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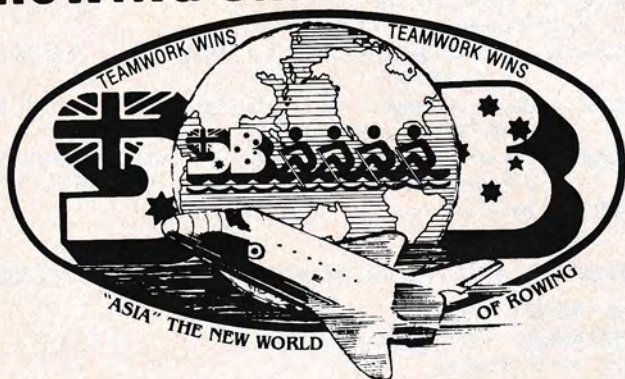

This year we inaugurate the Schools Classic events in eights and fours. Entries have been received from King's School, Sydney and Hale School, Perth, Australia.

Because we still await completion of our permanent rowing centre entries will be restricted for this year only. Many more entries should be possible in 1985.

It is intended that the standard of rowing should be high and the distance of 2,000 metres has been set to reflect this.

These events have been included following the successful visits to our Championships of Hale School, Perth (1982), Carey Grammar School, Melbourne (1983) and Oakland Strokes, California (1983).

We consider that, they will provide an attractive venue for truly international schools competition which is currently non-existent in world rowing.

Entries from Pacific rim countries will be particularly welcomed.

The result, I am sure you will all agree, is a fitting tribute to all their efforts.

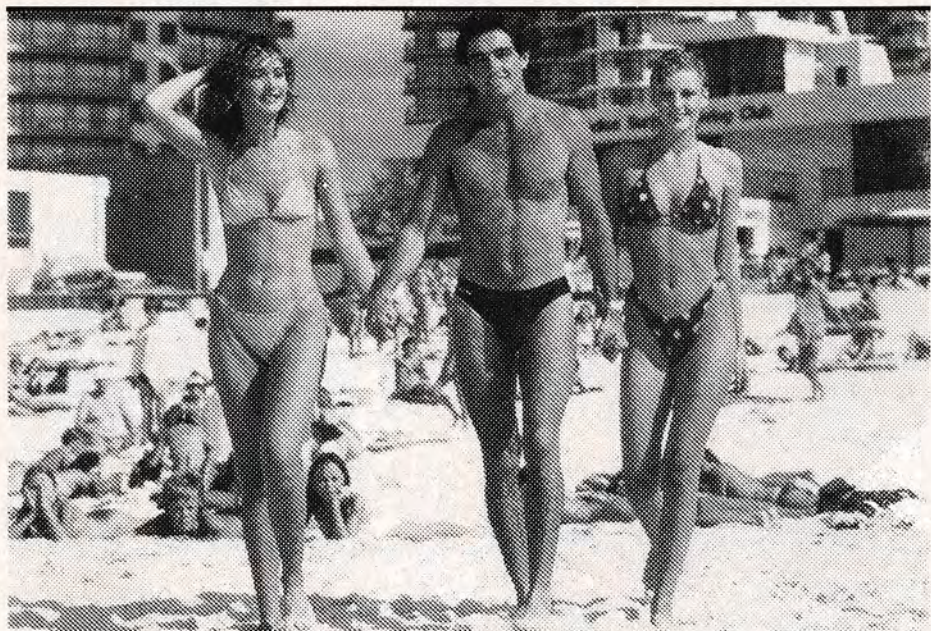
I wish all rowers good luck, especially those fortunate enough to be selected in the Olympic trials.

Just over 110 years ago, a Victorian four-oared composite crew selected from 3 clubs combined to win what is regarded as Australia's first interstate contest.

Raced over a 4 mile course on the Lower Yarra, Victoria won the event, beating crews from Sydney and Hobart Town.

Those who watched from vantage points from bridges, horse back, factory windows and the upper decks of steamers could not have appreciated that an historical day in Australian rowing had been witnessed.

It is quite probable therefore that when South Australia, New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania and Queensland meet at 2.30 p.m. on Sunday the 1st of April for the premier King's Cup competition for interstate eights, the competitors, officials and spectators may not recognise another important day in the long history of Australian rowing. It will mark the 106th King's Cup contest but the first on the superb rowing course at Lake Barrington.

Lake Barrington, our newly created international rowing course of ideal location and distinctive development is destined to serve Australian rowing for decades to come.

The acquisition of the facility by dedicated Tasmanian rowing officials is a true reflection of the finer principles of our sport — setting an objective, adopting a disciplined approach, teaming together, matching plans with performance, enduring when challenged and resting only on success. These principles will again be manifest before you in five days of competition from March, 28–April, 1.

