FIFTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE AUSTRALIAN ROWING COUNCIL INCORPORATED

to be presented to the Annual Meeting of Council to be held at the Penrith Valley Inn, Penrith, New South Wales on Monday 4th April, 1988.

1987 has seen a solid year of progress in Australian rowing both on the water and off the water to ensure progression from the great successes of 1986 through to the Olympic Games in 1988 and further to the World Championships to be held in Australia in 1990. The highlights in 1987 were few but particular mention should be made of Janusz Hooker's bronze medal in the World Junior Single Sculling Championship, of the success of the Junior Team at the World Junior Championships generally (all crews made the final) and of the Senior B Team's great success in the series against New Zealand.

COUNCIL MEETINGS AND COMPOSITION

Council met on three occasions in 1987 -

in Melbourne on 26th January, 1987,
in Devonport on 30th March, 1987, and
in Melbourne on 21st November, 1987.

There were no changes in the composition of the Council throughout 1987. The Annual Meeting in 1987 saw the President, Mr. John Coates re-elected for a further period of four years and also the Treasurer, Mr. Noel Wilkinson B.E.M. was re-elected for four years to the position which he has held since 1977.

COUNCIL OFFICERS

Again throughout 1987 there were no changes in these positions. Reinhold Batschi has continued to serve Council exceptionally well in his position as National Director of Coaching, a position which he holds jointly with his position as Head Coach of Rowing at the Australian Institute of Sport. Simon Gillett has worked well in the part-time position of National Director of Coaching Education throughout 1987. Jacqui Marshall has now completed two and a half years as Administrative Assistant to Council, a position that she has filled well despite the huge amount of administrative work which passes her way.

In 1988 the position of Administrative Assistant will be replaced by a National Executive Director. The National Executive Director will become the main administrative officer of Council, taking over much of the Administrative Assistant's work, but also much of the work of the Secretary and the Treasurer. He or she will also have a major responsibility for the sponsorship and promotional sides of the sport. Full time clerical assistance will be provided to the National Executive Director to assist in

the office and the administration generally. This step is taken as the result of an administration plan prepared by Council's Finance Committee which saw that whilst a lot of progress was being made on the water, in coaching development, and elsewhere, the administration, due to the enormous increase in activities that the Council undertakes, was to some extent falling behind the rest of rowing on the national level and this needs to be rectified by professionalising the administration so that more time can be given to important tasks of an administrative and promotional nature. At the same time in our sport and in others there will be plenty of room for honorary officers, but their time will be better spent on activities which are perhaps not as time consuming as the activities to be undertaken by the full time officer.

The amount for the National Executive Director up until the appointment of a National Executive Director has been used for payment of the Administrative Assistant and for a retainer of International Public Relations Pty. Ltd.

Forward commitments have been made for 1988/1989 and 1989/1990 for the National Coaching Director and National Executive Director (\$30,000 each) and a forward commitment has been made by the Australian Sports Commission of \$60,000 in 1988/89 and \$60,000 in 1989/90 for the preparation for the World Rowing Championships making a total of \$150,000 under this head.

Council records its great appreciation to the Australian Sports Commission for its support of the sport in areas where sponsors do not have the same interest.

Council has been pressing the Australian Sports Commission to increase its assistance in this area and to include amateur coaches for assistance in this area. It has also sought to have individuals who have competed successfully in team sports to be treated equally with individuals who have been successful in individual sports as far as grants are concerned. It is pleasing to note that after several years of making submissions along these lines both of these proposals are accepted by the Australian Sports Commission. Again Council greatly appreciates the assistance from the Australian Sports Commission in this area.

Australian Olympic Federation

In 1987 the Australian Olympic Federation provided a grant of \$65,000 for the Olympic class crews who were selected for the World Championships in 1987. Also, assistance in the sum of \$18,000 was provided to enable a small team to travel to Seoul to test the Olympic course exactly one year before the 1988 Olympics and this grant was used by a coxed four, Reinhold Batschi and Dr. Bill Webb attending at Seoul and gaining valuable experience during a F.I.S.A. training camp held on the Olympic course.

