FIFTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT  
OF THE AUSTRALIAN ROWING COUNCIL INCORPORATED

to be presented to the Annual Meeting of Council to be held at the Council Chambers, Collie, Western Australia, on Monday, 27th March, 1989.

1988, an Olympic year, saw the culmination of a four year programme leading up to the selection of the Australian Olympic team. It marked in a way the end of an era as there were a number of retirements following the Olympic Games both of personalities on and off the water. The Olympic results achieved the standard sought, but not medals, and it was to our very successful Lightweight, Junior and Senior B teams that we had to look for medals.

COUNCIL MEETINGS AND COMPOSITION

Council met on four occasions in 1988; in Adelaide on 29th January, 1988, in Penrith on 4th April, 1988, in Melbourne on 29th May, 1988, and in Melbourne on 26th November, 1988. The May meeting was a special meeting to adopt a new Selection Policy for 1989 to 1992.

The year saw a change in the Council with the retirement of Mr. Croot as the New South Wales Delegate, a position he had held since 1984. At the November meeting of Council the President for the preceding five years, John Coates announced his retirement because of heavy commitments in the Olympic movement - he was General Manager of the Australian team to Seoul. John Coates had previously served for four years as Secretary of Council and throughout the 1980s had been a moving force in rowing's success on and off the water. His drive, initiative, concern for the competitors and contacts throughout sport in Australia have been in no small way major factors in the development of the sport from what it was in 1978 when he became Secretary to the high profile held in 1988 when he retired.

COUNCIL OFFICERS

Reinhold Batschi continued to serve Council well as National Director of Coaching whilst also holding down the position of Head Coach of the Australian Institute of Sport. He also coached the Olympic Eight. This demanding combination did not prevent him attending thoroughly and fairly to all his duties, but has led him not to seek re-appointment as National Director of Coaching in 1989. The Council cannot thank Mr. Batschi sufficiently for his ten years of service as National Director of Coaching and can only be grateful that in his continued position of Head Coach at the Australian Institute of Sport he will still contribute in an enormous way to the development of Australian rowing as he has done over the past decade.

Simon Gillett continued to work as the part-time National Director of Coaching Education throughout 1988. However, in 1989 this position will be subsumed again in the position of National Director of Coaching which will be a full-time position.

Jacqui Marshall served Council as Administrative Assistant until April, when that position was superseded by that of National Executive Director. Council thanks her for her three years of valued service.

Robin Poke was appointed National Executive Director in April and has set up an efficient and hard working office in Canberra, assisted by Brigid Cassells. As reported in the last Annual Report the administrative work of Council had grown with its increased activities and profile to the extent that a full-time Executive Director was necessary and Council is fortunate to have had that position filled by one as able and as enthusiastic as Mr. Poke.

#### The National Selectors

November of 1989 marked the end of the four-year term of the National Selectors who were re-elected for a second term in 1985. Willy Hay, Don Croot and Simon Gillett had as their last selection duties the selection of the 1988 crews and the formulation of the policy for 1989 to 1992.

Over the past 8 years there has been a consistency of application of the Selection Policy which those Selectors, with Reinhold Batschi, largely developed. The time spent and the diligence and honesty with which these men approached their task is never appreciated, because the tendency is always to criticise the Selectors for their mistakes, of which there always must be some, rather than to recognise their meritorious performance. Council does recognise it and thanks the outgoing Selectors for their great work, and at the same time looks forward to working closely with the new Selectors David Yates, David Poulson and Dennis Hatcher.

Forward committments have been made for 1989/90 in the sum of \$150,000 (National Executive Director \$30,000, National Director of Coaching \$30,000, international competition overseas \$30,000, 1990 World Rowing Championships \$60,000), and for 1990/91, \$60,000 (National Executive Director \$30,000, National Director of Coaching \$30,000).

Again Council acknowledges this generous support without which it would not be able to operate. It continues to press the Australian Sports Commission to index those grants related to salary to enable the salaries to keep pace with the Consumer Price Index.

