# Sixty Second Annual Report

## of the

## Australian Rowing Council Inc.

(Est. - 1st May 1925)

This Annual Report is submitted to the Australian Rowing Council at the Annual General Meeting in Melbourne on 26 - 27th November 1994.

### Administration

In concise terms, the 1993-94 administrative year was one of immense change. It became evident that the wide membership of the Australian Rowing community had concern in relation to the leadership, administration and management of Australian Rowing.

In an attempt to respond to the situation, the Australian Rowing Council met on more occasions than the constitutional requirement of two meetings each year.

After the Annual General Meeting held in Melbourne on 11-12th September 1993, the Council continued the Annual Meeting in Melbourne on 20th November 1993 and met in General Meeting in Melbourne on 23rd January 1994 and in Adelaide on the 11th March 1994.

The mid-year meeting of the Council was held in Melbourne on the 18-19th June 1994.

As illustrated by the Office Bearer section above, changes took place at all administrative levels.

Mr Reg McKay resigned as President in January 1994. He had been President of the ARC since 1989 and prior to that year, had represented the state of Victoria as it's delegate from 1982.

On the 23rd January 1994, the ARC resolved:

**MOVED Tasmania, seconded South Australia**

"The Council accept the resignation of ARC President Reg McKay received verbally at this meeting and express its appreciation for his services to the Australian Rowing Council as delegate for Victoria from 1982 to 1989 and as President from 1989 to this date." Carried 6:0

For his long service and valuable contribution to the ARC, Mr McKay was presented with a framed print of the Olympic Gold Medal "Awesome Foursome" during the conduct of the 1994 Australian Rowing Championships at Lake Barrington.

Mr Islay Lee of Sydney succeeded Mr McKay at elections conducted by the Council at its meeting in Adelaide on March 11th. Mr Lee, the Deputy-Principal of the Kings School at Parramatta had an outstanding career in rowing, representing Australia at world championships in the late 1970's and at two Olympic Games. He is and remains the coach of the Kings School first eight.

Also on the 23rd January 1994, the ARC accepted a letter of retirement from the then Chief Executive Officer Mr Bob Hemery JP. Councillors were most appreciative of the work done by Mr Hemery during his term of office from 1st January 1991 until 17th February 1994.

Mr Hemery told the Council that he had been proud to serve the ARC as it's first CEO. Whilst he had hoped that the Executive Board could have produced better outcomes for the sport, nevertheless, he noted that he had received, at all times, the good will and co-operation of the Councillors, State Associations and many members throughout the national rowing community. Notwithstanding his retirement, Mr Hemery made it clear that he was interested in continuing to participate in the administration of national rowing.

On 11th March 1994, Mr James Lowe an accountant of Melbourne was elected to the position of Director of Finance. He succeeded Mr Ray Hammon who had held the position for the three preceding years. The Adelaide meeting of the Council expressed it's gratitude to Mr Hammon for his contribution to the financial management of the ARC's accounts.

The Adelaide General Meeting was also advised by the newly elected President, Mr Islay Lee that the Council had received thirty eight applications for the position of Chief Executive Officer. He told that the meeting that the list included "...several high quality applicants."

The Council appointed a panel comprising Islay Lee (Chairman); Berry Durston; Andrew Guerin and Ken Norris (Australian Sports Commission).

The Council approved the recommendation of the panel that Mr David Schier become the Chief Executive Officer. Mr Schier had competed as a active oarsman for ten years and had made various contributions to the administration of rowing as the President of the Tasmanian Rowing Council (1983 - 1991); FISA delegate for seven years; Chairman of the Organising Committee for the 1990 World Rowing Championships at Lake Barrington and a member of the ARC as the Tasmanian Delegate from 1984.

The Adelaide meeting also elected Mr Jon Lanning of Sydney and Mr Bob Bleakley of Brisbane to the positions on the ARC Board.

Dr Steve Hinchy stepped down from ARC duties as the Queensland delegate. He held the position from 1987. He was replaced by Mr Ray Ebert.

Mr Schier was replaced as the Tasmanian delegate by Devonport solicitor, Mr David Williams. Earlier, Mr Williams had been Chairman of the Organising Committee for the highly successful 1994 Australian Rowing Championships on Lake Barrington.

The Council continued to receive the benefits of contributions as delegates from Berry Durston (WA); Andrew Guerin (Vic); Tony Brown (NSW) and Michael Eastaughffe (SA).

Prior to the change in the positions as mentioned above, the Administration Officer of the ARC, Ms Fiona McKenzie stood down after the 1993 AGM. The Council closed it's September 1993 meeting by noting "...with sincere regret the resignation of the Administration Officer Ms Fiona McKenzie and wishes to extend to her it's appreciation for her contribution to the ARC and Australian Rowing." Ms Adele van Rosmalen succeeded her.

### In Memoriam

The Australian rowing fraternity had cause to reflect during the year on the death of Messrs. James "Jim" Howden, Duncan Harvey and Reg Galvin. Only months earlier Reg of Penrith climbed the victory dais at Lake Barrington to receive his medallion as the successful coach of the Australian Champion Schoolboy Single Scull.

Jim Howden of Melbourne or "Judge Jim" to many was a former successful Australian and Olympic oarsman and national selector.

### 2000 Sydney Olympics - A Gold Medal Plan

Whilst the sweeping changes at the administrative level of the ARC had a genesis in management style and policy, without question the receipt by Australia and in particular Sydney of the 2000 Olympic Games was a catalyst.

When Sydney was awarded the 2000 Olympic Games at a meeting of the International Olympic Committee in Monte Carlo on 25th September 1993 with the winning margin being a narrow one vote, a challenge arose immediately for all sports in Australia to grasp the opportunity which the Olympic Games would provide to them.

Rowing administrators throughout the country were quick to realise the depth and breadth of this opportunity and State Associations were then concerned to ensure that the Australian Rowing Council have a quality team of administrators to not only define the future of Australian Rowing but to develop new policies and programs on the vehicle provided by the Sydney 2000 Olympics.

A meeting was hastily convened in Melbourne on the 13th of November 1993 with two concise objectives:

- \* to agree on the main principles for rowing in relation to the Gold Medal Plan 2000 and;
- \* to identify the steps which will need to be taken immediately to activate this plan.

The minutes of that meeting are produced elsewhere in this report. It was an historic meeting as members of the Executive Board; Delegates to the ARC; representatives of state based institutes and the AIS and members of State Associations assembled to discuss the objectives.

Amidst a flurry of activity, an earlier draft of rowing's Gold Medal Plan was debated and extensively modified and presented to the Australian Sports Commission on the 18th of November 1993.

The fact of the meeting and the resolutions achieved at it stood out like a beacon in the administrative year. The meeting demonstrated that the vast majority of rowing administrators in the country were prepared, at short notice, to work hard and effectively as a team to produce an outcome for the benefit of the sport nationally.

