SIXTY FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

of the

Australian Rowing Council Inc.

For presentation to the Annual General Meeting, Melbourne, Victoria on 11th September 1993.

I am pleased to present the annual report for consideration of members.

With the continuing flow of outstanding competitive results, Australian Rowing has surely come of age at last.

For the past four years, Australian crews have achieved gold medal success at world level in the Olympic Games, World Championships, World Juniors, World Lightweights, F.I.S.A. Masters and this year for the first time in Adaptive Rowing.

Additionally, the latest census indicates the sport is growing at an average rate of almost 18% per annum during the past three years; the total rowing family now stands at 28,619.

Nominations for Australian selection rose dramatically this year, with a flood of brilliant elite talent across the board.

Applications for A.I.S. Rowing Scholarships rose 300% on last year.

For the first time ever, Australian Rowing collected medals at the World University Games - a pair of bronze.

F.I.S.A. entrusted a Round of the prestigious Sculling World Cup to Australia, recognising our world No. 2 ranking in a tangible manner. Accordingly, several Australian single scullers made the final world top ten ranking in this year's series.

Not to be outdone, Australian schoolboys from Brisbane Boys' College travelled to England and won their event at Royal Henley.

Peter Antonie routed a field of 80 of the worlds best scullers including the 1993 Olympic medalists, by winning the significant Armada Regatta in Switzerland.

Then our world champion lightweight double scullers emerged at the Rotsee International and soundly defeated all pretenders to their title with effortless gold medal performance in preparation for their title defence at Roudnice.

On 23rd September 1993, two decisions in different cities in Europe, will shape the next seven years of Australian Rowing. At Monaco, a decision will be taken which could award the 2000 Olympic Games to Sydney. And at Vienna, a decision will be made which could award the F.I.S.A. Masters Regatta of 1997 to West Lakes. Either or both of these world rowing championships will see Australia once again at the international focus of our sport.

At home, the professional and honorary officers of Australian Rowing, have encountered a massive workload which has severely taxed all concerned. Apart from the statutory Australian

Rowing Council and Executive Board meetings, there have been a consistent series of supplementary meetings particularly in reference to three key subjects - firstly the remodelling of the relationship between the Australian Sports Commission and Australian Rowing, in particular the development of a forward-thinking "Partnership Agreement"; secondly an extremely time-consuming exercise with the Australian Equal Opportunity Commission which involves the metamorphosis of the current Selection Policy to conform to equity principles; and not least a comprehensive restructuring of the direction being taken by Australian team regarding financial control and managerial reporting.

Following a frustrating twelve month search to enlist an outstanding National Director of Coaching Education, Australian Rowing was able to recruit and relocate Canadian Olympic coach Doug White. His appointment is expected to re-shape and revitalise coaching ethic and practice in Australia, as well as rejuvenate the enthusiasm and enterprise of the A.R.C. Coaching Commission.

One of the most important decisions of the year occurred at the 1993 F.I.S.A. Congress when the lightweight category was at last admitted to the Olympic Games with effect from 1996. This somewhat controversial resolution opens the door for Australia's world-class lightweight women and men to aim directly for medals at Atlanta. In the knowledge that the lightweight ranks are not numerically strong at present, the ultimate objective of an Olympic medal three years hence hopefully will stimulate growth in this class of rowing.

The Board has been in regular (and in some cases constant) contact with all officers of Council, and provided whatever support has been required in the pursuit of their duties. As an ex-officio member of all Commissions and Committees, the C.E.O. intends during the coming twelve months, to take a more positive role in attending meetings and maintaining direct contact with all portfolios.

The need for constant future planning and directions is always before the Board, and in the coming twelve months the emphasis will particularly involve:

- * the eternal quest for a major sponsor to provide financial support for further development nationally
- * assist the Marketing Committee to become an active arm for promotion of the sport
- * increase communications with all areas of the sport
- * draft a dramatic 21st century Development Plan which hopefully will include the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games; the 1997 F.I.S.A. Masters Regatta; and a Southern Hemisphere Under-23 Competition spearheaded by the A.R.C.
- * continue to provide maximum opportunity for elite athletes to make progress competitively towards success at Atlanta 1996 Olympics

The existing Board is determined to become a cohesive driving force for the sport of Rowing in Australia; there have been some difficulties in the past twelve months, but with the goodwill of Council, and support of State Associations and the rowing fraternity at large, your Board is confident of succeeding in its objective.

Executive Board Review

During the past twelve months, the Board met formally on eleven occasions, with numerous additional meetings and conferences focussed on specific matters.

Member of the original 1991 Board Bryan Draper, who had lived through the difficult inaugural days, resigned in September 1992. Celebrated oarsman Peter Antonie and noted coach Roger Moore were appointed in December 1992. Unfortunately Peter Antonie resigned after only six months in office, due to pressure of commitments. This left the Board undermanned in terms of personnel to undertake load activity in a very busy year.

Much of the burden fell squarely on Director Finance Ray Hammon, whose contributions have been enormous. His professional approach and meticulous detail have dramatically reformed the treasury operations which are now in better shape than ever before. Chairman Reg McKay and Roger Moore also took more than a fair share of the undertakings of office. However, the mountain of administrative activity demanded a very solid effort from the professional staff, and Administration Officer Fiona McKenzie deserves considerable appreciation for her performance, mostly under abundant pressure. This officer has unlimited capacity as a rowing administrator, and I thank her for her contributions.

The year under review has seen an appreciable emphasis on developing relations with corporate allies, particularly the Australian Sports Commission, Australian Institute of Sport and Australian Olympic Committee. The workshops, dialogue and formal conferences with these support organisations, has set in motion a series of new initiatives providing an operational and financial association which will support Australian Rowing towards the 21st Century, and allow us a greater degree of autonomy in our affairs, albeit responsibly.

This year the Board has come face to face with the finance and management of the 1993 Australian Teams, and encountered a range of situations which require input, tuning, direction and instruction.

The effect of this year's direct involvement with all facets of the Teams, will bear fruit in years to come. The role of a Team Manager is an extremely taxing responsibility, especially at the Senior level. The Board considers it has a primary responsibility to efficiently support the Team Managers, as well as to guide their activity in line with A.R.C. policy and the Managers' Handbook instructions.

1992 Olympic Games Rowing

The greatest-ever result in Australian Rowing history occurred at Banyoles, Spain, when the down-under oarsmen and women qualified four crews for the Olympic Finals - and won an unprecedented two gold medals - the first won by Australia since Merv Wood took the single sculls at the 1948 London Olympic Games.

To the Mens Coxless Four and Mens Double Sculls go the praise and congratulations of the entire rowing fraternity. They put Australian Rowing on the map in no uncertain fashion, and assisted the sport to secure world No. 2 ranking for the first time.

To all members of the Olympic Team, especially the coaches, go the deepest appreciation for dedication and selflessness in the months and years leading up to this historic regatta.

The benchmark has been set. Here comes Atlanta in three years time!



1992 World Lightweight and Junior Championships

Following the Olympic Games, the Australian Lightweight and Junior Team competed at Montreal. And success continued unabated.

From a team of only eight crews, Australia won three gold and three silver medals, shared by both oarsmen and women - a real team effort. This team goes into the pages of rowing history as Australia's most successful international team.



Trans Tasman Competitions

The Under-23 Challenge Team competed at Lake Wivenhoe, and again overcame strong opposition from our friends across the Tasman, winning the Rusty Robertson Trophy for the tenth consecutive time.

Not to be outdone, the Trans Tasman Junior Team travelled to Lake Ruataniwha in the South Island of New Zealand, and maintained Australia's preeminence with a resounding victory over the Kiwis for the Devonport Trophy.

Team Managers Deserve Acclaim

The work of Team Managers Andrew Guerin (Olympic team), David Taylor (Lightweight and Junior Team), Michael Eastaughffe (Trans Tasman Under-23 Team) and Graeme Boykett (Trans Tasman Junior Team), is a valuable resource for Australian Rowing which is often overlooked.

The Board has worked closely with the "team of managers" this year, and lived with them through their various tribulations as well as the undoubted success, which is the result of their endeavours. Their committed efforts are worthy of thanks in this report.

Immediately following the final selection regatta at Carrum I was advised by the Selectors that a Mens Single Sculler was to be added to the team. He was **Stuart Purvis** and was coached by **Dick Garrard**.

This selection did cause some comment due to the fact that as all the Junior Scullers who had competed at the Nationals had not been given the option to be trialed for selection.

TRAINING IN AUSTRALIA

The Womens Four and Mens Double Scull were Australian Institute of Sport crews and were able to continue their training in Canberra without any disruption to their education.

This was also the case with the Mens Four, Womens Pair and Single Sculler who were all members of the South Australian Institute of Sport and continued their training in Adelaide.

The Mens Sculler was from Geelong and was able to train from there without any disruption. This was also the case with the Mens Pair which trained from Canberra Rowing Club.

The training cycles were broken for both the Mens and Womens sweep crew who formed part of the Australia Crews to compete in the Trans Tasman Regatta in Adelaide.

I will allow the individual coaches comment on this disruption to training surface to say that some of them felt this disruption to training may have had serious consequences to their overall results.

I would recommend that future junior teams competing in the Trans Tasman events should wherever possible be separate to those competing at the World Junior Championships.

BOATS AND OARS

Following a meeting held at Carrum and again at the coaching conference in March it was agreed that all the Junior Crews would use Sykes boats.

The South Australian Institute of Sport and the Australian Institute of Sport were approached by me and both agreed to provide boats and oars free of charge for crews in which their respective members were rowing.

This offer was taken up by me and this left only the Mens Pair and Mens Single Sculler for boats to be arranged.

