FIFTY EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AUSTRALIAN ROWING COUNCIL INC

Presented to the Annual General Meeting of Council held at The Outdoor Pursuit Centre, Lake Barrington International Rowing Centre, Tasmania, on Monday 26th March 1990.

The year 1989 saw many changes in the direction and management of Australian rowing. For a post-Olympic year there have been many developments, particularly off the water, and although the successes on the water at the World Championships were perhaps not quite what had been hoped for, there is nonetheless much optimism for 1990 and beyond, particularly with the World Rowing Championships being held at the magnificent Lake Barrington International course in November 1990. The fourth placings by the men's double scull of Antonie and Reedy and the women's lightweight four represented great racing and very tight finishes.

The junior women's four were outstanding in winning the gold medal in their event at the World Junior Championships in August and they are to be congratulated, once again, for their performance. It has given much encouragement to women in rowing around Australia. They have demonstrated to all that with enthusiasm and dedication gold can be won, and their success, it is hoped, will be continued at the 1990 Junior and Senior championships.

COUNCIL MEETINGS AND COMPOSITION

Council met on four occasions during 1989: in Melbourne in January, then at Collie during the King's Cup and National Regatta in March/April (the Annual General meeting), at a Special General meeting convened to discuss the Model of Excellence proposal and the Australian Sports Commission's funding programme, and at the usual November meeting of Council.

There were many changes in personnel during the year. Bill Cooper from Western Australia was President following the resignation of John Coates during 1988. Bill served the Council well during the interregnum before the election of Reg McKay as President at the Annual General Meeting. Reg McKay had been the Victorian delegate since 1982, and brings to the Council much experience from those years. John Boulton, the Honorary Secretary since 1982, resigned to take up an appointment as Secretary General to FISA in Switzerland, leaving in mid 1989. He served with distinction and in the minds of many "was" Australian rowing. His contribution to the growth and development of rowing as a professionally administered sport was in no small way one of the reasons for it being chosen as one of the seven sports to receive "super funding" from the Australian Sports Commission for the balance of the Olympiad. His replacement was Margot Foster, 1984 Olympic bronze medallist in the women's coxed fours. She took over the difficult job of Secretary General to the Council in the middle of the year.

COUNCIL OFFICERS

Robin Poke - National Executive Director

After his first full year in the position, Robin has continued to maintain his enthusiasm for rowing and has been of assistance to both the President and the Secretary General during the time they were coming to grips with their new portfolios. The office in Canberra has not only moved location but has been subject to some upheaval, with changes in administrative assistants from Brigid Cassells, who resigned in August, to Andrea Coss, who briefly but very ably assisted during the very busy Model of Excellence exercise period in September/October, to Carolyn Fraser who comes well qualified with a sports administration degree. Carolyn commenced employment in December. Robin's liaison with the Australian Sports Commission during the year proved useful, particularly during the Model of Excellence discussions with the ASC. Robin's media background has been of benefit to Australian rowing in that he was well placed to promote the junior girls following their win at the Junior World Championships.

Peter Stocker - National Director of Coaching

Peter Stocker, a 33 year old Swiss, was appointed full time National Director of Coaching, and took up his appointment with the arrival of the Australian team in Europe prior to the World Championships in Bled, Yugoslavia. Peter is highly qualified and has plenty of experienced in both rowing, coaching and coaching education. He will prove a marvellous asset to the cohesive development of Australian rowing through the Council's coaching education programmes, which he will implement, develop and expand. Peter has already proved invaluable with the assistance he provided in the massive exercise that was the Model of Excellence for the Australian Sports Commission, and his contribution is here again acknowledged. Since mid November 1989 he has been touring the States, talking to coaches, athletes and administrators in an endeavour to come to grips as quickly as possible with his large portfolio. He was instrumental in those talks in establishing an understanding of the distribution of the Sports Commission funds available to each of the States.

Reinhold Batschi

Reinhold Batschi is no longer involved at the forefront of rowing development in Australia, but his contribution over the past ten years cannot go unacknowledged. Reinhold provided the impetus for the development of "Australian" rowing as opposed to "State" rowing, and assisted in the growth and development of the Australian Institute of Sport. He has been head coach there since the inception of rowing at the AIS in 1985. He is no longer National Director of Coaching, nor a selector, but will remain as head coach at the AIS, directing the men's programme particularly.