The November meeting appointed Ms Margot Foster to convene a working party to articulate the objectives of the GMP. Ms Foster received submissions from many quarters and received the full support of working party members Sam Patten; Simon Gillett; Reinhold Batschi OAM and David Yates. Ms Foster tended the report from the working party in September 1994.

The November conference in many ways paved the way for a rejuvenated and progressive national federation when the new President, Mr Islay Lee took over the reigns of the Council in March 1994.

Mr Lee promoted and has maintained an emphasis upon the management of ARC affairs for the direct benefit of the rowing clubs and schools throughout Australia and in particular their rowers and coaches.

The Australian Olympic Committee and the Australian Sports Commission worked assiduously after the Monte Carlo decision to lay the foundation for Australia's assault on the medal table at the 2000 Olympics and with former ARC President Mr John Coates AM playing an important role as the President of the AOC, significant levels of funding were approved in the 1994 budget introduced by the Keating Labor Government.

Over \$42 Million will be allocated by the Australian Sports Commission to all sports in the 1994-95 year with the allocation to rowing, including the AIS budget, of \$3.5M.

The Minister For Sport, Senator John Faulkner committed the Government to a six year funding plan which, so long as rowing among all sports maintains medal winning performances, should see rowing as a beneficiary of funding exceeding \$22 Million. At the same time, the Gold Medal Plan was replaced in descriptive terms by the **Olympic Athlete Program** ("OAP").

Central to the achievement by rowing of results under the OAP, was the appointment of a Head Coach. On April 25th 1994, Mr Simon Gillett was appointed to this position. Mr Gillett, a former champion Australian lightweight oarsman and gold medalist in the coxless four has a long history of involvement with the sport. His active rowing career was with the Melbourne University Boat Club. However, his career in coaching was with the South Australian Sports Institute where several of his crews achieved medals at the world junior and senior championships in recent years. Mr Gillett was also a member in the 1980's of the ARC Selection Commission.

As the 1994 administrative year comes to a close, the ARC has recently appointed it's first ever High Performance Manager. Again, from a quality field of applicants, former junior world champion in the women's coxless four in 1989, Samantha Stewart of Geelong and Canberra was appointed to this position.

Whilst the headquarters of the ARC will remain for the time being within the Department of Sport and Recreation, 123 Lonsdale Street, Melbourne, Mr Gillett and Ms Stewart are based with the AIS Rowing Unit in Canberra.

At the time of compilation of this report, the Head Coach and High Performance Manager are visiting each principal rowing centre throughout Australia to negotiate the terms of an agreement which will lead to a fully integrated national plan for the training and coaching of rowers in so called Intensive Training Centres. Central to this plan will be an historic agreement between four parties being the Australian Rowing Council; each State Association; the Australian Sports Commission; and the Sport Institute or Academy in each State and the ACT.

The creation of the position of Head Coach with authority for the selection of Australian representative teams, brought to an end the active role of the previous ARC Selection Commission. In recent years, the membership of that Commission has been as stable as it has been successful. In July last, the selectors being Messrs David Poulson; Dr David Yates and Dr Dennis Hatcher received an expression of the Council's gratitude for their services in a letter

which said in part:

"The success of Australian Rowing during your period as stewards of the selection process will remain unchallenged as the years pass and we move in to another different and perhaps radical phase. A hallmark of your involvement has been the manifest teamwork between all members of the Commission, your loyalty not only to each other, but also to the rowers, coaches and administrators and above all, the success at World Championship and Olympic Competition of the crews and scullers who have been the subject of your selections.

If at times the process was unorthodox, then it was also innovative. If at times it was controversial, then it was always with honourable intent.

This Council is indebted to you and to your colleagues for six years of excellent service to the wider Australian rowing community and especially its high performance rowers and coaches."

The responsibility for devising a national scheme for the education of coaches has remained with Mr Doug White. The role of the National Director of Coaching Education has changed throughout the year with the appointment of the Head Coach and the introduction of the national Intensive Training Plan. Consistent with the OAP objectives, the education of Australian coaches from the novice to the elite levels will be a major priority of the ARC.

Upon its appointment in the first half of the administrative year, the ARC Board soon found that the finances of the ARC were considerably in deficit. Some innovative and progressive plans of the incoming Board were thus thwarted as a priority became the management of a parlous financial circumstance. In this context coupled with the need to obtain sufficient funding for the ARC for it to meet its increasing and widening areas of responsibility, a debate has commenced to a more extensive membership and affiliation structure.

The acquisition of a national database for Australian Rowing will be a priority for 1995.

In essence, the ARC Board has, as an objective, the generation of income to make the organisation free of reliance upon government funding for administrative tasks as well as provide funds for the development, promotion and marketing of rowing.

### National Media Director

A highlight of the 1994 year was the appointment of Mr Robin Poke of Canberra as the first ever National Media Director. Mr Poke has had a long association with Australian Rowing as a foundation Editor of "Australian Rowing" magazine and as a former ARC Executive Director. In recent years, Mr Poke has been the Chairman and President of the ACT Rowing Association.

Mr Poke applied himself to his new portfolio with all the style and commitment to which we are accustomed. He soon arranged a National Media Network the principal members of which are Michael Wilson (Sydney); Wal Oakley (Melbourne); Will Gray (Brisbane); Roger Wilson (Melbourne); Phil Mangelsdorf (Adelaide) and Rowena Newcomen (Perth). The end result was the best ever coverage of Australia's participation at the World Junior and Senior Rowing Championships throughout all sections of the Australian media. However, it is only the beginning and it is hoped to build quickly on this solid foundation next year and beyond.

## Australian Umpires

Australian Rowing continued to be well served by many loyal, dedicated and efficient Umpires and Officials. The Umpires Panel comprising Pat McGuffie (Chairman - Tasmania); Bob Pennington (South Australia) and Brett Woolfitt (Western Australia) worked well as the committee for the umpires and provided the ARC with considered reports and recommendations on a variety of matters not only in relation to umpiring but also with respect to the organisation and management of important regattas.

Australian umpires were in the vanguard with the introduction of new starting procedures which appeared to work much more successfully at the Australian Championships at Lake Barrington than at the World Championships several months later in Indianapolis.

The Australian rowing community and umpires in particular reflected in October on the passing of FISA licence holder and long serving umpire, Mr Duncan Harvey of Adelaide.

Duncan's brother, Jim continues to serve the Umpires Panel in a secretarial capacity.

The further support of Australian umpire's and the recruitment of them is a matter close to the aims of the current ARC Board. As the financial position of the ARC improves, this is one area which will receive close attention.

Australian umpires were represented at the 1994 World Championships by Mr Berry Durston (in an official capacity as a FISA Umpire) and by panel member, Bob Pennington.