Negotiations were entered into with **Jeff Sykes and Associates** and suitable arrangements were finalised to lease boats for both crews.

The offer of boats by both Institutes reduced the cost of leasing boats and had a significant impact on reducing the overall costs of this tour.

I was able to travel to Canberra for 1 weekend to observe their training sessions and answer any questions they had about arrangements.

TRANSPORT OF EQUIPMENT

Following the coaches conference at which a decision was made that the Senior A teams would compete at Lucerne it was revealed that the Junior Boats would be unable to share the container which would be leaving Australia from Melbourne the following week.

A second Container was arranged and the boats departed Melbourne for Europe approximately the 25th May, with the remainder of the senior A boats.

It was agreed with **Jeff Sykes** that the Company would complete all arrangements for shipping and arrange for the return of the boats.

TRAVEL

All travel overseas was arranged through Malaysia Airlines. Let me say from the outset that I found the staff of the Airlines more than helpful and they endeavoured to meet all my requests.

The team departed from 2 Ports in Australia, Sydney and Adelaide. To save fares on internal travel all the Adelaide team members departed Adelaide on Saturday 17th July and over-nighted at Kuala Lumpur. All remaining members departed on Sunday 18th July via Melbourne where Stuart Purvis was picked up and taken onto Kuala Lumpur.

At Kuala Lumpur we met up with the Adelaide group and departed for Frankfurt. The trip to Frankfurt was broken half way at Dubi where we had a stop over of about one hour.

On arrival at Frankfurt we transferred to SAS and flew to Copenhagen about one hours flying time from Frankfurt.

ACCOMMODATION / TRAINING / MEALS AT TRAINING CAMP COPENHAGEN

On arrival at Copenhagen we were met by **Morten Esperson** and **Simon Gillett** who had stayed in Europe after Lucerne.

Our only problem to date was that some baggage had gone missing along the way and took nearly three days before it was located.

I was surprised to find on my arrival that **Dick Garrard** who had left three days before the team departed to assist **Simon Gillett** in picking up the boats in Hamberg had not arrived. Subsequent inquiries revealed that he had in fact detoured to the USA to see the World Masters Games and had not bothered to let anyone know.

Morton Esperson had arranged for a trailer to be made available to carry all our luggage and oars together with a number of cars to transport the team to the Danish Rowing Centre at Lake Bagsvard.

On arrival at the rowing centre we proceeded to allocate the accommodation. The ladies were provided with three rooms above the Danish Rowing Centre which all had toilets and bathrooms attached.

The remaining members were housed in the Dormitory at the Rowing Centre. The Coaches and Team Doctor stayed in the rooms upstairs with the remaining male members sharing a Dormitory downstairs.

Barbara and **Simon Gillett** and the boatman **Paul Fitzgerald** stayed at the **Esperson House** which had a self contained living area downstairs.

Whilst the accommodation was a little tight it was quite sufficient for a Junior Team. The team Doctor checked all rooms and was quite satisfied. His only concern expressed to me was that if any illness occurred he would need an additional area to isolate the sick party. This was arranged with **Morten Esperson**, however it was never required.

Arrangements had been completed by our hosts to share the use of the kitchen and eating room and all breakfasts and lunches were taken at the centre. Our evening meals were provided by **Moreton's** wife at their home where she prepared and served all the team with a 2 course hot meal each evening.

As the **Esperson's** were aware of the Australian customs regarding meals the exercise of providing meals went without a hitch. Whatever team members required they got - in fact we were spoilt as we found out later when we arrived in Norway.

Immediately after our arrival a Managers meeting was held with the coaches and **Morton Esperson** was invited to attend where he explained the safety rules.

He had also arranged for four coaching boats to be available to us during our stay and all coaches were able to fit in two sessions per day using the boats they wished. In fact some coaches were able to use boats up to four times each day by arrangement.

The only disappointment with the training camp in Denmark was the weather. Generally it was overcast and raining and the wind was around most days. However for those crews that trained early in the morning were able to get one session in before the wind began to get up.

There was only one day in which the conditions were so bad that the afternoon sessions were cancelled.

On Friday 23rd July the team visited the Tivoli Gardens in the afternoon and had dinner at one of the local restaurants. This outing allowed all the team to relax and offered a valuable break in training.

On Friday morning all crews participated in a 1000 metre time trial in which the various crews were handicapped.

On Thursday 29th July we had our final evening meal at the Esperson's residence. Presentations were made by representatives of the team to both **Morton** and **Helle Esperson**.

All team members spoke very favourably of the manner in which Morton and his wife had insured that their stay in Denmark had been a memorable occasion.

On Friday morning all crews competed in their final time trial before derigging their boats and loading the trailer.

The trailer left about 10.00 a.m. for Norway and arrived there some nine hours later driving through heavy rain for a good part of the trip.

The team left for the airport at 12.30 by taxis and flew from Copenhagen to Oslo on SAS. The flight took a little over one hour.

NORWAY

On arrival at Oslo Airport we were met by officials of the organising committee and taken by bus to the regatta course. This trip was to take one hour but due to peak hour traffic took nearly two and a half hours.

On arrival at the Course dinner was served and we were then driven to our accommodation at Pentagon.

It proved the correct decision to have only one person per room, as on our arrival we found the rooms to be very small. The two rooms that we had two people sharing had only one bed and a mattress on the ground.

All members quickly settled in and a Managers meeting was held to arrange training times and transport matters amongst other things.

The Organising Committee had arranged a bus shuttle service which commenced at 8.00 a.m. and ran every 15 minutes. This service generally ran very well although there were a few hick ups.

All meals from Sunday onwards were in the dining room at the University complex. The standard and quantity of food at times left a little to be desired. However to be fair perhaps we had been spoilt in Denmark and expected a little too much.

Due to the problems with the food I shopped each day and purchased additional food, fruit, milk and fruit juice.

All crews trained two sessions per day and as we had the use of the towing vehicle any crew wishing to train before breakfast was accommodated by running our own shuttle service which worked out very satisfactorily.

I attended the Manager's meeting and Draw which took place on Tuesday. At this meeting it was revealed that entries for the regatta were the largest for any World Junior Championship and in fact only one event the Womens Eight was a straight final. A copy of the entries is attached.

RACING

Wednesday 4th August.

Racing commenced at 10.00 a.m. and the conditions were fair, however there was a strong tail

wind gusting between 15 to 20 knots which made for some very fast racing.

Womens Four

Raced at 10.16 in Heat 1 and had to win the event to proceed direct to the final. As will be seen from the split time they finished second to Romania some five seconds behind.

Mens Four

Raced in Heat 2 in which the first three placings moved to the Semi Finals. This crew had no problems and finished second to Spain only 1.3 seconds behind.

Mens Double Sculls

Had a much harder task as there were 24 starters which meant they had to either win their heat or repechage to proceed to the semi finals. They started in Heat 1 and rowed a very consistent race to record a convincing victory by 1.4 seconds, easing up over the last 100 metres.

Womens Pair

Raced as the wind was strengthening and gusting. The crew rowed a very consistent race and finished second to the Germans by 1.75 seconds, thus being forced to compete in the repechage.

Mens Pair

Had twenty starters with our crew rowing in Heat 3. Unfortunately the Pair had a very poor row and finished in fourth place some 8.0 seconds behind the winning German crew.

Mens Sculler

Stuart Purvis drew Heat 3 of four heats and had to win to progress to the semi final. This was a tall order as he was racing competitors who were much bigger than himself. However he rose to the occasion and won his heat in the fast time of 7.08.49 beating a strong field.

Womens Sculler

Sally Newmarch drew the German sculler Katlia Rutchow in her heat and finished second by 8.23 seconds to advance to the semi finals.

Thursday 5th August - Day 2 - Repechage

Australia had only three crews competing as the remaining crews had progressed to the semi-finals. The wind was still following but not as strong as the previous day.

Womens Four

This was our first event in which our crew had to finish in the first four places to advance to the final. As you will note from the results our crew held second place after 500 metres, third place after 1000 metres and faded to finish fourth some 11.8 seconds behind the winner USA. It was evident that they would have to improve to be amongst the medals.

Womens Pair

This crew had no trouble in winning their event in the time of 7.29.74 some 5.4 seconds ahead

of Greece thus advancing to the final.

Mens Pair

This was our last race for the day and Australia had to finish in the first two places to advance to the Semi. This crew rowed a brilliant race to finish in the smart time of 6.49.6 to give promise for better things to come.

Friday 6th August - Day 3 - Semi Finals

Five Australian crews competed this day with the wind at last moderating, however it now swung around to be a head wind gusting at between 5 to 15 knots.

Mens Four

In this event Australia drew Great Britain and Italy. The crew had a comfortable race and finished second some 1.47 seconds behind Great Britain but appeared to be comfortable.

Mens Double Scull

This crew drew the favourites Germany and were hopeful of keeping them honest. However as seen by the results finished third some 8.6 seconds behind Germany and only 0.5 seconds behind France.

Mens Pair

This crew also drew the favourites Germany and rowed a satisfactory race to finish second some 5.5 seconds behind Germany.

Womens Single Scull

Sally Newmarch was drawn in Heat 2 in this event. Sally had no problems leading from the start to finish to win in a time of 9.15.7, some 2 seconds ahead of Switzerland.

Mens Single Sculls

Stuart Purvis competed in Heat 2.

He had drawn Fredric Bekken from Norway but raced courageously to be placed 3rd in his heat in the time of 8.17.59. This was an exceptional row as Stuart is only a Lightweight Sculler and was racing into a head wind which certainly favoured the Norwegian competitor.

Thus Australia had all seven crews in the finals. Australia was the only country to have all crews through to the finals although Germany also had 13 crews in the 14 finals.