National Selectors

The beginning of the new Olympiad saw the "bleeding" of three new selectors: David Yates (Victoria) as Chairman of Selectors, ably assisted by Dennis Hatcher (Victoria) and David Poulson (Tasmania). The selectors brought with them new ideas, and immediately set about establishing good lines of communication with the competitors. This will certainly encourage a better exchange of views between the two groups and a greater understanding of the aims of and for Australian rowing. Increasing co-operation and interaction between selectors and athletes can only improve their relationships and enhance the quality and nature of teamwork within the sport. The selectors will change their Chairman on an annual basis and in 1990 David Poulson will chair the selectors.

AUSTRALIAN SPORTS COMMISSION

Australian rowing was chosen by the Australian Sports Commission as one of seven Olympic sports to receive 'super funding' for the balance of the Olympiad with a view to winning gold medals in Barcelona. The Model of Excellence exercise, previously referred to, was commenced in Adelaide in May with a convention of administrators from the seven chosen sports. In the Budget session, the Federal Minister for Sport, Senator Graham Richardson, announced that rowing would be one of those sports designated for extra funding. As is well known, this decision has generated considerable opposition among sports which were not nominated and particularly among those whose funding was actually reduced. It is therefore incumbent upon rowing to ensure that the funds allocated are not misspent but used for the advancement of Australian rowing.

AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF SPORT

The Institute has once again made a major contribution to Australian rowing in terms not only of financial input but also in the provision of coaching expertise and facilities.

A total of \$15,000.00 was contributed to the national training camp for crews about to depart for overseas competition, whilst a further \$26,000.00 was donated to national team funds. Temporary scholarships were granted to certain members of the national teams to enable crews to train in Canberra during the whole of their period of training, whilst other crews used the Institute's facilities from time to time.

A national team coaches seminar was organised at and by the Institute once national crews had been selected. National team coaches were assisted in the preparation of their crews by experts from the AIS.

AIS coaches contributed their knowledge and experience to the Overseas Tours and National Coaching Committees during the year. They were also instrumental in ensuring the success of the Olympic Solidarity Seminar in Canberra in October.

The satellite coaching scheme continued, whereby the AIS supports the efforts of coaches in each State in their search for talent, while a sports science research grant using biomechanics was evaluated by the AIS rowing unit in conjunction with the Cumberland College in Sydney.

AUSTRALIAN OLYMPIC FEDERATION

The Australian Olympic Federation through its Planning & Review Commission (formerly the Forward Planning Commission) allocated rowing \$40,000.00 during the 1989 calendar year, which was attributed to the costs of senior A teams competing overseas. The ongoing and increasing assistance of the AOF is once again gratefully acknowledged in the lead up to the 1992 Barcelona Olympic Games.

TED BROMLEY

The Council is most grateful to Mr Ted Bromley for his support in the development of pair oared rowing in Australia by way of a trust established to manage \$150,000.00 contributed by Mr Bromley. The purpose of the trust, inter alia, is "to defray the expenses or part thereof of any pair oared crew (male or female) including the coach of such crew selected by the Council to compete in any World Championship event including Junior and Lightweight Championships...".

In 1989 the women's coxless pair to the World Championships in Bled, Debbie Bassett and Kate Dearden, were the first recipients of grants pursuant to the trust.

The availability of additional funding for top class coxless pairs should encourage those who enjoy and seek international selection in this class of boat.

Council is once again most appreciative of this magnificent contribution by Mr Bromley to Australian rowing.

NON GOVERNMENT SPONSORSHIP

Cadbury Confectionery decided during mid 1989 not to renew their sponsorship beyond the end of the year and Council, at the time of writing, has not been successful in securing other sponsorship. Cadbury's support has been of much value, and it was disappointing that the company sought not to renew in what will be a very exciting few years in the growth and development of rowing.

Following the withdrawal of Cadbury in mid 1989 Needham Consulting agreed to endeavour to find a sponsor for Australian rowing. Unfortunately they were not successful despite giving the Council considerable cause for optimism over a period of some three months. That approach having failed, Council was forced to rely on its own resources in an endeavour to find a sponsor. By the end of 1989, however, Council had not been successful.