## Disrow

In 1988 the Australian Rowing Council chose as it's bicentennial project, the support of a program for rowers with disabilities. In recent years, the program has lacked impetus but over the last eighteen months, Mr Bob Blake of Devonport has breathed more life into this important program.

The ARC has recognised his work and measured achievements to date and as funding improves, the ARC Board would like to see a Disrow network created throughout Australia in addition to the better served areas of Perth, Northern Tasmania and Sydney.

## Medical

As time passes, it is becoming increasingly important that rowers and coaches receive first class assistance from Doctors, Physiotherapists, Masseurs and other professionals in the field of health, nutrition and fitness.

Australian Rowing has been fortunate in that Dr Bill Webb loyally serves us as the Principal Medical Officer. Equally however it is clear that he is being assisted across the board by the Medical Network. At the end of season meeting of the Network at Narrabeen, Sydney on 15th October, it was obvious that rowing has several professionals in the fields of medicine who are important volunteers of their services and knowledge to rowing.

The ARC has a debt of gratitude not only to Dr Webb, but also to team doctors David Coles, Robin Yarrow and Steve Hinchy. Dr Ian Beltz of Hobart made a significant contribution to the health of rowers and coaches at the 1994 Australian Championships at Lake Barrington.

Luke Attwell, Alan Bourke and Henry Wajswelner gave further invaluable support to our teams in the fields of physiotherapy and massage.

Allan Hahn of the Sports Science section of the Australian Institute of Sport continues to serve the interests of rowing in this crucial area. As part of the OAP funding, rowing is able to appoint a sports scientist and at the time of this report, negotiations are occurring with ASC officials for the appointment of Dr Hahn to this position.

In the past, doctors and health workers have had to make considerable sacrifices whilst leaving their practices for overseas trips by our teams. Under the OAP framework, and consistent with rowing's GMP settled in November 1993, salary sacrifice payments will be made to medical and health members to encourage their repeated service to our travelling teams. In this regard, essential experience can be accumulated over several years for the clear benefit of rowers and coaches.

Dr Webb's report to the 1994 Annual Meeting is included herein to illustrate the increasing importance to rowing of this aspect of team activity.

### Team Managers

With the onset of the OAP and the immediate prospect of larger teams travelling to not only the Junior and Senior World Championships and to annual competition for the Under-23 rowers in The Nations Cup but also to international regattas in Europe in June/July and to high altitude training in Australia, Europe and the USA, the volunteer services of our managers will be under an immense challenge.

This year we were well served again by David Taylor of Sydney as the Senior A Team Manager. He was ably assisted by Michael Eastaughffe of Adelaide.

Peter Huggett of Brisbane completed another year as the Manager of the Junior Team which travelled to Lucerne, Paris and to the World Junior Championships in Germany.

Graeme Boykett of Melbourne was the Manager responsible for the Trans Tasman Series held in West Lakes, Adelaide against New Zealand. However, when it became apparent that some of our Under-23 rowers would compete in The Nations Cup, Graeme found his managerial skills in demand to arrange a trip to Lucerne and Paris.

Keith Hustwick of Adelaide had charge of the Junior Trans Tasman Team which competed in May at Lake Ruataniwha in New Zealand.

### FISA Masters Regatta

Whilst the euphoria over the decision in favour of Sydney for the 2000 Olympic Games on 25th September was understandable, rowing had an earlier reason to celebrate when in Vienna just two days earlier, Adelaide was awarded the FISA Masters Regatta for 1997.

After waiting so long to host FISA at a Championships in Australia in 1990 at Lake Barrington, it was a further manifestation of Australia's rising influence and standing within world rowing for the South Australian delegation to win the FISA Master's Regatta in 1997. The two principal members who articulated the plan and presented it in Vienna were David McFarlane, Manager of the International Events Unit in Adelaide and the President of the South Australian Rowing Association and former ARC Delegate and Board Member, Mr Bryan Draper OAM.

Thus, within three years Australia will have another opportunity to host the world rowing family, this time at the masters level. This will be a huge regatta requiring deft management and organisation and the ARC stands ready to help the South Australians when and where ever possible.

### Rowing Facilities

The ARC has many challenges before it, not least the need to be a strong, articulate and, if appropriate, determined advocate for the development of facilities for rowing throughout Australia. When the Lake Barrington International Rowing Course was opened in March 1984, it provided a focus for the further development of rowing facilities on mainland Australia. The West Lakes course in South Australia has recently been upgraded and further development has taken place at Lake Wivenhoe in Queensland. A lot of progress has been made over just one decade.

Additional facilities have been developed at Carrum, but perceived concern with the quality of the water and the affect of wind on the course at recent regattas may affect the future of this facility as a first class rowing venue.

There is gathering interest in the development of rowing courses in Queensland - one closer to Brisbane than Lake Wivenhoe and also at Bond University; in the Hunter Valley region and also at Nagambie and Geelong.

The ARC Board will work assiduously to influence the design and construction of these courses to ensure that if the development of them proceeds, the best solutions for rowers, officials, regatta organisers and spectators will be achieved.

Following the decision in favour of Sydney for the 2000 Olympic Games, the rowing course at Penrith Lakes is the rising star on the horizon of rowing course development. In recent months, interest has heightened in Penrith Lakes as between the ARC, FISA and NSWRA with the aim being to influence the design of the on-course and on-shore facilities to produce one of the best rowing courses in the Southern Hemisphere. The ARC may need to decide in 1995 whether it wishes to establish a national training centre at Penrith.

Whilst the development of rowing courses is important, so too is the retention for rowing of waterways hitherto used by the sport for many past decades. It is arguable that the ARC has a direct interest in taking a leading on the one hand and supporting on the other, role ensuring waterways do not become excessively crowded to the detriment of rowing (eg. the Yarra River and parts of Sydney Harbour) all silted up or otherwise affected. On occasions state or regional associations do not have the capacity or the spokespersons to properly and professionally argue the case for the retention of waterways for rowing training and competition when challenges to the use of them arise from a variety of quarters.

### Australian Sports Commission

It is fair to say that in the first half of the administrative year, the relationship between the ARC and the Australian Sports Commission based in Canberra was such that confidence between the two organisations was waning. It was an early objective of the incoming Board to set a firm foundation with the ASC and its various section leaders so as to not only provide the basis for a co-operative working relationship but to also establish and work towards mutual aims and objectives. The Chief Executive Officer and the Head Coach had several meetings with ASC officials through May and June and soon demonstrated to the Executive Director of the ASC, Mr Jim Ferguson and the Sports Consultants with whom rowing is associated, Messrs Geoff

Strang and Peter Hamilton our bona fides and commitment to attaining consistent performances and results.

We found a reciprocal response from Mr Ferguson and he's team so that we can look forward with confidence for the future in terms of our general relationship and in particular in relation to the OAP.