I reported in last year's report that we had been pressing for coaches to be assisted by these grants. I am pleased that we have been successful in this regard and a grant of \$10,000 was made towards the expenses of some of the national coaches who had shown success and a period of service to the Council. The coaches who received money under these grants were David Yates, Martin Aitken, Martin Owen, Bruce Evans, Paul McGann, Bob Bleakley, Barbara Gillett, Ellen Randell, Peter Lannigan and David Ochert.

Again partly through strong submissions made by the Council in respect of these grants, we are led to believe that the grants will be even more substantial in 1989. At long last team grants are going to be on a par with individual grants which will enable our competitors to be greatly relieved from the expense of



competition overseas.

Council and all rowers should appreciate this tremendous assistance now being given by the Australian Sports Commission (now amalgamated with the Australian Institute of Sport), and particularly its willingness to listen to and take cognizance of submissions put to it by sports such as ours so that ultimately equity and fairness are involved in the allocation of these grants, to match the generosity of the Sports Commission. The role of John Coates in pushing for this equity and fairness must also be appreciated.

#### Australian Institute of Sport

Again, the Institute has been a major benefactor of Australian rowing. Not only did it directly contribute \$15,000 towards the training camp for our national crews (Junior and Lightweight and Senior B), but also Reinhold Batschi contributed \$33,630 from his rowing budget directly into the budgets of the national teams. Over and above this, the Institute granted temporary scholarships to members of the national teams to allow crews to train there during the whole of their period of training. This included the Womens Senior B Four and the Mens Olympic Eight and Pair. Other crews, including the Development Eight and Olympic Quad Scull used the Institute facilities from time to time.

Council should not take this assistance for granted. In other sports, the co-operation is not as thorough and as direct. Nor should we take for granted the tremendous amount of input into national rowing both from the point of view of coaching, initiatives, service on committees and so on by the Institute coaches - Reinhold Batschi, Peter Shakespear, Bob Marlow and Ellen Randell. Also, we should recognise the value of the Institute in developing coaches through the Apprentice Coach Scheme. Since rowing started at the Institute it has seen seven coaches appointed as Apprentice Coaches up to November 1988, six of whom have thereafter coached Australian crews. The value of this Scheme and other initiatives which rowing has introduced at the Institute is well recognised by other sports who have adopted similar proposals.

#### Cadbury Confectionery

Australian Rowing was fortunate in 1988 to have Cadbury as its principal sponsor for the third year of a three year agreement. Cadbury provided money for the staging of the Cadbury Kings Cup and National Regatta at Penrith, the two Cadbury Selection Regattas at West Lakes and Penrith, the Cadbury Senior B Series at West Lakes and for the National Teams. Not only does Cadbury supply sponsorship in the terms of cash, it also supports the teams and rowers at the above events with fine Cadbury products

and t-shirts for winners at the Selection Regattas. All in Australian rowing appreciates this sponsorship, and it is now the case that Cadbury is known to be associated with Australian rowing and throughout sport in Australia and generally the partnership is seen to be a close one.

Towards the end of 1988 Cadbury agreed to prolong the sponsorship for yet another year and to negotiate during 1989 for the continuation of the sponsorship.

Sponsorship was also obtained from Australian Airlines, the Rothmans Foundation and Qantas in 1988.

### Senior B Series

Australia won the series against New Zealand including winning the Mens Eight, Mens Coxed Four, Mens Coxless Four, Mens Double Scull, Mens Single Scull, Mens Lightweight Four, Mens Lightweight Pair, Mens Lightweight Double Scull, Mens Lightweight Single Scull, Womens Four, Womens Pair, Womens Single Scull, Womens Double Scull. In a number of the events Canadian and U.S.A. crews competed defeating Australia and New Zealand in some of them.

### Junior Challenge

New Zealand defeated Australia each day in the Mens Eight, Womens Four and both sculling events.