Rowing personnel from all States, the Territories, New Zealand, China and Switzerland have travelled to compete and officiate together at Lake Barrington and we hope you enjoy not only the rivalry of racing but the fellowship of many friends beyond the waters edge.

The organisation of the championship regatta has been borne by a sub-committee structure of 10 groups comprising 85 persons. Throughout the regatta, over 110 persons have volunteered their assistance to ensure the conduct of a successful and memorable rowing carnival.

As a young President of Australia's oldest 'rowing' State in this historic year, I am delighted to be called upon to extend a wish of good luck and good will to you all.

May the fair waters of Lake Barrington provide you with an indelibly etched memory of one of the best ever King's Cup and National Rowing Regattas.

Lake Barrington International —

At the conclusion of the 1978 King's Cup and National rowing regatta at Franklin in Tasmania, it was apparent that the future development of rowing in this State would be constrained unless a 2000 metre course was established on non-tidal waters. The non-availability of suitable funds restricted a serious consideration of alternative venues, although administrators viewed sites at Hadspen, Oatlands, Barrington and New Norfolk.

The 22 km waterway at Lake Barrington was created by the construction of the "Devil's Gate" dam as part of the Mersey-Forth Hydro Scheme. For a decade or more, the lake has been regarded as the best locality for a top class rowing course.

The Tasmanian crew, which won the inaugural youth eights championship of Australia in 1974, trained regularly on the lake.

In 1980, the then Minister for Home Affairs, Mr Ellicott, announced that the Federal Government would support the creation in Tasmania of an international rowing course as part of government policy to create a sporting facility in each State in compliance with the requirements of the relevant international sporting federation.

The State Labor Government Minister, Mr D. Baldock, promptly commissioned a feasibility study which resolved, with the unanimous approval of the Tasmanian Rowing Council, to pursue the development at Lake Barrington. However, other sports such as cycling, canoeing and baseball argued for the available funds to be committed to their own development projects.

The ensuing debate, both political and public, caused a loss of heart in some rowing administrators as the duration to March 1984 shortened quickly.

On the 28th May, 1981, a special regional committee of 9 members, the Lake Barrington Development of Rowing Committee, was established. The committee comprised Mr David Schier (Chairman), Mesdames M. Spurling, O.A.M. and L. Higgs and Messrs T. Gott, I. Dickinson, G. Pryor, C. Alcock, L. Coates and K. Jacobs.

With the media debate as to the suitability of competing proposals raging, rowing officials elected to retire from the public arena. All energies were directed at convincing local, State and Federal parliamentarians of the worthiness of the Lake Barrington proposal. The tactic would later be regarded as the salvation of the rowing proposal.

An early State election, which saw a change in government, caused further delay. Time was of the essence. The 1984 King's Cup and National Regatta was clearly on the horizon.

Members of the L.B.D.R.C. worked arduously and unselfishly in consultations with surveyors, architects, engineers, draftsmen, designers, road contractors, builders and landscapers. Other members lobbied with submissions in writing, meetings in public and in person and much telephoning.

On the 20th August, 1982, the Chairman of the L.B.D.R.C., Mr David Schier, wrote a circular to all clubs, associations and schools in this State. He noted "... by applying a professional and disciplined approach, rowing has compiled and presented its case ... **WE ARE CONFIDENT THE GOVERNMENT WILL SUPPORT US ...** When the government gives rowing the green light, the history of rowing in our State will be propelled to great heights and onto the international rowing scene. By 1984 Australia will acquire a truly unique and invaluable facility."

A Brief History

The confidence of the Chairman was not without foundation.

On October the 18th, 1982, Premier Robin Gray announced that the State would commit funds (\$1.75m) jointly with the Federal Government to build a rowing and sprint canoeing course at Lake Barrington in accordance with international specifications.

At this juncture, relevant departments of the Tasmanian Public Service threw their entire weight behind the project.

A long time advocate of the facility, the Director General of Lands, Mr Doug Doyle and his Department, came solidly behind the development. The innovative ideas which emanated from Peter Partridge and his Department of Construction No. 2. Project Team were outstanding and an inspiration to all.

The author of the original feasibility study, Lands Officer, Mr Satwant Calais and Surveyor Mr Ian Dickinson, initially did not know the difference between the sweep and the scull oar, but their service was not only beyond the call of duty but of such quality to be a motivating factor for all.

The roller coaster of development of roads, foreshore, buildings, pontoons, buoyed course, towers and car parks gathered impetus and began its slow, but deliberate movement forward.

The road contractors disturbed only essential bushland as 80 hour weeks passed and the path to lakeside was carved beautifully under the guidance of Supervisor, Mr Trevor Holten.

