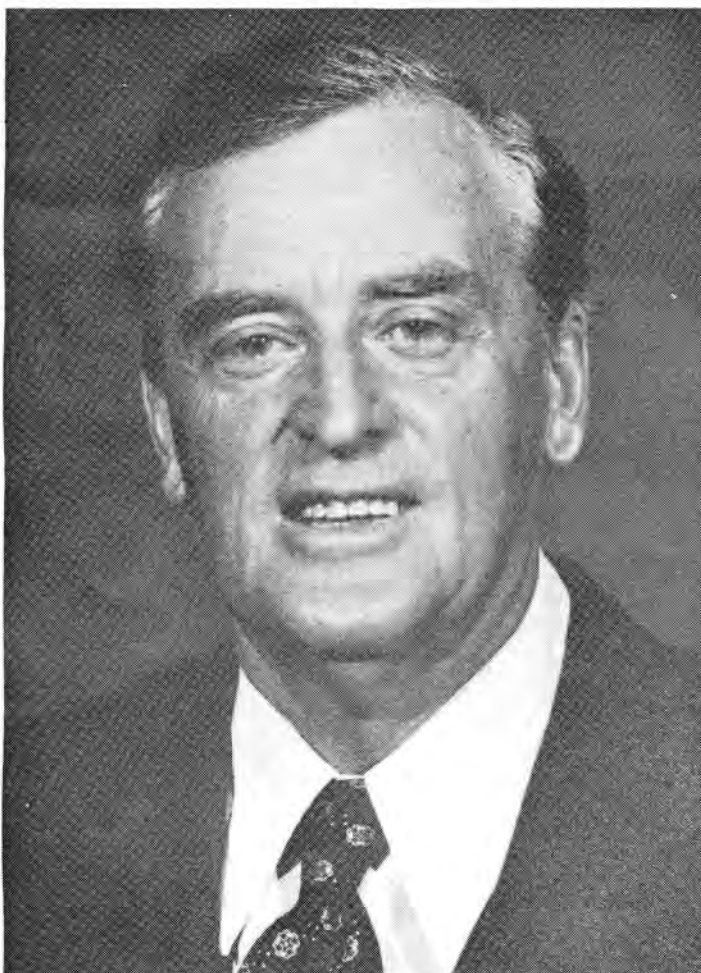

The Council is grateful to those organisations which have sponsored the Regatta. In particular, we include STAMINADE, Tweed Heads Bowls Club, Tweed Heads Rowing and Aquatic Club, Tweed Heads Golf Club and Pyrox. The support of sponsors has made it possible for the Council to provide the facilities and equipment to ensure the success of the event.

There has been much effort made by the Organising Committee and by individuals, while it is not the plan to name individuals I extend to all those concerned the thanks of the Council and of the Rowing community at large. I also welcome and thank the large number of A.A.R.C. Rowing Officials who have indicated their willingness to help conduct the actual racing.

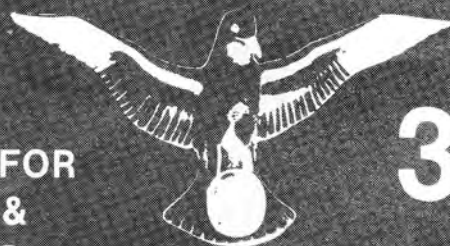
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History of Interstate Rowing in Australia

Interstate rowing in Australia was originally rowed in four-oared gigs, the first recorded race taking place in 1863 on the Parramatta River.

The first interstate rowing in racing shells as we now know them was an eight-oared race rowed in Melbourne in 1878 between Victoria and New South Wales. Over succeeding years, the other States joined the original participants until all were competing regularly. The Interstate Single Sculling Championship was first introduced in 1892 and since 1895 has been a regular event along with the Eight-oared Championship. These races continued until 1914 after which they were suspended because of the First World War.

The first ladies' interstate competition commenced in 1901 in a sculling event held in Melbourne between a Victorian and a New South Wales sculler.

These beginnings illustrate the strength of the two populous early settled States and their keen rivalry which has been continued throughout the years without any slackening in its intensity.

At the resumption of Interstate competition in 1920 both the men's and women's titles were held in Brisbane and for the first time the men's Interstate eights title was rowed for the Kings Cup, a trophy won

by the Australian A.I.F. crew at the Peace Regatta at Henley-on-Thames in 1919. The race as "The Kings Cup" is perhaps better known than the official title "The Interstate Eight-Oared Championships".

The field of interstate events was added to in the years following these original races and the events now contested are:

The Interstate Champion Ladies' Lightweight Four with Cox for the Victoria Cup.

The Interstate Champion Ladies' Elite Single Scull for the Nell Slatter Trophy.

The Interstate Champion Ladies' Elite Four with Cox for the U.L.V.A. Trophy.

The Interstate Champion Single Scull for the President's Cup.

