by a fire during 1886. It was reported during this time that Yarra Yarra had ended up with the best fleet amongst all of the Melbourne clubs. The first Yarra Yarra clubhouse was opened on the current location in November 1904. It was designed by architect J.A. Wood, and provided permanent accommodation for the first time.

welve members of Yarra Yarra were killed in action during the First World War: P.C. Arnold, H. Beeson, E.A. Collins, H. Dench, G. Drew, E.A. Evans, A. P. Harbeck, A.J. Holloway, H. McFarlane, B. O'Mullane, J. Skene, and Q. Smith.

They had joined 47 active members of Yarra Yarra in the war in Europe, as well as many members of other rowing clubs. At the time, it was estimated that 80 per cent of active Victorian rowers had enlisted.


Club Member George Stevenson was awarded the Order of St Michael and St George for his distinguished service in the 3rd Australian Artillery Brigade.

fi re destroyed the new Club building and resulted in the death of a Club member, in January 1929. Members and boats were kindly hosted by many of our fellow clubs. Amongst the loss were early club records, while it is known that several early Presidents were distinguished members of the community, and not necessarily rowers, it is not known what brought them to the Club.

The replacement building was officially opened on Saturday 31 August 1929, when the Club held the Connell Combination Eights Regatta. Named after John Connell, a significant financial donor who donated an eight at the time. Other rowing clubs were invited to participate in the event and celebrate the new boathouse. As well as the new clubhouse, the Club had new boats: two eights, three fours, three pairs, and two single sculls.

During 1930, Yarra Yarra affililated with the Victorian Amateur Sculling Association (still going as Winter Sculling!), and C.F.W. Peppler was the first Yarra Yarra member to win the Herald Shield. Yarra Yarra won the Champion Sculls of Victoria for eleven consecutive years from 1929 to 1939.





swept into world war. Of Yarra Yarra's 97 current members, 91 enlisted for World War II, and two members were killed.


During the 1940s, several members felt the Club should be dissolved for lack of members. The club was turned around when Des Coe wrote a pamphlet to dispel the myth that rowing was bad for your health and circulated it among Melbourne businesses. The pamphlet campaign attracted 17 new recruits for the first advertised rowing training session, and many became racing and club stalwarts.

Yarra Yarra won its first Victorian Rowing title during the 1952/52 season, the Junior Fours championship. With only 18 active members at the time, this was an impressive turning point for the Club.

By 1958, Yarra Yarra was competing for the Junior Lightweight Championship.

At the close of the 1957/58 season, the club needed one more win to take the Championship so sent crews to the Easter regattas in Sale, Bairnsdale and Wentworth. The Sale and Bairnsdale crews missed out on their wins, so the pressure was on for the crew in Wentworth. A convincing win by this crew brought the Championship to the club.

llan Rice and Jim Skidmore narrowly missed selection to the Australian Rowing Crew for the 1964 Tokyo Olympics. They drove to the trials at the National Championships in Canberra with their double scull "Bottles" tied to the roof of a car, only to miss out on selection by 0.3 seconds. "Bottles" has had a decorative second life in the new club house – just look up!

Carey Grammar first launched from Yarra Yarra's shed at Boathouse Drive during 1967. Work was started on a Carey Annexe during the early 1970s, and a Carey crew won the Public Schools Head of the River for the first time in 1984.

In retrospect, it seems as if the Club went through a low point during the 1970s. As one Club Captain pointed out at the time – lack of training causes a vicious cycle where crews that were not coached lost their commitment,

then when a coach was found the crews were found wanting. According to Annual Reports, numbers and commitment started to grow by the end of the decade, placing the Club in a good position to bloom during the 1980s and 1990s.

During this time, the club house was "lifted" and renovated, as the shed had developed a lean, and the rear of the shed had sunk by 500cm. Club members formed working groups to install new concrete floors within the existing wooden building, to relocate the bar to the first floor, and to develop new shower and toilet facilities.

The Yarra Yarra Regatta was made an annual event from 1979. The club conducted regattas until 2008, and several members provided long-term support – Ron Mitchell as Regatta Convenor for nearly 20 years; Leigh Gallagher as Assistant Regatta Secretary for more than 20 years; Gloria Gallagher running refreshments, trophies and presentations for more than 10 years; Trevor Lange and Peter Gill as Regatta Secretary for 20 years between them.

uring 1981 the club accepted its first women rowing members. Not to downplay the years of contributions made by women as coxswains and volunteers! The first women's competition crews were recorded during 1983, and their first recorded win was at the 1985 Winter Regatta, where Maureen Logan, Rowena Thompson and Janet Midgely (cox) won the novice coxed pair. By 1987, women were making regular appearances on the Club's annual winners' lists.

Several current Club members including Linda Skidmore, Janet Cussen, Colin Rawson, Fiona Dickson-Speed, Ion Popa, and Susie Bartlett were representing Victoria and Australia during the 1980s. Women rowers made an ever-stronger contribution to Yarra Yarra's competitive spirit: Yarra Yarra won the 1990/91 Women's Club Premiership; the 1991/92 Women's Senior Premiership; and in 1992/93 both the Women's Senior and the Women's Junior Premierships.

Georgina Douglas rowed in the Australian Women's Eight in the Atlanta Olympics in 1996, and also raced a scull at the Sydney Olympics in 2000. Rachel Kininmonth, after representing Australia for three consecutive years, rowed in the Australian Women's Eight in Sydney 2000.

ur lovely new clubhouse was opened during 2005, providing more accommodation for Yarra Yarra and for Carey Grammar Rowing. During construction the boats were stored across Melbourne, with a small fleet kept outdoors next to Banks Rowing Club so that members could continue to train. Club Patron Jim Skidmore operated a remote bar for members training out of Banks Rowing Club during this time, relying on an esky, bags of ice and a small cash drawer.

Brett Hayman started as a cox at YYRC, and would go on to cox the Australian Men's Eight at the Sydney Olympics in 2000 and other Australian crews in International races...

During 2015, for the first time Yarra Yarra employed a professional coach, Olympian Ion Popa. Ion's efforts, in conjunction with several other key members led the club to a very competitive position during the later part of the decade, with a significant number of wins including three golds at the 2018 Head of the Yarra: Male D Grade Eight, Male C Grade Eight and Male Masters D Eight.

Yarra Yarra remained committed to all rowing: the Learn to Row and Development programs continued to build, members

provided strong support to the annual Winter Sculling program, and members competed in Victorian and Interstate short course and long distance regattas. Yarra Yarra proudly held the Victorian Masters Championship from 2008 to 2012.

The first two years of the new decade have held bad news for the rowing community. Like the rest of Melbourne's rowing clubs, during pandemic lockdowns Yarra Yarra has been closed more than it has been open. Members have maintained strong connections with each other and with rowing, and many of our activities have moved online; even though an ergo race just isn't as exciting as on water.

One of the few bright spots on the international calendar in 2021 has been the Tokyo Olympics and Paralympics. Yarra Yarra is very proud of our previous member Carol Cooke, who won a cycling silver medal in the Women's T1-2 time trial. Carol learned to row with Yarra Yarra and was an elite pararower during the early 2010s, before taking up cycling. Yarra Yarra also celebrated with Ion Popa as his daughter Rosie won a gold in the Australian Women's Coxless Four.