Just five months ago, Works Officer, Mr Jack Cox, watched the foundations being laid for the judges tower, facilities building, caretaker's cottage and boat shed.

Meanwhile, Mr Darrell Britton and his team laid 27 km of wire and 2,200 buoys on the course proper. Starting pontoons, each of 113 metres in length, were located at the 1000 and 2000 metre positions.

The lawns and spectator areas were sown to grass and tended daily by the Warden, Mr Rod Baker, whilst the long time helpers on the Kentish Council improved access roads and expanded parking areas.

The first trial regatta was rowed in ideal conditions on February 4th, 1984. The champagne flowed freely.

On March 3rd, an ardent advocate of Lake Barrington in government, Minister Ian Braid, M.H.A., officially opened the facility. The next day, the final day of the State rowing championships was recorded for the first time on computer and data processing equipment. At the same time, Australian Rowing Council officials were complimenting Tasmanian administrators for organising and promoting one of the great King's Cup, Olympic selection and national rowing regattas.

A major chapter came to a very joyful end and a new era in the long history of Tasmanian rowing had begun.

Arrows define the route to be followed by all boats at all times. Boats may cross the course 'with due caution' either at the 500 metre mark (near the launching area), or adjacent to the Start. Crews may only row from north to south (Start to Finish) on the buoyed course, and they may not stop at any point whilst on the course proper.

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Notice to Competitors

BRIEFING of COMPETITORS

The meeting of coaches, rowers, coxswains, scullers, umpires and starters shall take place at 4.45pm on Tuesday, 27th March, 1984, in the main Facilities Building adjacent to the 'Finish' at the Lake Barrington course.

BOW-BALLS and BOAT NUMBERS

All boats must be fitted with appropriate bow-balls as defined in regulation 5.04(b), and they must carry on the bow an appropriate lane number disc which may be collected from adjacent to the boat-house/launching area, and must be returned immediately after each race.

LANE NUMBERING

Lane No. 1 is on the side nearest the Judges at the Finish; that is the spectators bank.

SUBSTITUTES and SCRATCHINGS

Notice of any substitute in accordance with regulation 5.10(i), and notice of any scratching are to be advised in writing on the appropriate form at either the Regatta Secretary's office in the main Facilities Building or with officials at the boat-house/launching area.

WEIGHING COXSWAINS and LIGHTWEIGHTS

Coxswains and lightweights shall be weighed in accordance with recently revised regulations 5.10(g), 5.10(h) and 5.10(m), at the weighing station under the verandah of the boat-house.

An additional set of scales shall be provided (solely for weighing winning 'Finals' coxswains) at the Judges Tower, near the Victory Dais. A schedule of weigh-in times is included elsewhere in this program, near the schedule of events.

UNIFORMS and ADVERTISING

Each member of a club, school or composite crew shall wear the registered racing colours of such member's club when racing, and competitor's attention is drawn to the requirements of regulation 5.21 re Advertising.

RACE DRAWS

All National Championship events, except those for Schools, shall be conducted using the full F.I.S.A. 6-lane Repechage System.

Heats and repechages for Schools events on Saturday, 31st March, shall be conducted using the Alternative (Amsterdam) System.

'Challenge' races are held on Thursday, 29th March (Heats) and Friday, 30th March (Finals), but neither repechages or semi-finals will be held for 'Challenge' races.

Interstate events on Sunday, 1st April are all straight-out races.

START TIMES

Competitors must be in their starting positions at least **TWO MINUTES** before the time laid down for the start of their event.

LATE ARRIVALS AT THE START

The Starter may warn or exclude from the race any crew arriving at its starting position less than two minutes before the starting time. A warning has the same effect as one given for a false start.

STARTING PROCEDURE

As soon as the aligner indicates that the boats are properly aligned, the Starter raises a red flag — the Starter shall give the warning command "ARE YOU READY" and, after a clearly marked pause, the starting command "GO" at the same time lowering the red flag to one side.

FALSE START

If a crew starts too soon, the Starter stops the race by ringing a bell and then waving a red flag. In the case of a false start the Starter warns the crew or crews at fault. A crew causing two false starts shall be excluded from the race.

EQUIPMENT DAMAGE

If a crew while still on the first 100 metres of the race indicates that it has suffered damage to its boat or equipment, the Starter or Umpire stops the race. The signal by an Umpire to stop the race shall be by ringing a bell and waving a red flag.

UMPIRE'S DIRECTIONS

The Umpire may not steer a crew unless there is an obstacle in its lane. If a crew is about to impede another by its wash or by leaving its lane, the Umpire raises a white flag and calls to the crew at fault, indicating the required change of direction by lowering the flag to one side. If a crew is about to cause a collision, the Umpire may call its attention by raising the white flag and stop it by giving the command "STOP". Crews interfering with their opponents may be excluded from the race.