The Interstate Champion Lightweight Four without Cox for the Penrith Cup.

The Interstate Champion Youth Eight for the Noel F. Wilkinson Trophy.

The Interstate Eight-Oared Championship for the Kings Cup.

Message from the National Coaching Director

It is my pleasure to welcome all competitors to the 1981 Kings Cup and National Regatta and I wish them fair competition and an enjoyable Regatta.

As is usual, in the season following an Olympic Games, a great many heavy-weight rowers have retired. What pleases me is that of those from the 1980 Olympic Team who have retired, many have retained their interest in rowing and are actively involved as coaches, selectors and administrators.

The Men's and Women's light-weight ranks, on the other hand, have received a tremendous boost from the international successes achieved by our crews last year and the competition amongst light-weights has been of an extremely high standard at the selection Regattas held to date and augurs well for our international endeavours later in the year.

Reverting back to the Olympic class boats, it has been evident from the selection Regattas and my visits to States that there is a strong nucleus of rowers in the age category of 19 -22 years and I believe that it is upon these rowers that we must concentrate our efforts in building a foundation for success at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games.

In December of last year, I made a number of recommendations to Council arising from my first 18 months in Australia. It pleases me that of these recommendations, Council proposes adopting the FISA status rules commencing at the 1982 National Championships; Council will be reverting to three compulsory selection Regattas in 1982 with a view to providing more intense and frequent Interstate competition; Council has formed a National Rowing

Coaching Council comprising a representative from each State; Council is continuing to promote the FISA Junior age category by determining to send a team, subject to satisfactory standards, to this year's World Junior Championships and by adding sculling races in this age category to the 1982 National Championship programme.

What is still to be achieved is for Council and State Associations to work more closely with the schools in promoting the enjoyment and recreational aspects of rowing and sculling in the hope that more children will remain in the sport after leaving school. There must also be a concerted national effort to attract sponsors to fund the National Coaching Education Scheme, international representation and all of the other national activities, without levying States and thus imposing further burdens on the Clubs. This could be achieved by adopting a more professional attitude to the administration of the sport and, in particular, by the employment of a National Executive Director. I hope that such an appointment will be made within the next year.

Finally, let me say that with all of the changes taking place to the format of the National Regatta, I hope that Council continues to recognize the traditional importance to Australian rowing of the Kings Cup and other Interstate events and retains them in their present form notwithstanding that for selection purposes more reliance is now being placed on small boat performances than appears to have been the case previously.

The Australian National Regatta

Competition for Interstate scullers and crews has been the backbone of rowing as a sport in Australia with the incentive of representing one's State the driving force keeping competitors at their peak.

However, this very incentive also restricted the field as only one crew from each State in each event was able to represent. A movement for a wider based competition in which every club crew or sculler had the chance of winning an Australian National Regatta was held at Ballarat in 1962. This Regatta was held independent of the Interstate Championships so that all competitors were available.

National Regattas were then held in Canberra — 1964; Murray Bridge — 1968; Penrith — 1970 and Lake Kurwongbah — 1972. In 1974 the Australian Amateur Rowing Council decided that commencing that year the Australian National Regatta would be held annually in conjunction with the Interstate Championships and this has now resulted in the magnificent spectacle of two days of finals in which the cream of competitors in Australia in both ladies' and men's events strive for supremacy.

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NOTICE TO COMPETITORS

COMPETITORS MUST BE IN THE STARTING BAY FIVE MINUTES BEFORE THE TIME APPOINTED FOR STARTING THEIR EVENT

Signal to Start — The Starter shall order “ARE YOU READY” and after a marked pause, he shall order the start — saying “Go” and simultaneously lowering his red flag.

The signal recalling competitors by the Starter or Umpire shall be by ringing a bell and waving a red flag.

Any crew responsible for two false starts shall be excluded from the race.

In the event of any breakdown of any oar or boat within the first 100 metres from the start, the race shall be stopped and restarted from the original point.

Any crew or sculler leaving its or his true course during the race, and thereby impeding by its or his wash any other competing crew or sculler, shall be liable to disqualification. A boat's true course is the shortest way to the winning post, leaving room for all opposing boats to come up level in the position in which they started.

Should the Umpire find it necessary to warn a competitor about to prejudice another competitor, he shall call the competitor by name and direct the competitor with his white flag.

The signal by an Umpire to stop a race shall be by ringing a bell and waving a red flag.

Finish — the signal to finish shall be by sound signal given by the Judge.

COXSWAINS AND LIGHTWEIGHTS

COXWAINS: Coxwains shall weigh in at the Regatta Office Van between 2.00-4.00 pm, Tuesday 7th April, 1981, or within a period of 24 hours prior to the race or heats of that race in which they are competing.

LIGHTWEIGHT OARSMEN & OARSWOMEN: Lightweight Oarsmen & Oarswomen shall weigh in at the Regatta Office Van not less than one hour and not more than 2 hours before their first race on each day of racing.