In the allocation of funds under the OAP, the ARC has received the third highest funding - the top six sports are:

### Australian Institute Of Sport

In the second half of the administrative year, the incoming Board accepted the responsibility to review the association of rowing with the AIS. Meetings took place with Mr Robert de Castella and his staff as between the CEO and the Head Coach and as the calendar year comes to a close, the negotiations are continuing.

In the context of the OAP, some of the principles and programs which have characterised the management of the AIS rowing program under the AIS Head Coach Reinhold Batschi for over a decade have to be reviewed.

On the 7th August 1994, the ARC Board devised it's strategy for the future by reference to the AIS Rowing Unit as follows:

- i. "That the ARC recognises the outstanding contribution made to AIS rowing over the last decade by Reinhold Batschi OAM especially in the creation of the rowing facility at lakeside.
- ii. That the ARC, on the 3rd May 1992, resolved unanimously to endorse the AIS Rowing Unit as the ARC "Centre of Excellence."
- iii. That position has yet to be achieved.
- iv. The ARC Board wants the AIS to be not only the centre of excellence but preferably the principal high performance centre of Australian rowing.
- v. That aim is to be implemented forthwith.
- vi. The main vehicle for implementation of the aim will be through the OAP but other compatible initiatives will be taken.
- vii. The ARC Board desires to work in close co-operation and consultation with Reinhold Batschi as AIS Rowing's Head Coach in the implementation of the above stated aims and all relevant programs under the OAP.
- viii. Consistent with the above aims and objectives, the ARC wishes steps to be taken to -

- a. Fully integrate and merge all the policies and programs of AIS rowing with the OAP.
- b. Ensure that the attainment of the best coaching services at the AIS Rowing Unit is of the highest order.
- c. Ensure that scholarship holders for the upcoming year are of the highest calibre and come within the medal winning aims of the OAP.
- d. Review current AIS/ARC agreements to produce a contemporaneous and appropriate (in the context of the above aims) agreement.
- e. Provide a six year plan for AIS Rowing.

In addition, the ARC Board working in conjunction with the Head Coach would prefer to see the creation of flexible scholarships to enable the best athletes to receive AIS support without necessarily taking up full time residence in Canberra.

The following paragraphs are extracted, by way of information and report, from the half yearly reports prepared under the AIS Rowing Program.

"The long term goal of the AIS Rowing Program, in co-operation with the ARC, is to develop, maintain and improve high performance rowers and coaches at World Championships and Olympic Games.

In 1993, of the thirty-one AIS scholarship holders, twenty-six rowers were selected in the Australian Team. Head Coach, Reinhold Batschi resigned his position as the national team Head Coach to concentrate on AIS Rowing.

We took possession of our new offices (at Lakeside, Yarralumla) this month (July 1993) and with all the coaches and rowers overseas at the time the move was uneventful. The new home of rowing has equipment storage, offices for each of the coaches, facilities to review videos and a spa.

Advertisements for a new lightweight coach at the AIS to prepare athletes for competition in and up to the 1996 Olympics at Atlanta went overseas and Australia wide. We had a great deal of difficulty in advertising and appointing a lightweight coach due inconsistency and lack of support from the ARC.

Scholarship applications for the 1994 season closed at the end of the month (November 1993) with 237 applications made for thirty-two positions. AIS Coaches believe that national selectors should play a more definitive role in recruitment and selection of athletes to the program. The AIS's role in the ARC's Development Plan is as a centre of excellence and this should be supported and promoted.

The AIS national and junior development camps for young men and women were held over two camps during September 1993. Junior coach Steve Evans was the co-ordinator and coach for the camp and made the transition of athletes from raw talent to well informed prospects look easy. They received coaching from AIS and national coaches as well as expert tuition in important related fields. These included boat rigging, physiology, injury prevention, nutrition, bio-mechanics, strength and conditioning.

The Director of Coaching for Tasmania, Sam Carroll, brought thirteen elite and prospective athletes to Canberra for six days of intensive training and testing.

Dr Allan Hahn has consistently contributed to the selection preparation and continued testing of AIS rowers. He has been the driving force behind the heat acclimatisation study of athlete and potentially elite athletes.

Steve Evans left us this month (November 1993). Steve has had a very successful career here at the Institute winning the Young Coach of the Year award in 1992, silver medal at the World Juniors in 1992 and a bronze medal at the World Juniors in Norway in 1993.

Matthew Draper of South Australia was selected as the lightweight coach.

This month (May 1994) Paul Rowe, the sculling coach, left the AIS as a staff member when his position was terminated but is still around the Institute as a coach for the national team mens double scull. The future of the sculling program at the AIS is still unknown.

The concentration of the athletes and coaches in preparation for upcoming regattas, (July/August 1994) in Europe in intense. The involvement of AIS coaches and athletes with various crews training in Canberra and interstate is a credit to the dedication required to produce the best results.

The rowing program upgraded its coaches boat engines and punts. The new safety regulations on Lake Burley Griffin has also had an unexpected impact on our resources."

### Australian Olympic Committee

The ARC has maintained a close working relationship with the Australian Olympic Committee particularly in the context of the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

In recent months, the ARC has worked closely with Mr Craig McLatchey of the AOC in relation to the arrangements for our Olympic Team to compete successfully at the 1996 Olympic Games at Atlanta, USA. Unfortunately, the rowing course chosen by the Atlanta bid committee, close

to the city centre could not be developed owing to objections from environmentalists. ACOG has chosen Lake Lanier, a ninety minute drive north-east of Atlanta and close to the town of Gainseville for the venue for the Olympic rowing and canoeing. After the championships in Indianapolis, an ARC delegation comprising the Chief Executive Officer; Head Coach; Team Manager and Noel Donaldson visited Atlanta and the proposed (yet to be developed) rowing course and accommodation for the Australian Team and separately it's supporters.

In 1994, the AOC made a contribution of \$132,000 to the ARC's international team travel costs. Financial support from the AOC will increase after 1996 with considerable benefits flowing directly to our elite rowers so as to enable them to concentrate on their training to attain maximum performances at world championships competition in France (1997); Cologne (1998); Lucerne (1999) and at the Sydney Olympics.

It is the aim of the ARC, working in close co-operation with the AOC to field a full rowing team in each of the fourteen events at the 1996 Olympic Games.

### Federation Internationale des Societes d'Aviron - FISA

The ARC has continued to have an excellent working relationship with the executive members, Council and commissions comprising FISA. Moreover, we have frequent contact with current FISA Secretary General and former ARC Secretary, John Boulbee AM.

The President of FISA Denis Oswald visited Australia for the World Masters Games - rowing competition in Brisbane in October. FISA Umpiring Commission Chairman, Borge Kaas-Anderson of Denmark also visited Brisbane leading up to and during the Masters Games.

One of the most learned members of the FISA Regatta Commission, Don Rowlands MBE, of Auckland, New Zealand has visited Sydney on several occasions to provide expert and practical advice to the developers of the Penrith Lakes Rowing Course. He was recently joined at a technical meeting by Ms Svelta Otezova of Bulgaria, a member of the same commission.