THE FINISH

The Judges shall indicate the crossing of the line by the winning crew, and by each other crew in the race by sounding a hooter.

WINNING CREWS

All winning crews and scullers are to proceed direct to the Victory Dais for the presentation of medallions and trophies immediately after the race concludes.

Other competitors are required to wait for the winner to lead the way to the Dais, after which they should proceed in an orderly line (preferably in order of finishing, 2nd to 6th) back to the launching pontoons.

Power Boat Usage

The course shall be **CLOSED** to all power boats, except official craft from a point 250 metres north of the START to a point 250 metres south of the FINISH; from one hour prior to the scheduled starting time of the first race each day, until half-an-hour after the conclusion of the final race for the day.

At other than the above times, coaches may launch and retrieve motor-boats PROVIDED they do not follow crews in the vicinity of the course proper. There are no restrictions beyond the START and FINISH extremities where there are approximately 8kms of water in either direction .

Caution: There are few landing places elsewhere on the lake for either crews or power boats, and the northern reaches toward the Devil's Gate Dam occasionally become fairly rough.



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Status of Competitors

1. Rowers are divided into the following classes:—

2. **A SCHOOL COMPETITOR** is one who is attending a secondary school as a full time day student and representing his/her school. This definition also applies to the coxswain of the school crew;

3. A competitor ceases to be a **JUNIOR** on December 31 of the year in which he/she reaches the age of eighteen. This definition also applies to the coxswain of a Junior Crew;

4. A rower ceases to be a **SENIOR B** on December 31 of the year in which he/she reaches the age of twenty two. After that date he/she shall be classified as a Senior A;

5. **LIGHTWEIGHT** races are restricted to male rowers weighing 72½ kilograms or less and female rowers weighing 59 kilograms or less in the case of single sculling races and in all other classes of boat to male rowers weighing 72½ kilograms or less and female rowers weighing 59 kilograms or less provided that the average weight of all members of the crew in which such rower races (excluding the coxswain) does not exceed 70 kilograms in the case of male rowers and 57 kilograms in the case of female rowers;

6. All rowers shall be eligible to compete in **SENIOR A** category or in Australian Championships (in the appropriate weight division) and a Junior rower may compete in Senior B category (in the appropriate weight division);

7. **COXSWAINS** shall be deemed to be members of the crew. A women's crew may not therefore be steered by a man nor may a men's crew be steered by a woman. There shall be no age limit for coxswains in races for senior crews.

The minimum weight for a coxswain (in bathing trunks or swim-suit) is 50kg. for men and 45kg. for women, schoolboys and schoolgirls, provided that the minimum weight for the coxswain (in swimsuit) of a crew entered in a lightweight women's event is 40kg. To make up this weight a coxswain may carry dead-weight. No article of racing equipment shall be considered as part of this dead-weight. This dead-weight shall be placed in the boat as close as possible to the coxswain.

8. **COXSWAINS** shall be weighed in bathing trunks or swimsuit by a person duly authorised by the Organising Committee conducting the Regatta not more than two hours and not less than one hour before their first race in any regatta. Immediately after the race the coxswain of the winning crew together with the deadweight carried (if any) shall again be weighed by a person duly authorised by the Organising Committee conducting the regatta;

9. **ALL CREWS** have the right to replace up to fifty per cent (50%) of their rowers and the coxswain as well provided that a written declaration of the names and status of any such replacements be presented at least one hour before the race to the Organising Committee who must mention the substitution in their official report. No substitute is permitted for a single sculler, except that a single sculler entered for the interstate championship who falls ill or is injured in an accident may, on production of a medical certificate, be replaced before his/her preliminary heat.

10. **NO COMPETITOR** may race for two different clubs at the same regatta but a competitor may represent his/her State and his/her Club and his/her School at a regatta;

11. Notwithstanding the provisions of Art.5.10(i) a **COXSWAIN** may steer for any number of Clubs at a Regatta;

12. **NO CHANGE** may be made in a crew which has already raced in a heat of its event except in the case of serious illness or accident in which case a medical certificate shall be tendered to the Referee and the Jury shall determine whether such a change shall be permitted;

13. **LIGHTWEIGHT** competitors shall be weighed in bathing trunks or swimsuit by a person duly appointed by the Organising Committee conducting the Regatta not more than two hours and not less than one hour before their first race on each day of racing;

14. An oarsman may row in **YOUTH** events up to June 30 following his 19th birthday. This definition also applies to the coxswain of a Youth crew.

15. Any oarsman who has not entered either National Championship events or Interstate events at this 1984 regatta shall be eligible to contest **CHALLENGE** races at this regatta.