AUSTRALIAN ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS

STATUS DEFINITIONS:

Women:

Elite: An elite oarswoman or sculler is one who has won an Australian, International or World Championship. Elite competition is open to all amateur oarswomen.

Senior: A Senior oarswoman or sculler is one who has not won an Australian, International or World Championship.

Lightweight: A lightweight crew or sculler (excluding coxwain), shall have an average weight not exceeding 57kg. A maximum of 50% of the members of the crew may exceed 57kg but they shall not exceed 59kg.

Girls: An oarswoman or sculler may compete in girls competition until 31st December of the year she reaches 18 years of age. She may compete in this classification even though she may have won rowing or sculling races in any other classification.

Men:

Schoolboy: A Schoolboy oarsman is one who is attending a secondary school as a fulltime student and representing his school.

Youth: An oarsman may row in Youth events up to 30th June following his 19th birthday.

Lightweight: The average weight of a Lightweight crew (excluding Coxwain), shall not exceed 70kg. No individual oarsman shall weigh more than 72.5 kg. A single sculler shall not weigh more than 72.5 kg.

Junior: A Junior oarsman is one who in that class of boat in which he is entered has not won a Senior (first grade) event conducted by a State Association or an Australian Open Championship or the equivalent of a Senior (first Grade) event conducted by an organisation affiliated with FISA.

Open: Australian Championships other than those designated above are open to all oarsmen of any category.

Coxwains:

The minimum weight for a coxwain for women's open events is 45kg.

The minimum weight for a coxwain for women's Lightweight events is 40kg.

The minimum weight for a coxwain for men's events is 50kg.

Men's FISA Juniors, Junior Girls, and Youth must comply with age definitions above.

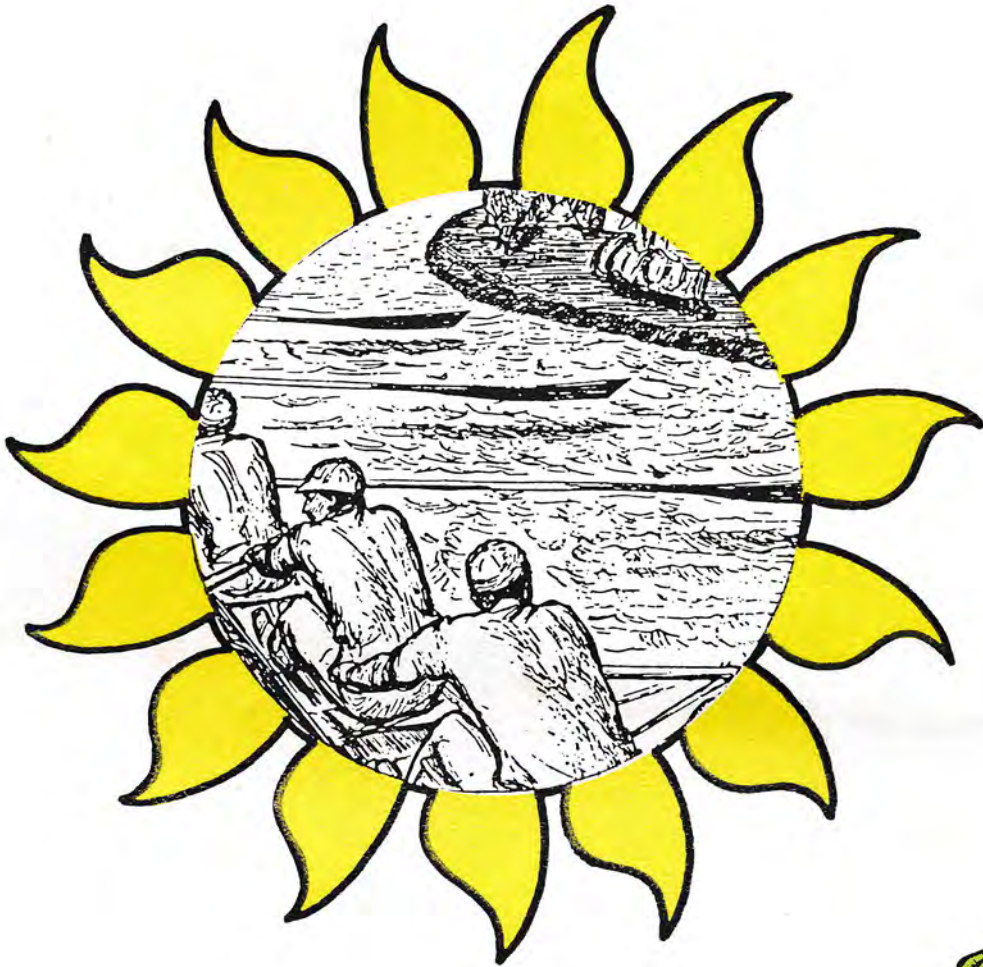