Council greatly appreciates this practical support from the Australian Olympic Federation and acknowledges that in 1988, the Olympic year, the support is even more significant, consisting of payment for the whole Olympic trip (except for the cost of boats) and substantial payment towards a pre-Olympic European tour. The

huge expense encountered in international competition by Australian crews can only be overcome with this generous assistance from the Australian Olympic Federation together with the assistance received from the Australian Sports Commission and the national sponsor, Cadbury.

Australian Institute of Sport

In terms of direct grants, the Australian Institute of Sport supported Australian rowing in the sum of \$15,000 towards a training camp for our national crews (World Championship and Senior B crews) held in Canberra in July. This is a valuable pre-departure activity and enables our crews to test themselves against each other in very competitive conditions.

However, the A.I.S. assistance cannot simply be measured in terms of that grant. Again, the Mens Eight, Womens Coxed Four, Mens Coxed Four, and Mens Coxless Pair, all trained from April to July at the Australian Institute of Sport, thereby receiving the assistance of accommodation and meals, top training facilities, coaching, and back-up facilities such as medical and sports science assistance, and the burden on Council and on the individual athlete particularly is greatly relieved by this assistance. The Senior B Mens Eight also travelled to Canberra and made use of the competition provided by the Senior A crews on several occasions.

The Institute, through its Board and the Head Rowing Coach, Reinhold Batschi, works hand in hand with Council towards ensuring that the facilities provided for rowing in Australia are used to their optimum with the aim of producing top international results in the sport. The assistance mentioned above is invaluable and is an extremely practical way of showing the great co-operation which the Institute provides to the national sport.

Cadbury Confectionery

1987 was the second year of the current sponsorship with Cadbury Confectionery. The sponsorship assisted the national teams in competing at the World Championships and other international events, the running of the 1987 Cadbury Kings Cup and National Regatta and the holding of two of the National Selection Regattas. It is difficult to conceive of a sponsor who would more willingly and generously support the sport without seeking great return from the sport. That being said, however, Council is at pains to ensure that Cadbury is given adequate recognition for its generosity and whilst Cadbury announces that it is proud to be a sponsor of Australian rowing, the Australian Rowing Council in turn is very proud to have such a fine organisation as Cadbury Confectionery as its sponsor. We look forward to a longstanding close relationship with Cadbury. We would particularly thank the Chief Executive of the Confectionery Division of Cadbury Schweppes Pty. Ltd. Mr. Kevin Hayes, and the Group Product Manager, Jens Karnoe for their warm support.

Sponsorship was also obtained in 1987 from Australian Airlines, the Rothmans Foundation, Deloitte Haskins & Sells, and Qantas.

Junior Challenge

New Zealand defeated Australia each day in the mens eight and womens four. Janusz Hooker and Jenny Brown defeated New Zealand in their sculling events each day.

All the crews represented Australia with distinction, even though the results were not as good as last year.

Particular attention should be paid to the results of the Junior Team. Whilst, since 1981 when we first sent Juniors to the World Championships we have made several Finals, this year was exceptional in that all four crews made the Finals and recorded a Third, two Fourths and Sixth placing. The competition in the Juniors is extremely strong with all countries in the world competing and without there being any easy events. The Junior competitors are progressing well through Senior B ranks to Senior A ranks after their Junior successes, even though the year immediately following the Juniors is a difficult year for them. Many of them row in Youth events that following year. Janusz Hooker in the Mens Junior Single Sculls won the bronze medal at the World Junior Championships - our first Junior Sculling medal. His performance in a big strong field was exceptional.

The Senior B team again won the Series against New Zealand on the overall point score. Particular mention needs to be made of the Mens Senior B Eight which won all three of its test races, and all six of the small boat test races when it split up into two fours. Likewise, the Mens Lightweight Four won each of its three test races and won the Pairs Race each time. The attitude of our Senior B crews is impressive. Whilst the competition is only between Australia and New Zealand, there is recognition among our Senior B's of the fact that Senior B selection is a stepping stone to ultimate Senior A selection, but also there is apparent a great desire to be successful in the Senior B series without which the success currently being achieved would be absent.