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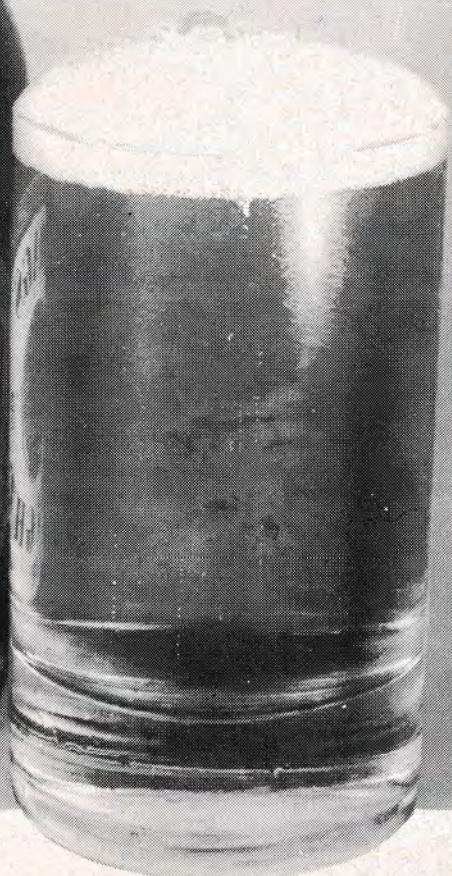
Rating Strokes

Have you ever tried to figure out an easy way to determine the rate of stroke being rowed by a crew if you do not possess a stroke rating stop watch?

Using a simple wrist watch and counting eight strokes, here's how to find the number of strokes per minutes.

If eight strokes take 17 seconds, the crew is rowing 28
If eight strokes take 16.4 seconds, the crew is rowing 29
If eight strokes take 16 seconds, the crew is rowing 30
If eight strokes take 15.4 seconds, the crew is rowing 31

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History of Men's Interstate Rowing Championships of Australia

Interstate rowing in Australia was originally rowed in four-oared gigs, the first recorded race taking place in 1863 over a course of three miles on the Parramatta River in New South Wales. The competing States were New South Wales and Victoria, the event being won by the first-named in a time of 19 minutes 25 seconds. Thereafter a number of contests took place in this class of boat between crews from New South Wales, Victoria and Tasmania, often more than one club crew from each State taking part in the contests.

The first Interstate eight-oared race was rowed in Melbourne over a four mile course in 1878 and was won by Victoria from New South Wales. For the following six years, the race between these two States continued annually, and in 1885 Tasmania and Queensland joined the competition. That year the race was rowed in Sydney and won by New South Wales.

These annual contests continued, mainly between Victoria and New South Wales. Queensland re-entered the competition in 1890 and had its first success in 1891.

1897 saw the first appearance of Western Australia in Melbourne, followed by South Australia for the first time in 1899.

Tasmania recorded its first victory in 1906 in Perth, winning from Victoria, New South Wales, Western Australia and South Australia.

The famous Murray Bridge crew representing South Australia, gave that State its first victory in 1913 in Adelaide, winning in boisterous conditions from Tasmania and Western Australia, the remaining three crews, Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland sinking during the race. Due to the advent of the First World War, Interstate eight-oared rowing which had been conducted annually from 1878 to 1914 was suspended and not resumed until 1920.

On the resumption in 1920, the King's Cup won by the Australian A.I.F. crew at the Peace Regatta at Henly-on-Thames in 1919 became the perpetual trophy for the Australian Eight-oared Championships, and was won by South Australia in Brisbane. The following year, Western Australia won the race for the first time on the Tamar River, Launceston.

On 1st May, 1925 the Australian Amateur Rowing Council was formed to take over the responsibility for the Interstate Rowing Championships, provide a central control for rowing in Australia, and attend to all matters relative to Australian International competition. The three mile distance for the race established in the first years of the Interstate Rowing Championship was retained, and the order of rotation of the States to conduct the event established.

The Australian Eight-oared Championship continued to be held annually from 1920 to 1939, when war again intervened, causing its suspension until 1946. In that year the race was rowed in Penrith and was won by Victoria from New South Wales, Western Australia and Tasmania.

The Interstate Single Sculling Championship of Australia was first introduced in 1892, and since 1895 has been a regular event along with the Eight-oared Championship.

Following the Second World War and the annual resumption of Interstate competition in 1946, Australia became more conscious of the need for representation at the International level, and the inclusion of test races for representative competition in other classes of boat as well as the Eight-oared and Single Sculling events became a regular feature at the Interstate Championships.

In 1958 test races to select crews and scullers to represent Australia at the British Empire Games at Cardiff, Wales were conducted, and in the same year an Interstate Championship for Lightweight Four-oared crews was included in the King's Cup programme for the first time. The race was won by Victoria and has continued as an annual event since, thereby providing first class competition for Lightweight oarsmen.