Saturday 7th August - Final Day.

The weather for the finals was fine with almost dead conditions. At times there was a very slight head wind.

Womens Four

This crew was never in the race. They raced in 5th and 6th position and eventually finished in 6th place some 28 seconds behind the winners. For some unknown reason to me this crew became

slower the longer we were away.

Mens Four

This crew had changed the seating for the final and gave an excellent account of themselves. They were first through each 500, 1000 but at approximately at the 1200 mark fell into a hole to finish some 12 seconds behind the winner. Perhaps a little more hard racing would have been a benefit to them.

Mens Double Scull

This crew had race consistency all season and were confident that they would be able to put it to the favourites, Germany.

As can be seen they were only 1 second behind Germany after 500, 3.5 seconds behind after 1000 and 5.6 seconds after 1500 to finish 3rd in the time of 6.42.8. Austria finished 2nd and only rowed through Australia in the last 50 metres. However this was our first medal of the Championship and a great achievement.

Womens Pair

This crew was considered by many to be our best chance in winning a gold medal and this proved to be the case.

From the start the crew showed that they meant business. After the first 500 metres they were level with the German crew who were considered to be their main opposition.

From this point onwards they showed their class and led through the remainder of the race to achieve a convincing victory in the time of 7.35.7 from Romania with Germany in third place.

This was our first gold medal and was a tribute to the crew and their coach Simon Gillett.

Mens Pair

This crew had showed in the lead up races that they were capable of victory if they raced consistently.

A problem with them through the training camp at Norway was their inconsistency. One day they looked a million dollars, the next they were all over the place.

In their race they again had a very average first 500 and were placed 4th at the 500 metre mark. From there they moved into 3rd place but again fell back into 4th which remained unchanged at the finish. Their time of 6.54 was only 6 seconds behind the winning German crew which won in the time of 6.48.

Womens Single Scull

It was apparent from the semi finals that the German Sculler would be difficult to defeat from the start. Both the German and the Australian Sculler led after 500 with Sally Newmarch second some 2 seconds behind the German sculler.

From this point on the leading sculler continued to increase her lead eventually crossing the line to achieve victory in the smart time of 7.42.6 some sixteen seconds ahead of the Australian

This result gave Sally a much deserved Silver Medal with a time of 7.58.8.

Mens Single Scull

The job was made difficult for our sculler Stuart Purvis due to the conditions not being

following.

However one cannot but admire his determination in competing against athletes with much more experience. He was by far the lightest of all finalists.

After 500 metres the Australian sculler held third position some 2.2 seconds behind the leader Italy.

After 1000 metres the Norwegian sculler had taken the lead, however Stuart was still holding third position some 5.2 seconds behind.

At the 1500 metre mark the Norwegian sculler still led from Italy with Australia still in third position some 5.7 seconds behind.

However the effort of the first 1500 had taken its toll on Stuart and he finished fourth some 7.3 seconds behind the winner and only 4 seconds behind the Bronze Medal winner. His effort was truly remarkable considering his size and the number of crews in his event.

The final results were then - 1 Gold, 1 Silver, 1 Bronze, three 4th places and one 6th place which was a commendable result.

Medical

This report would not be complete without comment on the efforts by the team doctor David Coles.

David made himself available to all athletes and coaches and I understand that he carried out Consultations on most of the team throughout the tour.

The support and assistance given to me by him was much appreciated and made the job of managing the team much easier.

Conclusion

I wish to take this opportunity to thank a number of people who made the management of this team run so smoothly.

Firstly to each of the competitors and coaches I want to complement them on their manner in which they co-operated and competed at the Championship. I am sure that you would agree that the results speak for themselves.

I wish to thank **Doctor David Coles** and our boatman **Paul Fitzgerald** for and their efforts in ensuring that the health of the team was looked after and that all our equipment was in excellent order

Lastly I wish to thank the Council for giving me the opportunity of managing the group of athletes and coaches who I believe performed in a creditable manner.

I have enclosed with this report copies of all daily result sheets showing the sectional times together with a list of rigging surveys which were conducted at the Championships. Also enclosed is a list of all competing Nations together with the competing crews in individual events.

Equipment and Uniform

Most of these athletes were also selected in the World Junior Team and accordingly there was much pressure to keep the budget to an absolute minimum. It was possible to make savings in the areas of equipment hire - the South Australian Sports Institute loaned boats and oars to the WJ2X, MJ2X and W4- at no charge. An eight was hired from St Peter's College, South Australia. Team members received a basic uniform consisting of track suit, racing zoot-suit and long sleeve training top. For this regatta series this amount of clothing was adequate.

Travel

Athletes from the AIS and the ACT travelled to Adelaide by bus which was the cheapest mode of transport. The AIS bus also meant that there was an extra vehicle for moving the team from the accommodation to the course and return.

Two 12 seater buses were also loaned to the team by SASI at no charge.

Accommodation and Meals

Accommodation was at the AIS Del Monte at Henley Beach. A great location on the water-front and five minutes drive from West Lakes. The building has recently been refurbished and was of a high standard. There were recreational facilities ie. TV, table tennis, pool table, and this area

was designed to hold large groups.

The preparation of meals has recently been contracted out to a catering company and they do not yet fully understand the requirements of athletes. However, the management and nutritionalists from the Canberra AIS have been working to improve this standard and on the whole the meals were satisfactory.

Racing

Adelaide turned on beautiful weather and the conditions on the West Lakes course were very good. Australia's crews had mixed results.

Women's Double Scull The combination of Kate and Erica was successful. They were a strong crew that won their event by very large margins on all three days of racing.

Men's Double Scull Ralph and Robert were also a strong combination and their work together throughout the season was clearly visible. They won all their races convincingly.

Women's Coxless Four Due to a recent tonsillectomy, Esther Palmer was unable to take her place in the crew and was replaced by Linda Laurencic of South Australia. Accordingly the crew showed signs of disruption and were outclassed on all days by the New Zealand Number 1 crew. The New Zealand Number 2 crew also beat Australia in two of the races.

Men' Eight This crew seemed to lack the final polish and were defeated on all three days of racing. Perhaps more time together would have overcome this situation. Although for Juniors this is not always possible. Australia is normally represented in this event by a school crew who have had a season together. I do not wish to take anything away from the New Zealand crew who were of a very high quality.

Women's Eight (Unofficial event) A combined AIS/SASI crew was entered but was not able to defeat the impressive New Zealand crew.

Full credit should go to New Zealand for fielding an excellent team. Due to the consistent results of two wins and two losses for each side, each day, the Series was a draw.

Medical

Doctor Geoff Graham was the team medico and was required to treat athletes on several occasions. There were no serious problems.

I would like to acknowledge those people who assisted myself and the team throughout the Series: Barbara Gillett, Simon Gillett and Steve Evans for their co-operation and support, SASI for the loan of equipment, St Peter's College for making their eight available, those families who billeted interstate team members during the training period, SA Rowing Association, Michael Eastaughffe and the ARC for entrusting me with the management of this team. I look forward to becoming more involved with Australian team management in the future.

1993 Australian Rowing Championships

It is with great pleasure that Rowing Queensland Inc. presents their report to the Australian Rowing Council with recommendations for future holding of this prestigious event.

The King's Cup regatta and National titles has been hailed by all State Rowing Associations and World Officials as being one of the best National events held for some years.

The letter received from the Victorian Rowing Association sums up the feelings of all State Associations:-

"Our congratulations to your Organising Committee on the most successful conduct of the Australian Championships held recently at Lake Wivenhoe. All members who were at Lake Wivenhoe, either competitors, officials or spectators, returned with glowing reports of a great regatta conducted in the Queensland sunshine" Bill Waterfield, Victorian Rowing Association.

Improvements of the Wivenhoe Course have certainly made the venue more comfortable for those watching rowing events. The weather during the titles was perfect with little wind to upset those attending.

It is the intention to gradually improve all facilities at Wivenhoe to engender this locality as the centre of rowing in Brisbane.

The regatta ran at a profit with final figures showing a \$16,000 excess over expenses.

Publicity for the King's Cup was difficult to obtain through normal television and press outlets.

Rowing Queensland employed the services of a Public Relations Company to try and improve our chances of additional press publicity through these outlets however it is difficult to gauge how effective this medium was. We were happy with the press coverage we received however a certain amount of this was gained by our own correspondents.

Rowing Queensland had 2000 full colour posters printed and these were placed in shop windows in Brisbane, Ipswich and surrounding townships near Wivenhoe. We also had 15,000 "B5" copies of the same poster printed and these were enclosed in the local newspaper distributed widely around the Brisbane Valley.

Programmes accounted for a large loss to Rowing Queensland with few athletes purchasing a copy. We had 2000 printed and have at least 600 left over. We recommend that future associations print a maximum of 1500.

The phone bank was widely used by athletes and spectators alike with Telecom registering 1856 phone calls during the event.

In regards to Caterers we recommend that there is no need to have an early morning service for breakfast during the lead up training days. This service was not supported at this time. The only days required for breakfast catering is the competition days, Wednesday to Sunday.

The internal closed circuit Television coverage of races was very well received and we recommend that a future regattas this type of service be provided. The organisation Rowing Queensland used would be happy to advise future organising committees and provide a quotation for their service. Rowing Queensland would be happy to endorse this organisation.

The timing procedure used to give all crews their time splits was very popular and we recommend that this be included at all future King's Cup regattas.

Though probably our fault for not providing more editorial matter to the Australian Rowing Magazine about the King's Cup we were very disappointed that more coverage in the way of stories did not appear in this magazine. It was maybe wrongly assumed that because of the importance of this event that reporters (from this magazine) would have been on hand to promote our most important National event. We recommend that better communication be put in place with all concerned editors, reporters, photographers so that rowing in Australia can maximise promotional opportunities.