Council is fortunate in having the continuing sponsorship of Australian Airlines, Qantas and the Rothmans Foundation.

The results in 1989, as in 1988, were somewhat mixed. Good performances by the men's double scull and women's lightweight four at the World Senior A Championships were encouraging. Adair Ferguson's equipment difficulties robbed her and Australia of an almost certain medal in the women's lightweight scull. Performances in the senior B series were similarly mixed, with some results from training portending better results. The win by the girls at the Junior World Championships is the outstanding achievement of the year and it is hoped they will continue to progress in the sport.

COACHING EDUCATION

Simon Gillett's term as Director of Coaching Education, a position he had held on a part time basis, expired at the end of 1988. Although it was Council's intention that a full time coaching director be appointed this was not in fact achieved until September 1989. The Council advertised nationally and internationally for a candidate for the position of full time National Director of Coaching, and during the King's Cup and National Regatta in Collie interviewed those short listed. It was following these meetings that Council resolved to appoint 33 year old Swiss Peter Stocker. Stocker comes to the job very well credentialed. He commenced his employment with Council at the time the Senior A team arrived in Europe prior to the world championships and, as stated above, as soon as he arrived he became intimately involved in the Model of Excellence exercise. It is Stocker's intention to develop more comprehensive but simpler coaching courses, to help coaches prepare the athletes for the increasingly difficult challenges ahead. A background interview with Stocker appeared in the December 1989 edition of "Australian Rowing".

Once again Council acknowledges the contribution of the Australian Sports Commission, which has provided a substantial portion of the funding for the position. The Rothmans Foundation contributes to the cost of producing coaching education materials and running courses.

"AUSTRALIAN ROWING" MAGAZINE

Ken Matts' excellent editorship of the magazine has continued during the year and the rowing fraternity has been treated to a publication of high quality. It contains many interesting and readable articles covering a range of interests, from results at selection regattas to those at veterans championships; the latest in talent identification programmes and interviews with those of importance to the sport. It is contemplated, in connection with the restructuring of the Council, that the magazine will assume an even greater role and be automatically distributed to all affiliated members of State associations, via the Council, thereby giving those who might otherwise not subscribe the opportunity to keep up with what is going on in Australian rowing and overseas. Further information about the future direction of the magazine will be made available during 1990.

The Council once again expresses its thanks to Ken, and to all those who contribute on a voluntary basis, for a job well done.

1989 CADBURY KING'S CUP AND NATIONAL REGATTA AND NATIONAL SELECTION REGATTAS

The several days before the finals of the King's Cup and National Regatta were brilliant: warm sun and clear days, gentle zephyrs and perfect conditions for rowing on Lake Wellington at Collie, some 200km south of Perth. All looked set for a great regatta. The organisers had done a marvellous job importing sand to create a "beach", erecting huge tents and marquees and generally attending to all aspects of regatta management to enable both competitors, officials and spectators alike to enjoy a well managed event. The weather bureau had forecast inclement weather but Cyclone Ned ripped through the event causing the cancellation of most of the national regatta finals on Saturday and all of the interstate events on Sunday. It was a severe blow to the competitors who had been training so hard during the preceding months and to the organisers who had worked hard to put on a good regatta.

Apart from Cadbury sponsorship, the organising committee had secured additional sponsorship from the Hospital Benefits Fund of Western Australia, Bond Brewing, Bunnings Building Supplies Pty Ltd, Pilkington Australia and The State Government Insurance Office of Western Australia. Numerous volunteers were involved and the Council acknowledges their efforts, so unfortunately put to waste by Cyclone Ned.

Despite all possible optimism it was impossible to resume racing at any stage during the weekend and by Monday, when the weather had improved, it was too late. A replacement King's Cup and National Regatta was mooted for Carrum, but there was insufficient interest by most states. An event which has come to be known as the Clayton's King's Cup was in fact run at Carrum, in sensational conditions, some two weeks later and Victoria, Western Australia and South Australia contested the eight oared event. Cadbury sponsorship was much in evidence during the regatta and for those who attended it was a good fun morning and a great opportunity to see the much maligned Carrum course at its best.

Selection regattas were held in Victoria, New South Wales and South Australia. Victoria was sponsored by Pilkington.