Due to the increasing emphasis being placed on International competition in which all major rowing events are conducted over a course of 2000 metres, the Australian Amateur Rowing Council legislated for a change in the course distance from 3 miles to 2000 metres for the Australian Championships of 1961 and thereafter, and adopted the special report prepared by Kevyn Webb for the introduction of a National Regatta to be held in 1962.

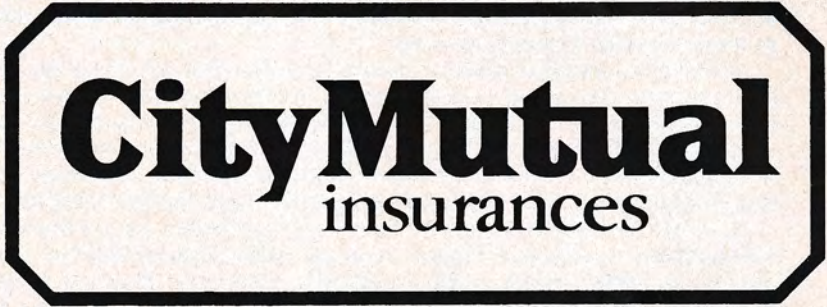
In 1962 the Council made provision for the National Regatta to be conducted bi-annually over 2000 metres to provide Australian Championships for small boat rowing. The selection of Australian representative crews and scullers for International competition was thereby facilitated, and the necessity for test races substantially eliminated. On this first occasion Australian Championship events for four with cox, four without cox, pair with cox, pair without cox, double scull, lightweight eight, lightweight pair with cox and lightweight single scull. The Regatta has been developed to include races for other classes of oarsmen along with Schoolboy representatives and since 1974 has been held annually in conjunction with the Interstate Championships, and now comprises a full programme for both men's and women's rowing and sculling races in all classifications under the control of the respective National Councils.

The advent of the Interstate Youth Eight-oared Championship in 1974 for State representation and the subsequent inclusion of Australian Championship Youth races for other classes of boats in the National Regatta programme has proved to be successful and provided yet another series of keenly contested races.

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History of the King's Cup

The King's Cup, the perpetual trophy for the Australian Eight-oared Championship, was presented by His Majesty King George V, for the Eight-oared race between crews from the armies of the Allies in the 1914-18 war, which took the place of the Grand Challenge Cup Race at the Henley-on Thames Regatta, 2nd to 4th July, 1919.

The race was won by the A.I.F. No. 1 crew comprising Sgt. A.A. Robb, Derwent Rowing Club (Tas.), 11st 10lbs, bow; Lieut. F.A. House, Derwent Rowing Club (Tas.), 11st 12lbs, 2; Lieut. T. McGill, Leichhardt Rowing Club (N.S.W.), 12st 10lbs, 3; Gunner A.V. Scott, Murray Bridge Rowing Club (S.A.), 13st, 4; Lieut. H. Hauenstein, M.M., Leichhardt and Balmain Rowing Clubs (N.S.W.), 13st 9lbs, 5; Major S.A. Middleton, D.S.O., Glebe and Sydney Rowing Clubs (N.S.W.), 13st 6lbs, 6; Gunner G.W. Nettam, West Australian Rowing Club (W.A.), 11st 12lbs, 7; Captain H.C. Disher, Melbourne University Boat Club (Vic.), 11st 1lb, stroke; Sgt. A.E. Smedley, Sydney Rowing Club (N.S.W.), cox. It is regrettable to note that none of these famous men are now living.

Other competitors were Australian No. 2 crew, Canada, Cambridge University, France, New Zealand, Oxford University and United States. The A.I.F. No. 1 crew defeated the A.I.F. No. 2 crew in the first heat, Cambridge University in the semi-final and Oxford University in the final by one length in a time of 7 min. 7 secs.

The handsome trophy was left in the custody of the Australian Military Authorities, and eventually handed over to the Australian War Memorial Council and placed in the Australian War Museum.

At the conference of delegates from the Australian Rowing Associations in Brisbane on 14th May, 1920, it was decided to ask the Australian War Memorial Council for the Cup as a perpetual trophy for the Australian Eight-oared Championship. This request was refused, and on 12th October, 1920, a further request was made by the Victorian Rowing Association for the Cup, with the suggestion that it should be kept in the Australian War Museum of the State which won the race each year. This request was also refused.

On 30th October, 1920, a petition to the King, prepared by the Victorian Rowing Association and signed by Captain H.C. Disher setting out the facts, was sent with the request that His Majesty make known his wishes and regard to the disposal of the trophy. A reply dated 13th May, 1921 received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr Winston Churchill, stated that "His Majesty commands me to inform you that it is his wish that the Cup should be used as a permanent trophy and be competed for annually for the Interstate Eight-oared Race of Australia."