In summary we believe the event was very successful and look forward to six years time when we can again run the King's Cup and National Regatta.

Federation Internationale des Societies d'Aviron

Australian Rowing continues to support F.I.S.A. in many facets. Apart from fielding numerical and successful teams in the World Senior and Junior competitions and obtaining a world No. 2 ranking this year, we have continued to take a positive interest at Congress level (Reg McKay, David Schier and Tony Brown); provided members of Commissions (Bill Webb - Medical Commission, and Peter Antonie - Athletes Commission); conducted the first round of the 1993 F.I.S.A. World Cup at the Australian Henley Regatta in February 1993; supplied a member of the July (Jim Harvey) for the F.I.S.A. World Junior Championships at Aarungen; and maintained a close communication and reporting service throughout the year.



F.I.S.A. Continental Representative

Former A.R.C. President John Coates has now held this position for twelve months, and has continued the good work of Don Rowlands (New Zealand), his predecessor. John has kept up to date with Australian and New Zealand Rowing, and attended all of the statutory meetings and congresses of F.I.S.A., as well as appearing at major Australian and international regattas. We are fortunate that John is able to continue with his valuable contributions to Rowing through his F.I.S.A. office.

South East Asia Development Program

F.I.S.A. enlisted the assistance of the A.R.C. to become directly involved in this project, which aims to enhance and expand rowing in the S.E.A. region.

Although enabling funds are very limited, Matt Smith (F.I.S.A. Development Officer) has made a start and some progress has been achieved.

Of direct assistance has been a visit by a group of Indonesian rowing coaches to Australia, under the sponsorship of the A.S.C./A.I.S., programs and facilities. A.R.C.'s N.D.C.E. Doug White assisted with this program.

David Schier is the F.I.S.A. appointee to service and monitor this overall regional development plan.

Extraordinary Congress of F.I.S.A.

Budapest - January 1993

One of the most important meetings of recent years was convened to debate and decide upon the admission of the lightweight category to the Olympic Games.

The subject was extensively analysed in advance throughout the rowing world, with innumerable papers and formulae being proposed.

The A.R.C. decided to support the inclusion of lightweight events, and when put to the vote the motion was carried by a single vote, as follows:

Deletion of M4+, M2+ and W2-
Inclusion of ML4-, ML2X and WL2X

The actual voting details were as follows (two thirds majority required):

55 Federations attending and entitled to vote
121 combined votes eligible
81 in favour
40 against

Subsequently, F.I.S.A. put the proposal to the I.O.C., who adopted the new Olympic rowing program, effective at Atlanta 1996.

Several other matters were discussed including:

Recognition of rowing confederation (such as the Commonwealth Rowing Association)

Deletion of distinction between "ordinary" and "extraordinary" membership of F.I.S.A.; however the present voting strengths will remain

Veteran rowing will now be designated Master rowing

Definition of rowing to now include "rowing on a machine or in a tank"

Addition of ML2- in the World Championship program was adopted

Various amendments to regatta procedures, definitions of courses, sponsorship matters, refinement of doping controls and exclusivity of marketing rights for F.I.S.A.

A comprehensive report of the Congress was widely issued by delegate David Schier.

Australian Sports Commission and Australian Institute of Sport

The year under review has seen a continuance of close liaison between the A.R.C. and our principal sponsors.

The development of the draft Partnership Agreement, and an examination of the capability of the A.R.C. to undertake the more independent responsibilities involved, required a long series of meetings at Canberra with the senior echelon of both A.S.C. and A.I.S.. This will come to fruition in the second half of 1993 when the formal execution of the Agreement will occur. The effect of the new relationship will be that the A.R.C. will obtain a relaxation of detailed financial control by the A.S.C., whilst still being responsible for distribution of Grants as allocated in funding blocks for portfolio purposes. To monitor this new process, a Management Committee will work closely with the Board on a monitor and advisory basis.

The Management Efficiency Review which the Board agreed to cooperate with in the second half of 1992, has been completed, but no draft has yet been received. This objective independent review will be of interest, and may allow the Board to fine tune systems or directions.

With the conclusion of the STEP Grants (which were not paid for results in the 1992 International regattas), the new Australian Athletes' Scholarship Scheme (A.A.S.S.) was created by the A.S.C. and required much deliberation and consultation by the Board to model it to best advantage for Rowing as an alternative for the previous STEP scheme. With agreement of the A.S.C., and excellent system of part direct payment, and part funds relayed to A.R.C. to meet athletes' international competition costs, was agreed. Now that this scheme has been in place for a season, it is expected to flow very smoothly from now on. As with STEP, it is predicated on results, with crews making the Finals of the World Championships, earning the A.A.S.S. for the following calendar year competition, the A.A.S.S. can be transferred to another member of the following year's team.

During the past few months, many meetings have been held with A.I.S. Executive Director Rob de Castella on the subjects of Lightweight Scholarship at the A.I.S. Rowing Unit, and the matter of Head Coach for the A.R.C.. Both matters are in the process of finalisation.

Australian Rowing is extremely fortunate that we have the strong support and confidence of both the A.S.C. and A.I.S.. Without the financial support it is certain we would not be able to field all of our best eligible athletes at the International level. Additionally, the comprehensive resources, and ready availability of advice and information from all senior Officers at both A.S.C. and A.I.S., is of critical importance in the conduct of our sport, and to A.S.C. Executive Director Jim Ferguson, A.I.S. Executive Director Rob de Castella, our Liaison Officer Neil Richardson, and the numerous heads of departments and staff who have assisted Australian Rowing throughout the year, we express sincere appreciation.

Once again this year, boats racing for Australia at the World Championships, have been named in honour of the A.S.C. and A.I.S..

Within this section, it would be remiss if we did not extend sincere appreciation to The Minister for Sport, Hon. Ros Kelly MP, who continues to take a personal interest in Rowing, subscribing messages of congratulations to our athletes, and at Banyoles making several visits to the Olympic regatta to cheer on our crews.

PRELIMINARY REPORT ON THE PERFORMANCES of the AUSTRALIAN TEAM at the XXV OLYMPIAD

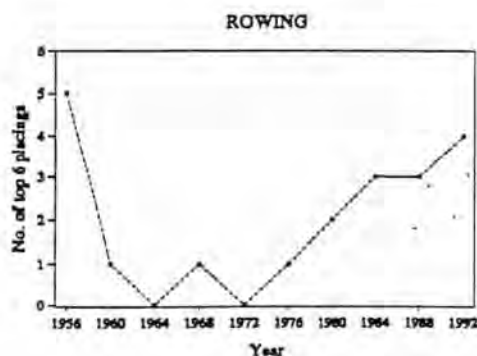
Barcelona, July-August 1992

Rowing (28 athletes / 7 officials)

Seoul 1988: three boats in finals
Barcelona: two gold and four finalists

The results were the best in the history of the Olympic Rowing team, which brought home two gold medals and had two more teams in the finals. The World Championship mens coxless four (the "oarsome foursome") successfully defended their title and won gold. Likewise the mens double scull of Peter Antonie and Stephen Hawkins, also won gold undefeated. It is 44 years since Australia has won a gold medal at an Olympic regatta and the first time we have

won more than one gold. Our young mens eight and womens four crews, with average ages of 22 and 21 respectively, came fifth and sixth in very competitive finals. The eight's result is a significant improvement on their tenth placing at last years World Championships, and the womens result betters last years placing by two. The womens double crew finished eighth overall following their second place in the B final and the mens quad scull finished ninth.



Annual Report for the A.I.S. Rowing Program

The primary function of the Australian Institute of Sport Rowing Program was its positive and direct support of the Australian Olympic rowing team. The Olympic Games were the culmination of four years work at the A.I.S., with 90% of the representatives being or have been A.I.S. scholarship holders. This was done with hard work, long hours, commitment and dedication.

Results from the 1992 Barcelona Olympic being the best in the history of the Australian Olympic Rowing Team, bringing home two gold medals and three more top-eight placings. It is 44 years since Australia has won a gold medal at an Olympic Games and the first time we have won more than one.

Australia's 1990/91 World Championship Men's Coxless Four comprising James Tomkins, Mike McKay, Andrew Cooper, previous A.I.S. scholarship holders and Nick Green successfully defended their title and won gold. The "Oarsome Foursome" were associate scholarship holders prior to the Olympics. Likewise, our Mens Double Scull of Peter Antonie and Stephen Hawkins, both of whom are former lightweight competitors were financially supported by the A.I.S., and also won gold.

Four of our 1991/92 A.I.S. Scholarship holders, Nick McDonald-Crowley, Robert Scott, Simon Spriggs and Jaime Fernandez, were in the Men's Eight squad and four of the members of the Women's Four squad, Kate Slatter, Megan Still, Jodie Dobson and Andrea Coss were 1991/92 scholarship holders and the fifth member, Emy Snook a 1992/93 scholarship holder. The average age of these two squads were twenty-two and twenty-one respectively and the crews came fifth and sixth in very competitive finals. The Men's Eight result is a significant improvement on their tenth placing at last year's World Championships, and the Women's Four result betters last year's placing by two.

The Women's Double Scull crew, Jenny Luff and Gillian Campbell of the A.I.S. finished eighth overall with their second place in the B final. Our Men's Quad Scull, with Jason Day and Richard Powell as current scholarship holders and Hamish McGlashan as former scholarship holders, finished ninth. The only other time Australia has had five top-eight crews in an Olympics was at the Melbourne Games in 1956.

The World Junior Championships at Montreal in August also saw the results of hard work in Australia. A.I.S. scholarship holders David Cameron and Duncan Ashby coached by Steve Evans won Silver in the Men's Coxless Pair.