The results in 1988 were mixed. The Lightweight and Junior team and the Senior B team were hugely successful. Also the Development Eight had great success in the United States against considerably more experienced and older crews and also won the Ladies Plate at Henley. The success of the Junior programme is evident with all of the Junior crews being placed and two of them gaining medals. The Junior Girls medal is the first medal won by an Australian Junior Girls crew. The Lightweight Womens Four were beset with difficulties and are to be commended on their magnificent result. Likewise Jason Day has shown by his silver medal that he is an enormous talent and this result earned him the Cadbury scholarship for 1989, awarded to the best Junior performer of the previous year.

The Senior B team was totally dominant over New Zealand winning in every event. The series was enhanced by the attendance of United States womens crews and Canadian mens and womens crews. The United States and Canadian womens crews were superior to our womens crews generally speaking but our mens crews and particularly our Mens Lightweight crews were very successful. The Senior B series is continuing to produce oarsmen and oarswomen of great quality and a good racing and winter training background for Senior A competition the following year.

The Junior Challenge team however was not as successful. Council and the Selectors are giving careful consideration to the selection of our Junior teams for this event. In 1988 the crews were selected separately from those going to the World Junior Championships and therefore, were, in all honesty, our second best crews. This will change in 1989 and a review of Junior

selection will be undertaken. From the results in Milan we obviously have quality Juniors but our selection has not brought this out.

The Olympic results are good results. The team will express disappointment because it was aiming for medals. However, it was the classiest Olympic field for many years. I am confident that our Eight, Quad Scull and Single Sculler would have won medals in Los Angeles, for example - for what that is worth. They were set a standard - namely to make the Olympic final - and they did so. They raced with distinction. Hamish McGlashan is the first Mens Sculler to make a World Championship final and achieved a mighty fourth. The Quad Scull had to fight hard to get through tough semi-finals. Having done so they raced in a tight final and were placed fifth. The Eight had had considerable upsets, the crew having been changed after the first trip to Europe. Their heat row gave cause for some optimism, but their repechage row sounded some alarm bells. They would not be satisfied with their finals row, but again should recognise that in that field they raced at a very high standard and they have kept Australia in the forefront of international rowing.

Along the way, the Australian team had success in Europe particularly at the Amsterdam Regatta and Henley Royal Regatta where the Quad Scull and Hamish McGlashan won the Queen Mothers Challenge Plate for Quad Sculls and the Diamond Sculls. The Eight lost the Grand Challenge Cup by the narrowest of margins.

All these crews represented their country at considerable personal and financial sacrifice. They are to be congratulated for overcoming these sacrifices and achieving what they did and are to be assured that their efforts and their sacrifices are recognised and applauded by the Council.

#### COACHING EDUCATION

The National Coaching Accreditation Scheme continued to be developed in 1988 under the hand of Simon Gillett the National Director of Coaching Education. Initiatives in 1988 included the development of a Level 0 video for coaches who are perhaps from other sports or from schools who wish to get involved in coaching rowing. Considerable work has also been done on the re-writing of the Level II course material and the development of videos for this. Seminars were held in all States.

In 1989 a fulltime National Director of Coaching will be undertaking this work in place of the National Director of Coaching Education. Council acknowledges the generous assistance of the Australian Sports Commission and the Rothmans Foundation in this area.

#### AUSTRALIAN ROWING MAGAZINE

1988 was the first year under the editorship of Ken Matts. The magazine achieved a high quality and was punctually published. It is financially viable and serves an important purpose in Australian rowing. The work undertaken by Ken Matts and by contributors is voluntary and Council expresses its congratulations and appreciation to Ken Matts, Richard Finlayson and all concerned in its production.

#### 1988 CADBURY KINGS CUP AND NATIONAL REGATTA AND NATIONAL SELECTION REGATTAS

The 1988 Kings Cup and National Regatta was held at Penrith in New South Wales. A fine championship was marred by terrible weather. The week of the championships saw constant rain. The racing however was magnificent, the organisation excellent and the enthusiasm of those who attended a great credit to the competitors and officials alike. It was a pity that the weather kept a large crowd from attending. The regatta was televised by the A.B.C., but only in a later replay. Cadbury's sponsorship of the regatta is greatly appreciated and the regatta is a good venue to publicise the close relationship between Cadbury and Australian rowing. The New South Wales Rowing Association also engaged subsidiary sponsors, namely Radio 2WS, Pilkington Australia, A.M.P., National Australia Bank, Baker & Provan, Heathley Limited, T.N.T., Outboard Marine Australia Pty. Limited.