Meanwhile, John Coates AM continues to represent Australia, New Zealand and Tonga at the FISA Council level as the Continental Representative. Two Australians participate on FISA Commissions being Dr Bill Webb (Medical) and Peter Antonie OAM (Athletes). Mr Tony Brown of Sydney was nominated for a position on the FISA Regatta Commission which was ultimately awarded to Johan Blondelle of the Hazewinkel Rowing Centre, Belgium. During the administrative year, FISA settled, for the first time, a procedure for all nations to formally qualify to enter and compete at future Olympic Games competitions.

### Commonwealth Rowing Association

As mentioned elsewhere, the Commonwealth Rowing Regatta was held in London, Ontario in August 1994. The Commonwealth Rowing Association conducted its annual meeting in Indianapolis where the ARC was represented by Tony Brown and David Schier. The ARC delegation expressed it's considerable concern as to the future of the CRA and in particular the Commonwealth Regatta in view of the fact that rowing will not be part of the 1998 Commonwealth Games in Malaysia. The ARC offered to host the Commonwealth Regatta in Australia in 1998. It is clear that the pursuit of Commonwealth rowing competition each four years is an appropriate policy but it would seem that the ARC must play a higher and perhaps leading role in the future in delivering this event from a concept or discussion point to reality.

## Australian Sports Drug Agency

Drugs to enhance physical performance undermine the essential values of all that sport is about. The Australian Sports Drug Agency is committed to reducing the harm associated with drug use in sport in order to enhance the well-being of individuals and the value of sport to society. ASDA's mission incorporates education, law enforcement and research on a range of doping issues through a broad range of programs.

During the 1993/94 period 109 in and out-of-competition random drug tests were conducted by ASDA within rowing. All were negative.

ASDA also conducted thirteen drug tests in China on behalf of FISA.

## MLC Scholarships

The MLC Junior Sports Foundation offers 200 scholarships to young athletes throughout Australia. To be eligible for scholarship assistance, an athlete must be aged between fourteen and eighteen years, competing in an individual (not a team - which means that only single scullers can be considered), and nationally ranked within the top 5 in their age category. Martin Inglis of New South Wales and Dana Faletic of Tasmania have both been offered scholarships in the 1994/95 year. They will receive \$2,000 in funding (held in trust), sports clothing and accessories and an invitation to attend one of three "national" sportscamps to be held during the scholarship year.

## Australian International Rowing Foundation

The purpose of forming the AIRF was to build a large capital base to provide a steady and reliable flow of investment income to provide certainty for the funding of Australian international representative rowers and scullers.

It was originally conceived that the capital base would be built up with the support of the rowing fraternity from the donations, levies and other fundraising areas.

When the AIRF was established, it was proposed that 10% of funds donated to it through the Australian Sports Foundation be retained by the ARC and applied to the AIRF. It would seem that this amount is too high and the ARC Board, in conjunction with the Australian Sports Foundation representatives in Canberra, are negotiating a new administrative arrangement whereby the maximum administration fee to be charged will be 5%.

Whilst the negotiations are pending, the ARC Board will actively promote the scheme involving tax deductibility for donations of any type to the AIRF with direct mail to the rowing clubs and schools.

Separately, the ARC will levy a management and accounting fee on AIRF deposits as received through the Australian Sports Foundation and the Melton Bingo Project.

It would seem that the acquisition of a permanent administration headquarters for the ARC is a matter of priority. During 1995, the Board will investigate this issue and may apply, in the context of investment, the AIRF funds.

## The E.R. Bromley Trust

Approximately six years ago, a former Australian Olympic pair-oared rower, Mr Ted Bromley advanced to the ARC, a gift of \$150,000. It was proposed that the interest on the investment of this capital sum be applied to assist in a financial way Australia's pair-oared competitors. This year, the Trust assisted the silver medalists at the Paris Nations Cup, James and Geoff Stewart and their coach Tim McLaren. The balance of the Australian pair-oared representative crews received OAP funding.

## In Conclusion





# 1994 Australian Rowing Championships and King's Cup Regatta

*Sponsored by Sykes Racing*

5th - 10th April 1994

Under the rotation of the Australian Rowing Championships, the NSWRA was due to convene the Australian Championships in 1994. However, whilst the Nepean River course was available at Penrith, the NSWRA did not wish to invest valuable funds on on-course equipment (which had been previously lost in a flood) in the context of the imminent creation of the new 2000 metre rowing course at nearby Penrith Lakes.

In an act of considerable charity, the Tasmanian Rowing Council stepped in to assist the NSWRA to host the 1994 Championships with the 1996 Championships previously scheduled for Tasmania being held on the new Penrith Lakes course which will be available in September 1995.

The national championships have been held at Lake Barrington on three prior occasions 1984, 1987 and 1990 hence, the Australian rowing fraternity was visiting Lake Barrington for the fourth time in ten years. The Australian rowing community was not disappointed.

The Tasmanian Rowing Council appointed a new Chairman of the Organising Committee, Mr David Williams. A Devonport solicitor and former Tasmania University Boat Club oarsman, David had served as Deputy Chairman of the Regatta Control Committee during the 1990 World Rowing Championships. He collected around him a team of experienced regatta organisers including Lorraine Higgs; John Saltmarsh; John Oakley; Kerry Bligh; David Rattray; Rod Dolbel; Jack Ellings; Patricia Pitman; Peter Shrosbee; Michael Banks; Scott Westlake; Ivan Dolbey and Les Coates.

In succinct terms, the regatta was an outstanding success. Features included an extra day of competition; the support of principal sponsor *Sykes Racing*; a record entry of 846; the conduct for the first time of junior eights for men and women and the inaugural interstate race for women's youth eights.

The Annual Dinner of the Australian Rowing Council was conducted where the well received guest speaker was Mr Islay Lee.

In the interstate races held in fickle weather conditions ranging from excellent to uncomfortable, Victoria won the King's Cup for a record tenth consecutive occasion. Jason Day of Victoria won the Interstate Men's Single Scull for the President's Cup and Emu Snook sculling for NSW won the Nell Slatter Trophy. FISA General Secretary, John Boultee AM, AOC President John Coates AM and His Excellency Sir Phillip Bennett AC, KBE, DSO Governor of Tasmania were in attendance.

In one of the most thrilling races, Western Australia won the Victoria Cup for the Women's Lightweight Coxless Four defeating Victoria by 1.13 seconds. Victoria had won this event every year since 1977.

As a result of the organising skills of the dedicated convenor of Disrow, Mr Bob Blake, events took place this year at Lake Barrington for adaptive rowers. Michael Briggs (WA) coached by George Fizzel won the 1000m sliding seat competition; Paul Bell of Launceston, coached by David Pemberthy won the 500m fixed seat - upper body movement and the 500m contest for fixed seat - limited upper body movement was won by Glenn Allingham (Queensland) coached by Fred Newcomb.