The long-term goal of the Australian Institute of Sport Rowing Program is to contribute to the development of World Championship and Olympic competitors.

To meet these goals we have;

- A. Identified;
Developed;
and Promoted our elite potential.

1. The identification stage was first started with:



a. Scholarship Applications

There were more than 135 applications for scholarships this year, easily surpassing last years previous highest of 41. (The figure of 135 does not include the 180 juniors who applied for the Development Camps, from which Steve Evans selected the basis of his junior squad for 1993.)

These figures are so high partly due to Australia's success at the Olympics, and partly due to the communication advantages of having a rowing-based Administration Officer.

Scholarships were better advertised this year and carried a national endorsement by the Australian Rowing Council, as an outcome of the A.I.S. Rowing Symposium.

b. Rowing Development Camps

These three camps were conducted over consecutive weeks with attendees coming from Queensland, New South Wales, A.C.T., Victorian, South Australian and Tasmanian schools with rowing programs. Both the Headmaster and Rowing Master's at these schools were contacted about the project and they forwarded application forms to prospective attendees.

Although only two camps has originally been proposed, this had to be extended to three due to the overwhelming number of applicants; some 180. A total of forty schools had applicants, from which thirty three schools were represented.

"Campers" undertook medical and physiological testing, on-water instruction and analysis and several lectures on the theoretical basis of rowing. These included sessions on the biomechanical and physiological aspects of the rowing technique and its demands.

Reaction to the camps from attendees, parents and schools were all very positive, with letters of thanks having been received from all of those parties.

c. Scholarship Selection Trials

Some 45 Athletes were considered for the 30 Scholarships on offer. All of these athletes were medically screened and undertook ergometer based physiological and bio-mechanical assessment, as well as on-water trialing.

With the exception of the juniors and a few of the senior athletes who had study commitments, athletes commenced their scholarships immediately following the trials on November 2. Their scholarships will be assessed following national selection and if progress is satisfactory, their scholarships will be extended until the athletes have fulfilled their national commitments.

2. The **development** stage is the approach and instruction by a highly skilled coach with a plan aiming towards a strong domestic base with representatives of the A.I.S. in national crews for the World Championships. The good results achieved by A.I.S. crews at the N.S.W. State Championships, Victorian State Championships, Balmain/UTS Haberfield Regatta, First Selection Regatta, N.S.W. State Junior Championships and the National Rowing Championships shows this preparation is working.

In supporting the National Team an additional three scholarships were created to assist Marina Hatzakis, Courtney Johnstone and Gina Douglas prepare for the World Championships.

B. Education

Thirty scholarships were issued for the 1992/93 fiscal year, and our aim was to have all scholarship holders gainfully employed or in an academic environment. The majority of scholarship holders undertook tertiary study at several of Canberra's universities and colleges. All of the athletes not studying were working. Many were employed as Athlete Trainees with the A.I.S. or Australian Sports Commission.

C. Coach Development

1. Scholarship Coach

The position, as was the case this year, will be for a full twelve-month period. This enables the successful applicant to fulfil their professional development/study commitments and also gives the program a greater degree of flexibility with the commitments of our personnel.

Damon Stokes' scholarship was extended until 30th November 1992 which enabled him to complete his diploma in coaching education with the Australian Coaching Council.

The scholarship coach for 1993 is Pam Westerdorf from Victoria. Pam was an Olympian in 1980 and has been coaching for a number of years.

2. The Rowing Program aims to develop its coach's knowledge and exposure to the national and international rowing community.

All A.I.S. rowing coaches were part of the Australian Olympic Team in Barcelona and have been selected to coach National Teams in the international season of 1993.

Seminars and coaches meetings are an integral part of the continued professional development of our coaches. Discussion with presenters and other coaches develops both general and sport-specific ideas about new, alternative and developing coaching methods.

The National Coaches Conferences are held at the A.I.S. for all coaches for national crews. At the meeting in November the performances of all crews competing in Barcelona were analysed and at the meeting in May discussion was based upon the preparation of crews for the 1993 international season.

- D. The A.I.S. continue developments in the areas of sports science and sports medicine to improve coaching methods and remain progressive in training methodology by sponsoring programs such as:

HEAT ACCLIMATISATION

The heat acclimatisation study is progressing very well with a high level of support from, and liaison with, the Australian Rowing Council. The study focuses on the effects of training in the heat, and conducting training camps for heat acclimatisation before travelling overseas.

Dr Allan Hahn is the driving force behind the project. Dr Hahn works in consultation with the Institute's rowing coaches who are expected to play a major part in the project at the implementation stage. Dr Dennis Hatcher, a member of the A.R.C. Selection Commission, is co-ordinating the necessary support from the A.R.C..

Two groups of rowers who were very close to national selection are being used for the study. One group will be based in Katherine, Northern Territory, and the other will be based in Lake Barrington, Tasmania.

This study came about as part of the rowing program's next four year plan which is centred around preparation for the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta. These Games will also be held in hot conditions such as those experienced in Barcelona.

The Katherine area was the most suitable site for such an exercise, with a long, narrow stretch of rowable water in the Katherine Gorge and cheap, first-class facilities at the nearby Tindal Air Force base.

Lake Barrington is without doubt Australia's premier rowing venue with facilities on course and the climate suitable for the testing.

Australian Olympic Committee

The tremendous support provided for Australian Rowing during the terms of the "cooperation agreement" between A.O.C. and A.S.C. leading to the Barcelona Olympics in 1992, has been continued on a direct basis for our 1993 team of elite athletes by financial support under the new A.O.C. Grants Scheme, which supplies annual grants to Olympic class crews based on results. With Lightweights entering the Olympic arena in 1996, the A.O.C. has generously included them in the funding from 1993 onwards.

It was an honour for the A.R.C. to nominate John Coates as President of the A.O.C. for the next four years, and we wish him well with his efforts.

Considerable liaison has continued between the A.R.C. and A.O.C., especially via Craig McLatchey (Sport), Adrian Scarra (Finance), Phil Coles (I.O.C.), Alan Grover (Marketing), and Perry Crosswhite (Administration). Their joint assistance has been very valuable, and we look forward to playing a successful role again in 1996.

A much appreciated gesture by the A.O.C. following Barcelona, was to donate to the A.R.C. the three racing shells which had been provided from their Equipment Fund during the previous Olympiad. It was appropriate both last year and this, that the A.O.C. and President John Coates, were both named on our racing shells at the Olympic and World level.

Rowing is proud to have triple Olympian Dr. Sam Patten as a member of the A.O.C. Athletes' Commission in the knowledge he can contribute greatly to the advancement of conditions and services for the active Olympic athletes. His term is for four years.



Commonwealth Rowing Association

Further meetings of this organisation, of which the A.R.C. is a member, has determined in conjunction with the Organising Committee of the 1994 Commonwealth Games, that a Commonwealth Regatta will be held at Elk Lake, Victoria B.C. as a prelude to the actual Commonwealth Games. The regatta is not an official component sport, but will enjoy the sanction of the Organising Committee. Athletes will use the Games accommodation and facilities. This should prove a very high-standard regatta, with three of the top four world-ranked nations in action - Australia, Canada and Great Britain. A decision as to how this regatta will fit into the 1994 tour will be considered shortly by the soon-to-be-empanelled Overseas Tours Committee of the A.R.C.,

The current A.R.C. Census reveals that the sport of rowing is making rapid numerical advancement for a specialist sport.

The aggregate statistics for the past three years are as follows:-

1992/93	28,619	(Olympic double gold; World ranking second)

It is pleasing that the reduction in elite athletes which occurred after the 1990 World Championships, has reversed this year.

The Junior ranks (principally school rowers) has again risen, with a 12.4% growth, following the huge jump in 1991/92.

This augers well for our future.

Rowing Medical Network Conference

This inaugural meeting of the newly-formed Rowing Medical Network, was held in Melbourne in May 1993 under the direction of the Principal Medical Officer.

It proved a very important opportunity to tune the Rowing Medical Network towards active participation at the State, National and International level, as well as approach specific medical matters and plan forward research and activity.

The conference was funded by a Grant from the A.S.C., which was greatly appreciated.

National Sports Research Centre

N.D.E.C. Doug White has contributed to the updating of the Rowing subjects which are either under research or available for suitable applicants. Much valuable information has and will continue to result for this valuable department of the A.S.C..

Australian Sports Drug Agency

The Board continues to work very closely with this organisation. There were 93 tests undertaken this year at both competition regattas, and random out-of-competition.

All results are circulated to F.I.S.A. and the A.R.C.
Principal Medical Officer.

The Board intends to become more involved in contact with A.S.D.A. this coming year, with the intent of obtaining information which can be circulated to all athletes, coaches and clubs throughout Australia, so ensure the entire fraternity is aware of prohibited substances, penalties and testing systems.

Presentation Oars to Champions

In both 1991 and 1992, Australia scooped several Olympic and World Championships.

In recognition of these ultimate results, the A.R.C. agreed to meet the cost of presentation oars suitably inscribed, for every athlete and coach who won a World or Olympic Championship, and this fine gesture by the State Associations was very much appreciated by the athletes and coaches concerned.

M.L.C. Scholarships

Once again, Australian Rowing provided a large number of qualified applicants. Unfortunately none were selected for 1993. It is pleasing to report however, that 3 scholarships have been awarded for 1993/94 to the following single scullers (who are the only eligible athletes, since the regulations preclude teams or crews):

World Student Games, St Catherines, Canada

Although not an official Australian Team, a well-trained squad of rowers participated in the 1993 Universiad Rowing Regatta, and achieved the best-ever results, with bronze medals being won by the Womens Coxless Four and Womens Lightweight Pair. These were the first University Games rowing medals earned by Australian crews.