Council thanks the New South Wales Rowing Association for its efforts.

The National Selection Regattas were held in New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia and again were hindered by less than perfect weather. Also, it must be said that the organisation in New South Wales was not good in 1988. Cadbury supported the regattas in New South Wales and South Australia and Pilkington was the sponsor of the Victorian regatta.

#### 1990 WORLD ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Throughout 1988 there were a number of meetings of the Board of the 1990 World Rowing Championships Limited and a number of meetings of the Organising Committee. The Championships are being run by a company limited by guarantee which was formed by the Australian Rowing Council and the Tasmanian Rowing Council for this purpose, and a full report on the Championship preparations is inappropriate in this report. However the work being put into the preparation of the Championships by officers of this Council, of the Tasmanian Rowing Council and others from outside of those two bodies is enormous and the Championships are in good hands. During 1988 Mr. Brian Roe was engaged as the

General Manager (fulltime) of the Championships and is operating from an office in Devonport. There is a need for the Championships to be better publicised throughout Australia and a need for all Australian rowing people to take an interest in and get behind the Championships.

#### ROWING FOR THE DISABLED

1988 was the Australian Bicentennial and rowing made as its project the development of rowing for the disabled and the staging of international disabled events at the Kings Cup and National Regatta. This was hugely successful. Disabled rowing is now established in Western Australia and New South Wales, the two States selected for the commencement of the project, and the competition at the Kings Cup attracted competitors from Australia, Great Britain, United States and Holland. It was a very successful and worthwhile event. Council appreciates the work of the disabled sub-committee - Jacqui Marshall, Kaye Crawford and Craig James, and the support from the West Australian Disabled Sports Association, the Australian Bicentennial Authority and Capita Finance.

More important is the fact that disabled rowing was not just a 1988 project. From here our disabled rowing committee will take disabled rowing to the other States and develop it even further. A video and manual have been developed to this end. The important concept is that disabled rowing is to be integrated with able bodied rowing and thus be part of the whole sport.

#### CONCLUSION

As this is the last Annual Report that I shall be writing as Secretary I would, rather than dwell on the notable achievements of Council over the past few years, prefer to state what I see as the challenges to the Council and Australian rowing in the future.

Firstly, we bear the responsibility of ensuring that our international representatives do not have to be financially disadvantaged as a result of their selection. The financial problems of Council fall on the shoulders of our representatives and this is inherently wrong. The financial solutions, unfortunately, are not as easy to state as the financial problem is.

Secondly, the ever present challenge to Australian rowing must be to develop the pool of rowers available for international selection, and on the way, to increase the numbers participating in domestic regattas. To do this we need to be achieving a much better flow through of rowers from school rowing into club rowing. The percentage of those rowing after school is very low.



Again, the problem is more easily stated than the solution, and this could well be a major task set for the new National Director of Coaching.

Thirdly, we must get more talented athletes into rowing. Here there is a solution already being tested. A talent identification programme has been developed through the Australian Institute of Sport and the Australian Sports Commission in Canberra which is already showing impressive results. The purpose of the initial programme is to see whether it is appropriate to be developed in all States and Clubs, and it appears from the initial results that it is a project that can be well translated into State and Club rowing.

Fourthly, Council needs to upgrade its administration in two ways. It needs to fully develop its professional administration run by the National Executive Director, as the administrative tasks have become too great for honorary officials. Secondly, the big business that rowing in Australia is becoming needs to be run as such - that is by a management group rather than delegates of the States. This is hard to achieve because of the history and vested interests of the States, but a Council interested in national rowing should turn its mind to this.

I thank the Council and all its officers for their support over the past year and look forward to continued development in Australian rowing in 1989 and beyond.