In 1987 the Senior A and Lightweight crews at the World Championships came home without a medal. Three boats made finals - the Mens Eight, placed fourth, the Womens Lightweight Four, placed fourth and the Mens Lightweight Sculls (Peter Antonie)

placed Fifth. This indicates that Australian crews remain very much in touch with the best in the world and the lack of medals calls for improvements in arrangements, policy, planning and training for 1988 and beyond, without any major changes of direction. In 1988, at the end of eight years under the current selection system, it will be interesting to do an analysis of the results over those eight years, and the number of finals places achieved will be seen to be significant.

The Senior A Heavyweight Team was able to make an early trip to Europe with the assistance of Australian Olympic Federation funds and Cadbury sponsorship and achieved good results in the three Regattas attended.

In the Australian Junior Challenge against New Zealand, New Zealand was dominant in the Mens Eight and Womens Pair but Australia achieved some success in the Singles Sculls (both men and women). This Series has been sponsored by Deloitte Haskins & Sells for 3 years up until 1987 and Council appreciates the assistance of that leading firm of accountants.

1988 sees the Olympics as its major goal and Australian rowing will be hoping to achieve an improvement on the result of one Silver and two Bronze medals gained in Los Angeles. However, the Selectors and the Council do not see 1988 as the end point of our competitive efforts. The policies being undertaken and the training and planning extend to 1990, when the World Championships are in Australia, and beyond.

NATIONAL ROWING COACHING COMMITTEE

Simon Gillett, the National Director of Coaching Education has guided the National Rowing Coaching Committee through 1987 and many important initiatives have been achieved and recognised by the Australian Coaching Council and other bodies. The National Coaching Accreditation Scheme is an essential element in our development on the water. All States, clubs and coaches need to involve themselves in this development. It is apparent that those States which are heavily involved in this development are achieving the greatest results and other states should be wary of treating the scheme lightly.

AUSTRALIAN ROWING MAGAZINE

David Bean continued to edit the Rowing Magazine throughout 1987. However, in December of 1987 he retired from the position of Editor because of other time pressures, mainly related to rowing. He has edited the Magazine with distinction since 1981. Ken Matts, a long-time rowing supporter and journalist from Western Australia has taken over editorship of the magazine.

1987 CADBURY KINGS CUP AND NATIONAL REGATTA and NATIONAL SELECTION REGATTAS

1987 was marked by some controversy when the venue of Lake Kurwongbah selected for the 1987 Cadbury Kings Cup and National Regatta in Queensland was notified to the Rowing Council in October of 1986 as being unavailable for the Kings Cup. With only some four months to go to the Kings Cup Queensland put forward Bundaberg as an alternative site. In a decision, much criticised in the north eastern part of Australia, Council decided to hold the 1987 Cadbury Kings Cup and National Regatta at Lake Barrington, Tasmania. Council's view was that it was in the best interests of the sport nationally to hold the Regatta at Lake Barrington where facilities for and experience in running the five day Regatta were assured, in view of the short time available, and television coverage was likewise assured. Queensland rejected a proposal that there might be a reorganisation of the rotation of the Kings Cup and National Regatta to allow for its having missed out on the 1987 Regatta and thus there will be no Kings Cup in Queensland until 1993. The resulting championships at Lake Barrington were exemplary in their organisation and the competition provided. Cadbury Confectionery, as the principal sponsor of the Regatta, provided great support to the event and the conditions, racing, and all arrangements associated with it belied any thought that it had been organised in only a bare few months. The Council congratulates and thanks the Tasmanian Rowing Council for stepping into the breach at such short notice.