The selection of the crews was assisted by the A.R.C. Selection Commission who acted in an advisory role.

1994 World Masters Games - Rowing

At very short notice, Brisbane bid for and was awarded the 3rd World Masters Games.

An enthusiastic committee of Queensland Rowing Incorporated has developed the outline of a very worthy regatta which will be held at Lake Wivenhoe in October 1994.

This is the only veteran regatta where a bona fide World Championship can be won by the master oarsman and woman.

Australians have featured prominently in the previous two World Masters Games Rowing, held in 1985 in Canada, and 1989 in Scandinavia, winning many World titles.

The only negative point involves the 1994 F.I.S.A. Masters Regatta in Holland, which will be held just a few days before the Brisbane event.

Whilst possibly limiting the number of European competitors, the organisers are nevertheless expecting strong support from New Zealand, U.S.A. and Canada, South Africa, Asia and of course Australia.

The regatta is sanctioned by F.I.S.A., under whose Rules it will be conducted.

1997 F.I.S.A. Masters Regatta Bid



In line with the objective in the A.R.C. Development Plan, to bid for a future F.I.S.A. Masters Regatta, Council accepted bids last year which resulted in this proposal being offered to S.A.R.A. and West Lakes course.

A very enthusiastic bid committee has now brought the project to the stage of bidding to the F.I.S.A. Masters Commission, which will be heard on September 23rd 1993.

The Board has been working closely alongside the S.A.R.A. bid committee, and believes our lobby to date will bear fruit.

If successful, this will bring to reality the largest regatta ever held in Australia, with at least 2,000 competitors.

Merchandising

An initiative of the Executive Board in 1991, to design and market a Greetings Card, was followed in 1992 by a second card series. In 1992 the Board supported the idea of the Administration Officer to produce a full colour calendar which depicted all of Australia's gold medalist crews, plus other outstanding performers. These two merchandising projects, whilst making modest profits, nevertheless open a door for the future potential to merchandise other desirable rowing-related products to our fraternity and the public at large.

Sydney 2000

The past two years has seen a remarkable effort by the Committee, headed by Rod McGeoch and substantially by John Coates, to provide Sydney with maximum prospect of being given the 2000 Olympic Games when the vote is taken on 23rd September 1993.

The A.R.C. has been working closely with F.I.S.A. and the Sydney 2000 Committee, to prepare a strategic plan for the Rowing Regatta of the 2000 Olympic Games, including the preparation of the new international rowing course at Penrith Lakes.

This facility will be one of the most modern and functional rowing courses in the world, and the sport in Australia is indeed fortunate that regardless of the result of the Sydney bid, the Penrith Lakes course will be completed and available for competition rowing from the year 1995.

We await the decision with interest; if successful, Australian rowing will move into an accelerated mode of development. A comprehensive "project 2000" T.I.P. campaign will aim to produce a squad of rowers capable of medal-winning performances at the Sydney Olympic Games. The A.R.C. National Plan will be re-written to include many components which assist this ambition. The sport of rowing will focus specifically towards the year 2000 and the 21st Century. The prospect of the Sydney Olympic Games is very exciting, and will be a catalyst to higher ambitions and aims far in excess of anything attempted previously by the sport.



Report of the National Director Coaching Education

September 11 marks 5 months to the day since I took up the position as Director of Coaching Education. The period from April 13 when I commenced my duties, to June 30 was extremely busy with orientation to Australian Rowing and settling into life in Melbourne.

Orientation

The first two weeks in the office included meeting the ARC Board and being introduced to the organisation and procedures of the Council. I was able to review some of the past NDCE files. The selection regatta at Carrum provided the opportunity to meet many of the Australian coaches, State Coaching Directors, Selection Committee members and some Council members.

During the following weeks I travelled to each state to meet with the State Coaching Directors, Councillors and state rowing organisation staff. I attended Level I courses in Perth and Brisbane and stopped in at Adelaide and Sydney during those trips. I flew to Tasmania to meet with Sam Carrol and coaches on the north and south part of the state. On a trip to Canberra I had extensive meetings with Paul Thompson, former NDCE, and reviewed the files he had in his possession. At the same time, I toured the AIS facilities and had meetings with Reinhold Batschi then Australian Team Head Coach.

On these trips I had individual meetings with the state coaching directors to get their views on the coaching education system, discuss the training centres, tour their sports complexes and where possible meet with the TIP coaches. I have been able to observe several national crews with their coaches, specifically, the Senior A and B 8s, Lightweight men's 4x, Men's 4+ and Lightweight women's 4-. On my trip through Adelaide I took the opportunity to watch the first day of the Junior Trans-Tasman races.

While I was in Canberra, I arranged to meet with the Australian Coaching Council, Australian Sports Commission and AIS departments, Professional and Technical Services, Elite Sports, National Sports Research Centre.

I attended two conferences while staying in Canberra. The National Coaches Conferences, where the planning for the international competitive season took place and several presentations by coaches and sports scientists were made. This was very good as it gave me the opportunity to meet the national coaches, discuss their opinions on the state of coaching education and to meet several of the sports scientists and AIS staff.

Second, the National Coaching Directors Conference, at which coaching educators from Australian sporting organisations and State Coaching Centre Representatives were in attendance. This workshop, organised by the Australian Coaching Council, featured sessions on strategic planning for sport organisations, a review of the National Coach/Athlete Database computer system, Review of the coaching accreditation/updating, Coaching Practice-ideas for implementation, Open Learning and professional development workshops for. This conference provided the chance to mix with the coaching educators from all sport organisations in Australia. I feel I made some very valuable contacts that I feel could be used to provide assistance based on their own sports experience.

Coaching Education

There has been very good national work done regarding coaching education, however this varies from state to state. The acting NDCE (Paul Thomson) left a good framework from which

to work. However there is very little in the files that can be used for updating the education courses. There is much work to be done to bring the courses up to a high level that will be accepted by the ACC and to ensure the course material is consistent state to state. The course outlines were submitted to the ACC for approval by Paul Thompson, however were never approved. This fact has allowed me to revisit the outlines, forward copies to the State Directors for their input and revise them accordingly. Subsequently, I met with the ACC and reviewed Levels O, I, II and the Updating Policy. At present, I am rewriting the documents to meet the ACC requirements for approval.

The instructors kits for each level are non-existent for the new courses and anything there is out of date. Several of the State Directors have assembled very good material for use in their courses. It is my intention to use the expertise and knowledge of the State Directors to develop updated instructors kits. I have been collecting material for the kits and when the course outlines are approved my main task will be to assemble and consolidate the kits.

Since my arrival three Level I courses have been completed in Victoria, Queensland and Western Australia and Level IIs in Queensland and Victoria. NSW, Tasmania and WA have Level II courses scheduled for November. NSW has recently completed a Level I and Queensland has 4 courses scheduled for August and September. South Australia is the only state that has no courses in the works at this time.

I have reported to the Board it is my intention to have the course outlines for Level 0,1, and 2 approved by the Australian Coaching Council by October/November 1993 and to have instructors kits completed by April 1994. This time line has been agreed to by the ACC and from their perspective these are realistic goals. I am currently assembling material to be included in the kits and I am working on an approach for Level 3. I will be working towards reaching approval for Level 3, hopefully by June 1994. The C.E.O. and I have discussed with the A.C.C. the possibility of several current National coaches receiving Level 3 accreditation. I will be pursuing this with the ACC in future meetings.

I have asked the State Directors to provide me with coaches names who have taken Level II and have not received proper accreditation. As the information is provided, I will attempt to find out why they were not accredited and see if the situation can be resolved. Similarly for Level 3, coaches who attended the National coaching conference will be given accreditation for what they have completed.

Sports Science Research Committee

The first meeting of this committee since my arrival was held June 24 in Canberra. There were representatives from all sports disciplines, selection committee, medical staff and coaches. The meeting agenda was set to review the objectives of the committee, define the committee structure and to set the research priorities for rowing in 1993-94. The meeting was very successful in that the sports science representatives from several States and institutions were able to get together with rowing specialists to develop the research priorities and generally brainstorm ideas and directions. It was decided the committee should meet twice yearly. A second meeting will be held in August by conference call to review research projects submitted to the Sport Research Programme for funding.

National Coaching Commission

The first meeting of the Coaching Commission is tentatively scheduled for Sept./Oct. at the same period as the Coaching Conference. This will be the first opportunity to get all the state directors together since my arrival. The major focus of this meeting will be the coaching education courses, rowing research priorities, discussions on a common rowing technique,

reporting structure re: TIP and Intensive Training Centres and relationship of the coaches association.

Intensive Training Centre Programme

During my orientation trips I discussed the programmes with the State Coaches and toured facilities where possible. I will review the State programs to get a better idea as to how the system works as it differs state to state. Currently, I have been busy providing information required by the Australian Sports Commission regarding names of athletes and coaches supported under the program as well as the sports science support required by elite athletes.

Talent Identification Programme

I have had discussions with several of the TIP coaches or State Directors concerning the program to familiarise myself with it. While in Adelaide, I observed Barbara Gillett testing several athletes. I have a reasonable understanding of the program, at this point in time. I would like to examine in greater detail the objectives of TIP and compare these to the results of the program on a State basis in the coming year. I believe it is important to evaluate the effectiveness of program and to make improvement where possible.

Trans Tasman Regatta Increased Participation

I was asked to assist with the project to seek increased participation at the Trans Tasman series by inviting additional Pacific Rim Nations. I attended a meeting regarding this topic in Banyoles 1992 as a representative of Canada. I reviewed the information on file, then sent a note to Matt Smith Director of Development for FISA requesting support and information. I will be working with Bob Hemery on this project.