With the support of the ARC, the organising committee conducted the finals of the school eights for girls and boys in eight lanes. The final of both events was a rowing spectacle with Sydney Grammar winning the Barrington Cup for the schoolboy eights in a great finish in good conditions and the Walford Anglican School for Girls of Adelaide taking out the schoolgirl eights.

In recognition of the outstanding achievement of gold medal winning crews at the 1993 World Championships, Gary Lynagh and Bruce Hick, and coach Bob Bleakley, of the mens lightweight double scull and Victoria Toogood and Alison Davies , and coach Simon Gillett of the womens coxless pair received presentation oars at the 1994 Australian Championships. President Islay Lee made the presentations on behalf of the ARC.

The Australian Rowing Council acknowledged the resounding contribution made to the sport of rowing by Mr Reg McKay as President of the ARC from 1989 - 1994. A framed photograph of the Olympic rowing champions was presented to Mr McKay on behalf of the ARC by Islay Lee.

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

# 1994 World Rowing Championships

## Introduction

Upon the announcement that Sydney would host the 2000 Olympic Games, the Olympic Gold Medal Plan was quickly finalised as between the ARC, the Australian Sports Commission and the Australian Olympic Committee.

The GMP became the OAP when the ongoing funding levels for all sports were announced early in the year by the Sports Minister, Senator John Faulkner.

Significant boosts to the level of funding for rowing and in particular for international competition was received by the ARC effective from the 1st July 1994. Against this development and the blunt announcement by the Executive Director the Australian Sports Commission Mr Jim Ferguson at an AOC workshop in Sydney in May that funding levels would bear a close relationship to results and especially medals at the World Championships level, planning for Australia's rowing team for the world junior and senior championships had an additional dimension.

The ARC Board and Head Coach agreed to boat as many crews at the World Championships as could be justified under the prior selection policy.

After exhaustive trials at Carrum in the first week of May 1994, followed by international regattas at Vienna and Lucerne in July, the Australian Team comprised 20 crews.

Whilst attending the Commonwealth Regatta in London, Ontario, St George sculler Bronwyn Roye, was added to the World Championships entry so that the Australian team competed in 21 of the 22 events comprising the World Championships program.

## The Commonwealth Regatta

The 1994 Commonwealth Games were held in British Columbia, Canada but rowing was not a Commonwealth Games sport.

The Commonwealth rowing countries had agreed at a conference in Turin, Italy, in June 1992 on the occasion of the FISA Centenary Congress, to conduct a Commonwealth Regatta with the Canadian Amateur Rowing Association hosting the regatta at London, Ontario.

The largest ever Australian Rowing Team left for a training camp in Canada on 11th August. It comprised 59 rowers, 4 coxswains, 1 Head Coach, 2 managers, 2 physiotherapists, 1 masseur, 2 doctors, 2 boatmen, 15 coaches and 6 reserve rowers.

After an extensive training camp, the team assembled for the Commonwealth Regatta.

The Team Manager, David Taylor reports:

"the Australian Team was the most successful team in the medal tally only to be surpassed by the Canadian Team for the gold medal count. Although pressed in some races and possibly not performing to the team's expectations, it should be remembered that the team did not taper for this regatta as it would have seriously damaged preparations for the world championships which were our ultimate goal."

It should be noted that the regatta was held on the 29th - 30th August just eleven days prior to the commencement of the World Rowing Championships.

## Indianapolis

At the last FISA Congress presided over by former FISA President Thomas Keller, at Bled in the former Yugoslavia in August 1989, the United State Rowing Association had it's bid for the 1994 World Rowing Championships to be held at Indianapolis endorsed.

Never before had the World Championships been held in the USA thus history was in the making as the Australian team, one of a record number of forty-six nations, assembled in Indianapolis on the 8th September 1994 for the World Championships.

The Organising Committee, under the Chairmanship of Ms Mo Merhoff clearly had done a remarkable job to prepare the course at Eagle Creek for the titles.

From an organisational point of view and by reference to the facilities provided by the Americans a first class result was achieved. The city of Indianapolis was a fine host to the world rowing community.

The early days of racing were held in ideal conditions but on semi-final day a strong cross tail wind affected the competition. Delays and postponements occurred. Whilst the tail wind did not leave the venue for the two days of finals, its velocity was not great and the racing in the finals was exceptional both as to times recorded and tenacity shown in racing.

Australia qualified into 12 finals - a record, beating the 10 finals appearances at the 1993 championships in the Czech Republic.

However, gold medals alluded the Australian team as one silver and three bronze medals were won.

Canberra's Bruce Hick and Brisbane's Gary Lynagh entered the international rowing scene winning a bronze medal in the men's lightweight quad scull at Lake Barrington in 1990. Thereafter, they have won three consecutive gold medals - again in the lightweight quad in Vienna in 1991 and then in the lightweight double scull in 1992 (Montreal) and 1993 (Roudnice). This year they moved away from sculling to the lightweight coxless four teaming with James Seppelt and Andrew Stunell of Adelaide. The crew was coached by Matt Draper. From a field of eleven crews, they won the silver medal behind Denmark.

The selection trials at Carrum in May had shown that a largely untried combination of Richard Wearne and Robert Walker were impressive in the coxless pair. The crew, coached in Sydney by Harald Jahrling burst onto the international scene not only to qualify for the final but to grab the bronze medal in a field of thirteen crews. Remarkably, the crew was only 1.60 seconds behind the World and Olympic champions, Steve Redgrave and Matthew Pinset of Great Britain.

This race showed that Australia's younger brigade of rowers were quickly developing into medalists. This theme was continued when Adelaide's Anna Ozolins and Carmen Klomp, coached by Paul Thompson, won the bronze medal from ten crews in the women's coxless pair.

Further, the rising strength of women's rowing in Australia was evidenced in the women's four. The crew of Alison Davies; Megan Still; Kate Slatter and Victoria Toogood also won a bronze medal behind the Netherlands and USA but just 2.09 seconds from the gold medal. The crew was also coached by Paul Thompson at the AIS. Davies and Toogood, together with Ozolins and Klomp originated from Adelaide and their rowing careers have been developed through the South Australian Sports Institute.

Other pleasing results achieved by Australian crews in the finals was the Women's Quad Scull

(4th), the Mens Lightweight Quad Scull (5th) and the Men's Quad Scull (4th).

After winning the gold medal at the Lucerne International Regatta in July, hopes were high for the men's coxed four coached by Reinhold Batschi at the AIS. The crew came fifth in the World Championships in one of the closest races where only 3.76 seconds covered the entire field.