The famous trophy had, therefore, to be won twice; first by the Australian Oarsmen in three strenuous races, and then by the Australian Rowing Administrators in three equally strenuous contests with the Authorities who had taken possession of the Cup.

Members of successful King's Cup crews have a history of Olympic Medal successes, notably 1952 at Helsinki, 1956 at Melbourne and 1960 at Mexico, and since the Cup became the perpetual trophy for the Interstate Eight-oared Championship.

History of the President's Cup

Following the formation of the Australian Amateur Rowing Council in 1925, Mr E.C. Watchorn, a trustee of the Geo. Adams Estate controlling Tattersalls Sweep Consultations and the first President of the Council, donated the President's Cup as the perpetual trophy for competition in the Annual Australian Single Sculling Championship. It was first competed for in 1926 and won by the late A.A. Bayes of Queensland.

Mr R.H. (Bob) Pearce of New South Wales, the winner of Olympic Gold Medals in 1928 and 1932, won the Cup on three occasions, 1927, 1928 and 1929. His cousin C.A. (Cecil) Pearce of New South Wales won it on four occasions and his son, Gary, was successful in 1965.

Mr M.T. (Mervyn) Wood, the winner of Olympic Gold, Silver and Bronze Medals in 1948, 1956 and 1960 respectively, has been the most successful sculler in the President's Cup race, having won the trophy on eight occasions.

Along with those mentioned above, Stuart McKenzie, 1956 Olympic Silver Medallist and a record six times winner of the Diamond Sculls at Henley-on-Thames, won the Cup on two occasions to join the ranks of the world class scullers to hold it throughout its history.

History of the Penrith Cup and Lightweight Rowing

Originally limited to oarsmen weighing not more than 140lbs, the weight limit for lightweight competitors in Australia has varied from time to time between the States, and since 1974, the year in which the first F.I.S.A. Lightweight Championship was conducted and at which a Gold Medal victory for Australia in the four without cox event was recorded, the Internationally accepted limits of 72.5kg maximum for oarsmen and single scullers provided that the average weight of any crew excluding a single sculler does not exceed 70kg, have been nationally adopted.

The introduction of the Interstate Lightweight Four-oared Championship of Australia in 1958, and for which the Penrith Cup presented to the Australian Amateur Rowing Council by the Penrith City Council has been the perpetual trophy to be held by the successful State each year, laid the foundation for this class of rowing in Australia. The inclusion of lightweight events for other classes of boats in the National Regatta programmes since 1962 has firmly established Lightweight rowing at both a National and International level, with further gold medals for the coxless four at both 1980 and 1981 World Championships under the coaching of 'Rusty' Robertson.

History of the Noel F. Wilkinson Trophy and Australian Youth Rowing

Recognising the necessity to introduce a class of rowing in which Australian Youth oarsmen could compete, the Australian Amateur Rowing Council initiated the Interstate Youth Eight-oared Championship at an age limit some 18 months older than the Internationally accepted age limit for the first time at the Championships conducted in Victoria in 1974, and in that same year accepted the offer of Mr Noel F. Wilkinson to provide a perpetual trophy for the event.

Youth events for other classes of boats have since been incorporated in the National Regatta programmes and are now seen to fulfil the purposes originally envisaged by both the Rowing Council and the Donor, namely, an incentive to young oarsmen to continue in the sport of rowing subsequent to the completion of their secondary education and provide for them acceptable competition on a National basis and allow for the development of oarsmen into higher classifications.

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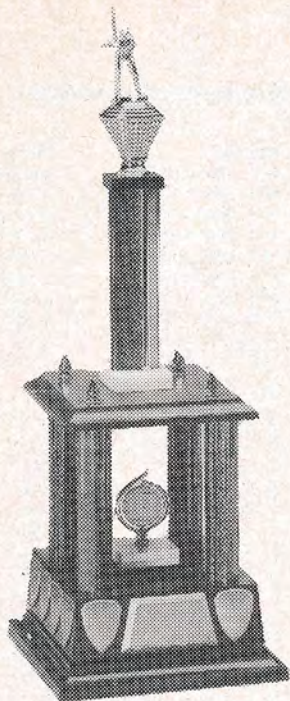

History of Women's Interstate Rowing Championships of Australia

FOUR WITH COXSWAIN — U.L.V.A. TROPHY

This title was first contested on 15th May, 1920 on the Hamilton Reach of the Brisbane River. It was conducted in conjunction with the men's eight-oared title. The Australian Women's Amateur Rowing Council was formed at that regatta and thereafter staged their own championship regattas until 1975.