I feel it is important to note the support I have received from both Bob Hemery and Fiona McKenzie during my first months on the job and the welcome I have received from Australian rowing community.

SELECTION COMMISSION REPORT

Presented to the Annual General Meeting of the Australian Rowing Council
on 12th September 1993

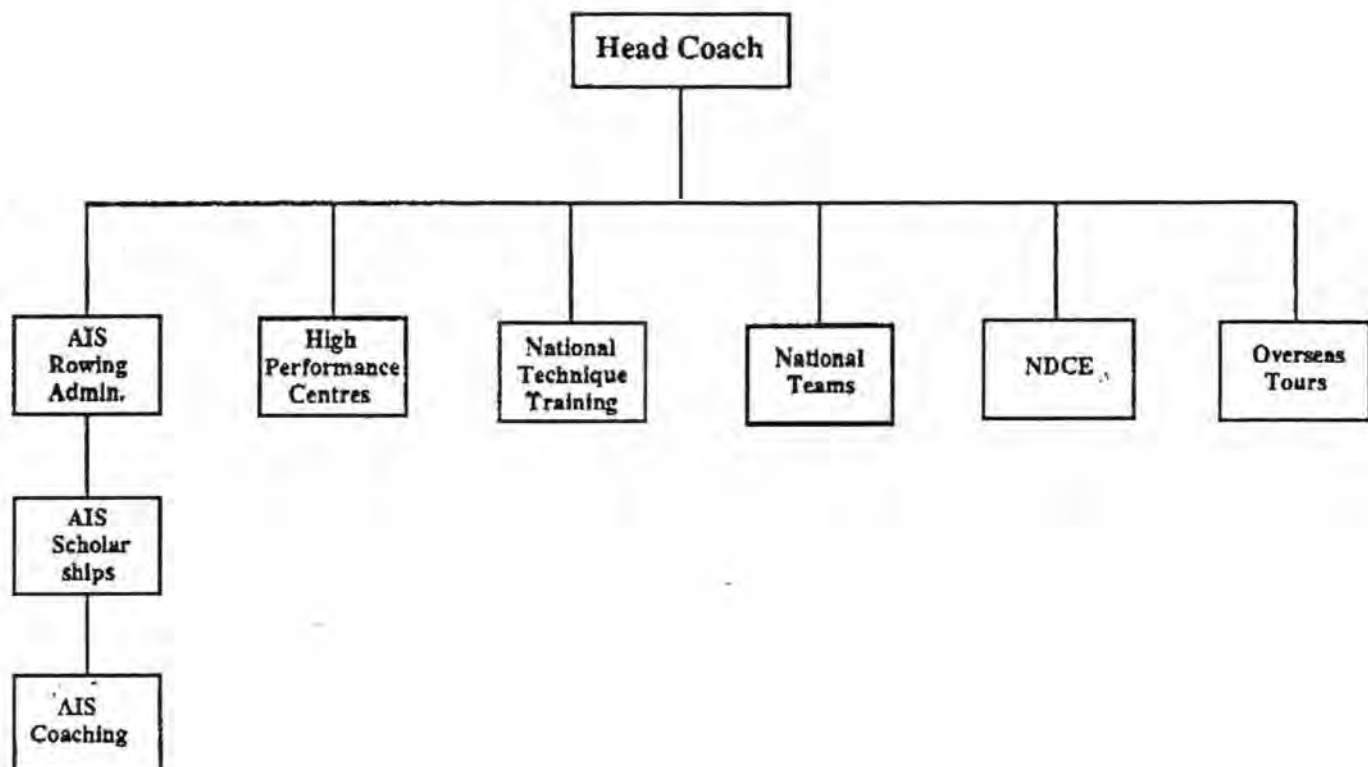
This year has been arduous for the Selection Commission . The standard of our athletes and coaches continues to rise which means that more crews are meeting the selection criteria which inevitably means larger national teams. The resignation of the Head Coach brought its own set of problems and we are grateful that Theo. Korner was available to fill the spot at short notice. The most difficult that the Selection Commission has faced this is the rewriting of the Selection Policy in partnership with the Commissioner for Equal Opportunity.

It was hoped that a revised document would be ready for your consideration at this meeting however delays on both sides have meant that the original timetable has been extended. The completed document will be finalised soon and hopefully, with your agreement, implemented for the 1993/94 season. This has been a protracted task due to the difficulty of writing a policy that encapsulates the Equal Opportunity legislation as well as the spirit of the laws on one hand and arriving at a document that is workable and will enable the Selection Commission to pick the best combinations of athletes to maintain our vision to be one of the top five rowing nations in the World.

The resignation of Reinhold Batschi as Head Coach this year highlighted a major problem which we must overcome as quickly as possible if our sport is to continue to improve both domestically and internationally. The Selection Commission view the filling of this position to be of the utmost importance. The Board and the selectors have had preliminary discussions with the Sports Commission and the CEO of the AIS on this subject. The Selection Commission put forward the following suggestions which we believe should be incorporated into the role of Head Coach.

Responsibilities of Head Coach:-

- Rowing/Coaching Administration AIS
- National Team Training
- National Technique/Training Programs
- High Performance Centres
- Overseas Tours (with others)
- Coaching Education
- Scholarships AIS



There has been some criticism of the growing size of our National Teams. As The standard of our athletes continues to rise we must also expect team numbers to increase unless the selection criteria is tightened. We are not advocating such a move since we believe that in comparison to most other sports the selection standard is already very high.

Both Selection Regattas at Carrum this year were marred by unfair wind conditions which was frustrating for both competitors and selectors. It is important for the sport to locate and develop fairer venues.

Our National Teams are have performed extremely well in their respective World Championships. In the Senior A Team five of our crews did not make the finals but the margins were only small. It would be very difficult to refine the selection process to so precise as to account for such small margins

In the Junior Team all crews made the finals and most performed with distinction.

In the Under 23 Competition although we again won the series New Zealand's performance is improving particularly in the women's and lightweight men's events. We cannot afford to relax. The Under 23 competition is an important introduction of our athletes into the realities of combined national teams.

The Trans Tasman junior competition was a tightly contested series and Australia's performance in the men's eight was not as good as it has been in the last few years primarily

because this year it was necessary to select a composite crew from the small boat events. They do not have sufficient time together and are at a disadvantage compared to New Zealand who spend much more time together.

There is a need to include a Junior Womens Eight and a Junior Men's Eight at the National Championships to cover this weakness in our system and use these events to select our Trans Tasman crews.

New Zealand have proposed that the Junior Womens Four event be changed to a Junior Womens Eight for the Trans Tasman competition. The Selection Commission endorse this proposal and recommend to the Council that the change be made.

It is pleasing to note that the fairness of boats in our competitions against New Zealand has greatly improved .

Finally we would like to express our appreciation to State associations, the Boat Race Officials, the Board , the Council and the administrative staff for their generous assistance and understanding in assisting us in our duties for this year.

A campaign was conducted to recruit additional members for the Rowing Medical Network, resulting in a number of highly qualified sports medicine doctors and paramedics being appointed.

A special grant from the Australian Sports Commission allowed the inaugural Rowing Medical Network seminar to be held in Melbourne, and some useful ideas and recommendations resulted.

The importance of the Rowing Medical Network cannot be underestimated, and as it consolidates its objectives will provide an increasingly valuable service to Australian Rowing.

ALIGNING AND JUDGING EQUIPMENT

The ARC Umpires Panel and various Juries, over a number of years, have discussed, tried and tested various pieces of equipment in an attempt to ensure that aligning and judging is accurate, or at least reasonably accurate within acceptable tolerances.

Both these matters were discussed at the Nationals, Wivenhoe Dam, Queensland, 1993, and, due to occurrences in aligning at the 1993 Selection Races at Carrum, Victoria, and the quality of the video equipment at the finish at the Nationals, the ARC Umpires Panel now considers that these items need further and urgent investigation.

The Panel would consider at present, that the equipment used at the start for the FISA World Championships at Lake Barrington and the "slit-camera" photographic equipment at the finish at West Lakes, Adelaide in 1991 for the Nationals would be the best choice presently available.

We understand and agree that any equipment at the finish, less than 100 frames per second is unacceptable.

The members of the panel will gather as much technical information as possible, but we will require assistance in the form of information and experience from other parts of the world before conclusions and recommendations can be drawn and presented.

The members of the Panel will, at a later date, be making a further recommendation in the strongest terms that aligning will in future be carried out in the 'silent method'.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the ARC Umpires Panel continues it's investigations in regard to the appropriate types of equipment available, costs to purchase and/or hire.
2. That the CEO, ARC, write to FISA, enquiring what types/alternatives have been tried, together with supplier, costs and recommendations.
3. When all this information is assembled, the ARC Umpires Panel will make a recommendation(s) to Council with the information, at the same time, being made available to State Associations.

ARC UMPIRES SEMINARS

As Council would be aware, ARC Umpires Seminars have now been conducted annually, prior to the Nationals, since 1991.

This action, we believe, has improved the standard of Australian umpiring. However, despite the approval voiced by Mr Berger Kaas Andersen, Chairman, FISA Umpires Commission, the members of the ARC Umpires Panel are not satisfied that all ARC Umpires have reached the desired standard.

Candidates nominated by State Associations are generally marking well in their theory examination but are not demonstrating the practical performance to the standard the ARC Umpires Panel (and indeed the Council) would desire.

Continued training, counselling and coaching will, together with seminars bring these people to a higher standard.

From the present fifty-two ARC Licenced Umpires, thirteen will retire over the next four years upon attaining the age of sixty-five years (Rule 27.7.3). This core could be further reduced by the withdrawal of ARC Umpires Licences from a number of people who do not or will not fall into the 'active' category.