National Selection Regattas were held in New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia and again provided competitive conditions of the highest standard for prospective national representatives. Council thanks the South Australian Rowing Association, Victorian Rowing Association and New South Wales Rowing Association for their great co-operation in this regard, and Cadbury Confectionery and Pilkington-ACI Limited for sponsoring the Selection regattas.

THE AUSTRALIA 1990 ROWING CHALLENGE

1987 saw the first year of this project directed towards increasing the pool of oarsmen and oarswomen who might be available for representing Australia in 1990 through co-ordinating talent identification, training, and particularly winter training throughout the country to raise the standard of the oarsmen and oarswomen and coaches, and also their level of awareness of the 1990 Championships. Operating under a very modest budget the project, directed by Berry Durston and assisted by the National Director of Coaching Education Simon Gillett and co-ordinators in each state certainly has achieved some of its aims in 1987, particularly that of directing rowers minds towards 1990, and co-ordinating to an extent winter squads. The level of success has differed from state to state. It is hope that sponsorship can be obtained for this project in 1988 and 1989 so that even more can be achieved. Perhaps in 1988 a particular effort could be made in the womens rowing area, where there is some concern about the depth of national talent.

ROWING FOR THE DISABLED

Leading up to the climax of this programme at the 1988 Cadbury Kings Cup and National Regatta where international events for the disabled will be held, there has been great progress in 1987. In Western Australia, the first stage of the project has moved well so that rowing for the disabled can be seen to be well established in that state. Now it is also established in New South Wales and these two states will be well represented at the international events in 1988. Again, whilst it was as a Bicentennial project that rowing for the disabled was commenced, it is not intended that 1988 will be the end point of the efforts of those involved in the project, and efforts will be made in 1988 and beyond to extend the project to all other states. Appreciation must be expressed to the Australian Bicentennial Authority, the Department of Sport Recreation and Tourism, the Western Australian Disabled Sports Association, and in our own sport to Jacqui Marshall, Patti Pinkerton, Kaye Crawford and Craig James for their efforts.

AUSTRALIAN INTERNATIONAL ROWING FOUNDATION


This Foundation established in 1986 attracted some support in 1987, but the level of support can only be described as disappointing. Noel Wilkinson, as National Co-ordinator, has found it difficult to get support from the States for the Foundation, largely because of other time pressures on those who have been asked by their State Associations to co-ordinate the project in those States. The Foundation is a means of providing much needed assistance to our international oarsmen and oarswomen in the difficult task of raising funds for international competition and in that way is of benefit to all States and all of the sport nationally. It is hoped, that in each State, some assistance from enthusiastic helpers might be able to be obtained for the work Noel Wilkinson wishes to carry out.

CONCLUSION

1987 has seen continued steady efforts in the international rowing sphere, steps being taken for the improvement of the administration of the sport nationally, and a continuation of the high standard of competition and regattas of a national character throughout the country. Many countries in the world would be very proud to be able to hold competitions as competitive and well organised as our Kings Cup and National Regatta and National Selection Regattas. Despite the enormous assistance from Cadbury, and other quarters, the national activities of the sport, and included in that the international activities, still need great financial assistance if the burden of competition is not to become a huge financial burden on the competitors themselves, so much so that it shortens the competitive life of our top rowers. It is hoped that the advent of the National Executive Director will see an improvement in our financial position by increasing

the value of our sponsorships and increasing the return we give to our sponsors. In 1988 Council will find it necessary to curtail the international competition being undertaken, despite the serious effect this will have on competitive results - it is well recognised that our crews need as much international competition as possible. In the Olympic year of 1988 I urge rowing supporters to support the financial efforts being made on behalf of Australian rowing so that Olympic success in 1988 might be assured as well as providing a strong continuing basis for success into the future.

Additionally, I would ask all Australian rowing supporters to put their support behind Australia's organising of the 1990 World Rowing Championships. Voluntary assistance will be needed in the next two years from people in Tasmania and throughout the whole of Australia. We will be calling on people to assist in many ways and would appreciate hearing from those who would like to be involved in some particular way.

1987 CADBURY KINGS CUP AND NATIONAL REGATTA