Interstate challenge races were initiated in 1912, when a Queensland four from the Brisbane Ladies' Rowing Club journeyed to Melbourne to race the Albert Park Ladies, resulting in a win for the tourists. The following year the Victorian girls returned the visit and were defeated by a mere two feet on the Brisbane River.

The Great War prompted a halt to Interstate challenge races until 1919 when a Victorian Country four visited Adelaide, but could not match the strong South Australian girls. It was unfortunate that financial difficulties prevented Victoria being represented at the first official Australian title race in Brisbane the next year.

This first Interstate Championship was won by the Mannum crew representing South Australia in a time of 4 minutes 55 seconds, from New South Wales and Queensland, and it was the stroke of this winning crew after whom the U.L.V.A. Trophy was modelled.

The event has produced many closely fought races including one dead heat in 1955, when the judges were unable to separate New South Wales and Victoria on the Brisbane River. A re-row was called for, but neither crew could take to the water before dusk, their members being so completely exhausted. The following day New South Wales won the re-row.

In 1976 the Women's Council agreed to combine with the Australian Amateur Rowing Council to stage a true Australian Championship Regatta with Interstate and National events for both men and women, and in 1981 the Women's Council disbanded and the A.A.R.C. assumed full responsibility for both men's and women's rowing.

SINGLE SCULL — NELL SLATTER TROPHY

The first Interstate women's sculling race was staged long before the Australian Championship was introduced in Brisbane in 1963. It was in fact the first recorded Interstate women's rowing competition and took place at the great Federation Regatta staged on Albert Park Lake in 1901.

Cassie Woolly McRitchie won the event from her Sydney challenger Elizabeth Messenger and was presented with a magnificent pearl and ruby bracelet by the Duke of Gloucester. The female scullers created such public interest that police were required to keep the inquisitive spectators at bay. To add to the occasion the Victorian sculler, Miss Woolly, used a skiff loaned to her by the Governor of Victoria, Lord Brassey.

Cassie Woolly McRitchie founded Australia's first all women's rowing club at Albert Park in 1907 and was known as the "mother" of Victorian Women's Rowing. She passed away in 1973 aged 96 years.

The Nell Slatter Perpetual Trophy for this Australian Championship was presented by the Queensland Women's Rowing Association as a tribute to their President.

LIGHTWEIGHT FOUR WITH COXSWAIN — VICTORIA CUP

IN 1968 the first Australian Women's Lightweight Fours title was contested on the Yarra River, Melbourne. The event was won by Victoria with a crew stroked by one of Australia's best known oarswomen, Margaret Agnew MacKenzie. It was greatly due to her efforts that the Women's Council introduced Lightweight events to the women's championships programme.

The average weight of a crew must not exceed 56 kilos, the maximum weight of 50% of the crew may not exceed 59 kilos, with the coxswains minimum weight being 40 kilos.

This class has proved immensely popular with so many girls naturally falling into the weight classifications, thus producing a high standard and very close competition between the States.

The United States of America and Canada have adopted our weight standards, and inaugural competition between the three countries was held in 1979. Australia was successful in the two events they contested at St. Catherines, Canada — Lightweight Four with Cox and Lightweight Pair without Cox.

The perpetual trophy for this Australian Championship — "The Victoria Cup" was presented by the Victorian Ladies' Rowing Association.



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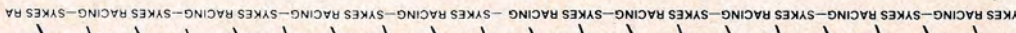
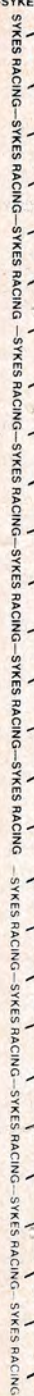

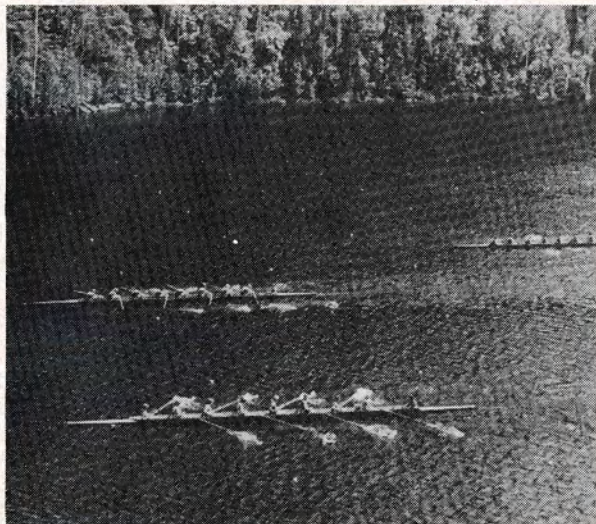