In other aspects of the Championships, Barcelona Olympic Gold Medalist Stephen Hawkins could not maintain the form which has won for him and Australia four medals at consecutive World Championships and Olympic competition since 1990, to finish 12th in the men's lightweight single scull. Stephen will however be back next year. Peter Antonie of the Melbourne University Boat Club came 9th in the men's double scull in a field of 19 crews in this the 18th year he has represented Australia. Bronwyn Roye of the St George Rowing Club in Sydney was initially selected in the women's quad but was later entered in the women's single scull. She gave a fine first up performance and possibly Australia's best ever result in the women's single scull championship, by not only reaching the final in a field of 13 scullers but achieving 5th place. Former World Champion in 1985, Adair Ferguson of Canberra finished 6th in the women's lightweight single scull. In his 42nd year, Phil Gardiner of the Barwon Rowing Club, teamed with Derek Mollison to achieve 8th place in a field of 16 crews for the lightweight coxless pair. The pair were badly affected by the lane draw in their semi-final, when, for a time, conditions were unequal.

In a later comment on the World Championships the President of the ARC Islay Lee summed up the results by expressing some disappointment in that more finalists did not achieve medals but added, with enthusiasm, that the young age of the rowers who not only reached the finals but achieved medals provided the ARC with optimism for the World Championships in Finland in 1995 and the Atlanta Olympic Games in 1996.

There were no rowing events for disabled rowers in Indianapolis.

The list of the entire Australian Rowing Team including coaches follows together with the results of all elimination and final events.

### World Junior Championships

The ARC endorsed the selection of five crews to compete in the World Junior Championships at Munich, Germany from 2nd - 7th August 1994.

The team travelled to The Nations Cup, Paris for competition en-route to Munich.

A record number of nations boated crews in Munich (62 countries) thereby providing the best evidence to date of the success of the FISA Development Program in Central and South East Asia and Central and South America.

Australia's only **GOLD MEDAL** in 1994 at the World Championships was achieved by Adelaide's Amy Safe in the Women's Single Scull. Twenty four scullers competed in the elimination rounds requiring six races in each of the heats and repechages. Amy was coached by Simon Gillett. She defeated the French Sculler Celine Garcia in the final by a mere .19 seconds. New Zealand's rising junior sculler, Angela Fife was sixth.

Thereafter, three Australian crews not only made the finals but clinched bronze medals. The Adelaide based men's coxed four coached by Barbara Gillett and comprising Neil Oakes; Wade Barber; Ben Chapman; Monte Goulding and coxswain Stuart Masson were third behind Romania and Germany.

The two double scull crews also won bronze medals.

The Adelaide crew of Tami Stone and Anna Tree, coached by Peter Tierney took third place behind Switzerland and Germany in a field of 18 crews. The Brisbane based duo of Martin Ingliss (originating from Armidale, NSW) and Hamish Karrasch - coached by Jack Hutchinson won their bronze medal behind France and Germany in a field of an incredible 29 crews. The women's junior pair of Racheal Taylor and Sarah Coconis, coached at the AIS by Gordon Marcks were 5th in the final in an event which attracted 11 entries.

Five crews; five finals; four medals - a great result for the team members and for Australian Rowing.

### Under-23 Trans Tasman Series and The Nations Cup

The 1994 Trans Tasman Series was hosted by the South Australian Rowing Association on the West Lakes course on the 6th, 8th - 9th of July.

The three day regatta was held in ideal conditions.

In addition to teams competing from Australian and New Zealand, state based crews from Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia and Cambridge (New Zealand) added to the spectacle of racing.

The convenor of the regatta was Mr Hamish McLaughlin.

The most successful crew was from Australia being the double scull of Matt Cordery and Ralph Cruickshank. They were the only crew undefeated over the three days of competition.

The Australian womens four, coached by Pam Westerndorf won two of three races.

At all times, the racing was tight in each of the three events with just the Australian mens double scull dominant. The mens eight, coached by Noel Donaldson, won by barely a bow ball on the Wednesday but were convincing winners by over 3 seconds on Friday. As a clear example of the benefits of this competition in the development of rowing, the New Zealand Head Coach Harry Mahon, made wholesale seating changes to the New Zealand crew for the final mens eight's race on Saturday morning. In a brilliant race, the Kiwi's won by two metres.

The point score went to the wire but the "Rusty Robertson Trophy" was clinched for Australian when the womens double scull, twice beaten by New Zealand in the earlier outings, finished the regatta with a strong and popular win.

Hence, the trophy was retained by Australia and was presented to the stroke of the Australian mens double scull, Matt Cordery.

The future of the Trans Tasman Series came under Board and Head Coach consideration when New Zealand failed to honour an earlier agreed commitment to send lightweight fours and double sculls. This advice was received quite late which was disruptive for the Australian crews which had been selected at Carrum in May expecting NZ competition. The Board has resolved to change the format of the series in the future to be mainly an interstate competition with New Zealand and other international crews invited to compete. At largely their own expense but with some financial support from state based institutes, the mens lightweight four; womens lightweight double scull; mens lightweight double scull; Matt Cordery as the mens single scull; the mens coxless pair and the mens eight travelled to Europe to compete in the Lucerne International Regatta and importantly, "The Nations Cup" which was held on the

course at "Varies sur Marne" in Paris.

The womens lightweight double scull not only made the final but the delight of the long serving Penrith coach, Lindsay Callaghan, took the bronze medal in a field of eleven crews.

Phil Cayzer's (Sydney Rowing Club) crew not only made the final of the mens lightweight coxless four but came fourth in a very tight race.

The mens lightweight double scull, coached by Reg Free and Tim McLaren also won a bronze medal in a field of nine crews.

Matt Cordery was ninth of sixteen single scullers.

Eleven crews competed for the mens eight with the Australian crew making the final in what was tipped to be a very close race. At the 1000 metre mark in the final, only three seconds separated the six finalists. Australia finished fourth in a blanket finish just .38 second from the bronze medal.

The Stewart twin brothers, James and Geoff from the UTS Haberfield club in Sydney, coached by Tim McLaren, won a silver medal behind Italy in a field of twelve crews.

Members of the Australian Junior Team also competed in The Nations Cup. Further, of the Under-23s, six crews competed, five made the final, three medals were won and two fourth placings were achieved - another great result for our developing rowers.

The team was managed by Graeme Boykett of Melbourne and Dr Steve Hinchy provided medical support.

In concluding his report, Graeme Boykett advised that it was:-

"... a worthwhile decision to send a team to The Nations Cup, and I am sure that all members have benefited. ...It is generally recognised that The Nations Cup is a world championships even though it is limited to a specific grading of rower as is the junior worlds."

### World Masters Games

For the first time, the World Masters Games in all sports was convened in Australia. Under the leadership of Ms Louis Appleby "masters" competitors in many sports from many countries assembled in Brisbane in late September / early October for the competition.