The ARC Umpires Panel is now faced with two immediate tasks, they being:-

1. to increase the number of competent ARC Umpires (we understand Council has a target of one hundred by the year 2000),
and,
2. to assist in lifting in both quality and quantity the number of State umpires so as to be able to satisfy 1 above and to provide consistent umpiring with uniformity and understanding across Australia.

To achieve this task, the panel resolved, at it's meeting on Monday, 29 March 1992, at Wivenhoe Dam, Queensland, that not only should the seminar prior to the Nationals be continued, but in addition, the ARC Umpires Panel should conduct similar seminars on behalf of the ARC and in conjunction with each State Association, in each State, during the months of October and November each year.

RECOMMENDATION

That the annual ARC Umpires Seminar be continued prior to the Nationals as a method to provide an update and to ensure the

uniformity of interpretation of rules,
and,
that Council, through the ARC Umpires Panel, in addition to
the annual ARC Umpires Panel Seminar, expand the exercise so
that umpires seminars' be conducted in each State, annually,
during the months of October and November with the objective
of standardising, improving performance and the recruitment of
oarspeople, recently retired from top class active
competition, to become State and eventually ARC Umpires.

To achieve the above, the following steps should be followed:-

1. The ARC Umpires Panel to formulate a modular training program so that both ARC and State seminars be well structured and subject material be regularly varied so that over a period of seminars, a full and comprehensive coverage of the subject matter would have been delivered. (ie. align, start, umpire, judge, clerk of scales, program progression, etc.,).
2. The ARC Umpires Panel makes, collects and assembles video and other film into a record to support the program in 1 above.
3. That two members of the ARC Umpires Panel (not including the 'Home State' member) deliver these seminars.
4. That the ARC fund the cost of transportation (air fares) and that the State Associations bear the cost of accomodation (if any) and expences for the visiting ARC Umpire Panel members and will also arrange for the venue and summoning the local umpires and other participants to attend.
5. That Council arrange a meeting of the ARC Umpires Panel (at a central location) with representatives from each State Umpires Panel with the objective of identifying differences in rules and practices between the States and the ARC.

This exercise' should assist in understanding some 'local' rules and/or problems that could or may be standardised or dealt with in an agreed or an appropriate manner.

(NOTE; The ARC Umpires Panel, in it's recommendation for a Rule change in respect to ARC Umpires makes the ARC Umpires Seminar attendance a 'compulsory' element towards licence renewal. The proposed 'State"

seminars conducted by ARC Umpire Panel members may be adopted by each of the States in a similar manner so as to improve the performance of State umpires).

ARC RULES

It was with more than some annoyance that members of the ARC Umpires Panel, meeting at Wivenhoe Dam, prior to the Nationals, became aware that they, and other current registered ARC Umpires, who were to be involved in the conduct of the Nationals, had not been issued with the updated ARC Rules, including the amendments of 1992.

Further investigation showed that this information had only been issued by the Office to Councillors and Board Members.

Council would support the view that the ARC Umpires on the current Register, and more particularly, those who are to play a part in conducting a regatta should be in possession of up-to-date rules.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council instruct the Office to ensure that registered ARC Umpires have their Rule Books updated and that all future updates be forwarded to them as and when the rules are amended.

FISA RULES

During February 1993, the Secretary-General of FISA advised several of the "Australian" FISA Umpires that revised copies of the FISA Statutes, Rules for Racing, Regulations for FISA Championships and Bye-Laws would be available from April 1993.

Members of the Panel discovered, at the Selection Trials, Carrum, Victoria, 24/25 April 1993, that a FISA circular had in fact been circulated and, in fact, an order form was attached for the above mentioned publication.

We further understand that the circular in question had information in respect to a trial of grading other than the use of repercharges for placings and also a request for FISA Umpires to make themselves available at a number of regattas.

Members of the ARC Umpires Panel were of the opinion that when Mr R Poke was Secretary of the ARC, the Office had been instructed by Council to ensure that "Australian" FISA Umpires were to be circulated with copies of such circulars and that their FISA Rule Books were to be kept up to date.

At this time, it may be recalled, the FISA Year Book, a copy for each FISA Umpire being sent from Switzerland, was being sent to Councillors and not to the Umpires. This matter was settled by FISA posting the publication, plus FISA News direct to the umpires in question.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council instruct the Office to:-

1. obtain updated copies of the FISA Statutes, Rules of Racing, Regulations for FISA Championships and Bye-Laws for FISA Umpires. The cost of these publications to be borne by each individual umpire, and
2. to circulate copies of FISA circulars to each "Australian" FISA Umpire.

CO-ORDINATOR'S PROGRESS REPORT

During the past eight months progress with our programme has been most fruitful, a successful National event and gold\silver medals from the World Championships.

Following the Australian Nationals we have produced our first newsletter and I have gained sponsorship to cover printing and postage of our future newsletters which are to be distributed quarterly.

Expressions of interest have come forward following the Australian Nationals and the distribution of our first newsletter, so I see in the near future the programme going from strength to strength especially now following the worlds.

Tasmania has fulfilled the criteria previously indicated by the Australian Sports Commission. That is to establish a regional co-ordinator who in turn generated interest to formulate a committee which has gained property within a National Parks Reserve where a boat shed will be built to house the special craft.

The riverways within Launceston at the two rowing clubs are most unsuitable for our athletes, so therefore the establishment of a club house at the Trevallyn Reserve shall cater for Junior Development and Adaptive Rowing in suitable and safe conditions.

Tasmania would have up to fifty persons who have experienced the use of our twin hulled craft over the past 18 months and would have thirty plus who use the craft on a regular basis.

Special equipment used in Australia are the Sykes Twin Hulled craft which shall always be required, although some modification would be necessary. This craft enables the coach or helper to assist the disabled rower in the early stages:

While the American Alden craft were recommended, it is in my opinion (having used the Aldens at Roudnice) that the Alden is not the most suitable craft for our needs.

For the sliding seat category without supportive pontoons the craft could be ideal, but for the fixed seat category where supportive pontoons are used the major problem is access in and out of the craft more so when boating from a pontoon. While various methods of gearing were tried during the Worlds, I found the craft most unsatisfactory due to the fixture of rigging arms.

Ted Hale provided a recreational craft for competition at the Australian Nationals which proved most satisfactory and has a simple principle of removing one rigger and pontoon in one movement which allows easy access into the craft either from the beach or pontoon system. The cost factor is also encouraging Ted Hale's \$3,500 - Aldens \$5,000 plus.

Integration between able bodied oarspersons and our disabled is a must and it is though our state delegates that this area must be pushed. I was very disappointed with certain happenings at the Worlds, however we are prepared to be positive and forget the past.

Australian International Rowing Foundation

The purpose of forming the A.I.R.F. was to build a large capital base (original target \$1,000,000) to provide a steady and reliable flow of investment income to stabilise the funding of Australian International Representative rowers and scullers.

It was originally conceived that the capital base would be built up with the support of the rowing fraternity from donations, levies and other fundraising areas.

So far as donations are concerned the A.I.R.F. looks not only for "straight" donations but also for donations which it can share with others in the sport.

Of considerable benefit to A.I.R.F. donors is the opportunity offered through the Australian Sports Foundation for all donations to be fully tax deductible. This benefit to the donor is very attractive indeed as the following demonstration will show.

Assume a donor has an annual taxable income of \$30,000. Such a tax paying donor would be on a marginal rate of tax of 38c in the dollar so that for the donor to make available \$100 as a donation they would first have to earn \$160 (ie. $\$160 - 38\% = \100). If they tax paying donor made his donation of \$100 through the Australian Sports Foundation then the donor would have achieved the aim of the sport benefiting from the full \$100 but it would only have cost the donor \$62 on an after tax basis.

The sharing of donations by the A.I.R.F. comes about where a donor at the time of making their donation advises the A.I.R.F. of a particular area to which they would like to see their donation passed for specific financial support. These areas could be club re-building programs, club re-equipping programs or otherwise just general financial support for clubs or teams. The basis of sharing by the A.I.R.F. is that it passes on 75% of all donations made to Australian Teams and 90% of all other donations.

As at June 30, 1993 the capital base of the A.I.R.F. stood at approximately \$145,000.

The E. Bromley Trust

In and before October 1988, Ted Bromley, a former Australian Olympian Pair-oared Rower, had provided financial support to Australian Representative Pair-oared crews. This support at that stage was not subject to permanent arrangement and, furthermore, was restricted to pairs in the Senior Heavyweight class.

In October 1988 Ted Bromley approached the A.R.C. explaining that he would like to extend his financial support to all pair-oared crews representing Australia at World Championships and asked Council to consider his offer to establish a permanent Trust Fund the income of which could be used toward defraying costs of such crews competing at those World Championships.

The Council accepted Ted's generous offer and the E. Bromley Trust was thereby established with a gift of \$150,000 from Ted forming the capital of the Fund.

As at June 30, 1993 the Fund had a total capital value of \$200,000.


In the 1992/93 year, \$12,500 of income was applied in financial support of the Mens and Womens Junior Coxless Pairs competing at the World Junior Championships in Norway. These crews received 4th and Gold placings respectively.

Conclusion

The year 1992/93 is a landmark which will take a lot of beating, with so much golden success, and our forward planning in good shape.

Now we, as a sport, need to consolidate behind our good results, and work hard to maintain and improve this high standard. We need to accelerate the development of a new crop of junior champions who will be ready for 1996 and 2000 Olympics. We need to get working on the marketing of the sport and in particular find a national sponsor.

But most importantly, we need to seek total national harmony, start appreciating the contributions we make one to another for the common good, and thus create real unity in Australian Rowing.

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