1990 WORLD ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS

As at 1st January 1990 there were 300 days to go till the opening of the 1990 World Rowing Championships at the Lake Barrington International course in Tasmania. Much hard work has gone into preparing the event since it was awarded by FISA to Australia in 1985. In October 1989 Robin Holyman, a director of Ansett-TNT, was appointed Chairman of the Board following the resignation of John Coates. Mr Holyman's enthusiasm for the task quickly became evident during the first meetings of the Board which he attended following his appointment. Ms Debbie Slowgrove, formerly secretary to John Boulton, was engaged as the administrative assistant to Brian Roe, the General Manager of World Rowing, in October 1989, and the experience and knowledge which she brings to the position will no doubt stand the organisation in good stead.

CONCLUSION

At the time of writing, February 1990, I have been in the position of Secretary turned Secretary General formally since July 1989, but effectively since late September 1989 following my return from Bled. I have found the job to be considerably more demanding of time and resources than I had been led to believe would be the case. Particularly I have found that the range of issues to come to grips with is quite extensive and certainly a range which cannot be wholly grasped quickly. Additionally the administrative demands are great and I would imagine that Councillors and State Association secretaries particularly will have little or no comprehension of the work which my predecessor did in terms of communicating the 'goings-on' at ARC level. There is no "how to be a Secretary General" handbook available so the discharge of my duties has been somewhat by trial and error. That I know, to some Councillors and States, has not been good enough. But I feel that during the coming year my performance will improve as I come to better understand the various needs of the Council and Councillors. That improvement will be greatly assisted by constructive criticism from any who might seek to assist.

So far as the state of Australian rowing is concerned I refer to the closing remarks by the outgoing Secretary in the 57th annual report. His first recommendation was that Council should ensure that athletes do not have to bear the financial responsibility for their representation internationally. We have in part been assisted by the generosity of the Australian government via the Australian Sports Commission, and the Australian Olympic Federation who are helping our Olympic contenders. We have not been successful in securing other sponsorship, which would be used to underwrite the costs of those not eligible for Olympic selection, so the burden is only partly discharged. Council must look further to ensure that lightweights, Senior Bs and Juniors are not disadvantaged in international competition. Indeed Council must seek to ensure that athletes are assisted as far as possible at all levels of competition, both locally and internationally.

The second and third points raised were the need to encourage more people to row and those who do row at school to continue to row. Through the funding provided by the ASC we have been able to establish Rowing Development Officers in each state who, in conjunction with the National Director of Coaching, will institute talent identification programmes. These will aim to encourage those who might otherwise not have considered the sport to take it up. The RDOs in each State will also have the task of encouraging those in the sport at school level to continue. The challenge lies ahead in both respects, but we are on the way.

The fourth point dealt with the administration of rowing and the need to take its management out of the dark ages and into the realm of big business. Again, the lack of sponsorship, other than government dollars, has prevented the employment of more than the one administrative assistant needed to properly service both the National Executive Director and the National Director of Coaching. We are nonetheless grateful to the ASC for the provision of the funds that are available.

Council has taken the first step in restructuring its administration with the appointment of Mr Martin Stewart Weeks of the Albany Consulting Group to prepare a report on the direction for the restructuring of Council along the lines of a business, with an executive management group and a controlling board. Initial interviews with Councillors and office bearers have taken place and a comprehensive report will be presented by Mr Stewart Weeks at the Annual General meeting. It is imperative for the administration of rowing that it become as streamlined as possible to prevent duplication of activities and ensure the delivery of services to government, sponsors and most importantly, to the athletes.

The challenge to leap into the 1990s is before the Council. Our performance both on the water and in the administrative headquarters is being examined continually by both the Australian Sports Commission and the Australian Olympic Federation, our present benefactors. At the time of writing, Country Road has been appointed as sponsor of the 1990 King's Cup and National Regatta in Tasmania in March/April, and they, too will be casting a scrutinous eye over our operation. At every level we are being requested and expected to perform, and we must and we will. The future of rowing is at the crossroads as never before in terms of the demands and expectations imposed from within and without. We demand of ourselves a high standard of service for the athletes we serve and from those who assist us in funding there is an equal and correlative demand.

Council will assuredly make the necessary decisions to ensure the success of the sport in all arenas for this decade and into the next century.