The rowing segment drew an exceptionally high entry. The competition was held at Lake Wivenhoe. Much of the organisation and the conduct of the rowing regatta fell to members of Rowing Queensland. Despite difficult head wind conditions, the organisers and competitors enjoyed their regatta. Entries for all sports exceeded 22,000 way beyond the expectations of the World Masters Organising Committee.

### World University Championships

Two entries from Australian universities were forwarded to the organising committee in Groningen, The Netherlands.

The World Universities Rowing Championships were held from June 13th - 19th 1994.

A coxed four from the Tasmanian University Boat Club won a silver medal behind Holland in tough conditions. The crew comprised Stuart Poole, Sam Manson, Ralph Hobbs, Robert Grant and coxswain David Buck. The crew was coached by former Brighton Grammar oarsman Cameron Crichton.

University of NSW sculler, Richard Roach competed in the mens single scull and achieved ninth place.





## National Director of Coaching Education

### Report from Doug White

#### Coaching Education

The level 1 and 2 syllabuses were submitted to the Australian Coaching Council in December 1993. They were returned to the NDCE for revisions. The revisions to Level 1 and 2 syllabuses were completed and circulated to the members of the National Coaching Commission for comment. They were forwarded to the Australian Coaching Council for ratification.

The Level 1 and 2 Updating Policy was prepared and now has been ratified by the ACC. A public piece was assembled and has now been circulated to the State Coaching Directors for distribution. An article explaining the policy was published in Australian Rowing in order to publicise the policy. The Updating policy is now part of the Level 1 and 2 course curriculum.

A course procedures document has been completed and distributed to the State Coaching Directors for immediate use.

Level 3 course outline has been discussed with the ACC and agreement has been reached to base level 3 on the scholarship coach program with a practical component that will include working with the State Coaching Director or an approved coach on special coaching projects.

Approval in principle has been given by the ACC to give level 3 equivalency to a number of coaches who have coached internationally for several years and who have attended the National Coaches Conference since 1990. A list of coaches was assembled and sent to the ACC. They responded with the criteria for level 3 equivalency and stated that a level 3 syllabus is required before equivalency can be granted. Work has begun on level 3.

The Instructors Kit for level 1 has been planned and is being assembled.

In the fiscal year July 1, 1993 to June 30, 1994, 16 coaching education courses were held, (11 level 1 and 5 level 2 courses). Over 200 hundred coaches took the NCAS courses last year. Queensland was the most active state holding 6 courses in total.

#### Intensive Training Centre Report

The semi annual reports on the Intensive Training Centres were completed and forwarded the ASC in January 1994 and July 1994. For the year end report, the ASC sent a formatted questionnaire that was forwarded to each ITC for completion. The intention was to standardise the reporting formats sport to sport for the sake of comparability. It was easier to collate the data in the questionnaires state to state due to this fact.

#### Coaching Conference

The coaching conference was organised for Oct. 1993 in Canberra. Coaches presentations were done on the Saturday with discussions on planning discussed on Sunday. Two physiologists observed the coaches presentations and presented recommendations regarding the training programmes to the coaches. In addition, there was discussion on an alternative Gold Medal Plan assembled by the Coaches Commission.

#### Coaching Commission

The National Coaching Commission met three times this last year in October, March and May.

The first meeting was on Monday and Tuesday 18 and 19 of October. There was a variety of topics on the agenda. There was a discussion as to the functions and reporting procedures of the commission so that everyone will be clear on its future role. Most of the meeting was taken up with discussions on planning through to the 1996 Olympics and the Gold Medal Plan proposal of the ARC.

The coaching commission met in Adelaide March 14 to provide input on the Talent Identification Program for the Gold Medal Plan. Due to time and travel constraints no other topics were discussed.

The commission met in Melbourne May 20, 1994 prior to the National Coaches Conference. My role as chairman was discussed and with the appointment of a head coach it was felt the head coach should be the chairman. I resigned as chairman and Simon Gillett assumed the chair. The meeting involved discussions around the functions of the head coach and planning for the upcoming international season.

### ACT Coaching Position

As the ARC representative responsible for the ITCs, I was asked to be part of the selection panel for the ACT coaching position. I was consulted on the duty statement, interview procedures and was part of the interview panel. Five coaches were interviewed for the position with the successful candidate being Nick Hunter. The interview panel was unanimous in the decision that he was the most suitable candidate.

### Trans Tasman U23

I was directed to attempt to increase the participation at the Trans Tasman Regatta. I decided to target Pacific Rim nations following up on contacts made at a meeting in Banyoles in 1992 where such a concept was discussed. I received enthusiastic support from FISA regarding the idea but was cautioned that Asian countries may not be able to afford the trip. Invitations were sent to all countries bordering the Pacific Ocean.

Responses were received from USA, Canada, Hong Kong and Indonesia. In all cases financial constraints were a problem. USA was very interested. As an incentive, I committed the organisers to supplying ground transport while in Australia and accommodation. Transport had been arranged by using a bus from SASI and free cars through a rental agency. Accommodation was covered by billeting. Unfortunately the U 23 budget for the US men was taken away to pay for cost over runs at the Worlds in Indianapolis.

Canadian officials said they were committed to coming to Australia in 1996 and that funds would be allocated for the trip. South Africa informed me they would like to develop closer ties with Australia and would have come this year if the competition had not been so close to the Nations Cup

Indonesia expressed interest in attending the regatta in the future if we could secure some financial assistance. An application for funding was sent to the Australian-Indonesian Foundation with the support of the ASC - Australian College of Sports Education. The Indonesians did not attend the regatta but the Australian - Indonesian Foundation have asked the ARC to resubmit a funding proposal for next year to follow up on the original submission. This would include a coaching exchange during the summer and a training camp in Australia prior to the Trans Tasman Regatta. The application will be forwarded to the Foundation for their consideration. I will seek the endorsement of the Australian Coaching Council as well. I am hoping this project will result in international participation at the Trans Tasman Regatta in the future.

A subsequent meeting with these countries at Indianapolis confirmed the interest in coming to Australia for the Trans Tasman series. South Africa, Canada and USA all expressed interest for 1996 but want to be informed about 1995.

#### Rowing Research Committee

As chairman of the Rowing Research Committee, I organised including travel arrangements and ran the meeting which was held in Canberra. The meeting brought together sports scientists involved in rowing research, medical staff and the NDCE. The Head Coach Simon Gillett and Reinhold Batschi were not available for the meeting. The committee discussed several issues including terms of reference for the committee, research needs for the sport and research projects that are currently underway. The committee developed the outline of terms of reference for the committee which the chairman completed and circulated to the committee for comment.

The Terms of reference were submitted to the Board for discussion and decision.

#### National Team

I had the opportunity to attend the assembly camp for the national team crews held in Penrith. I assisted Prof. Theo Korner with many of the organisational tasks to allow him to spend as much time with the coaches and crews as possible before they left for Europe. I video taped the crews while training to assist the coaches. I was pleased to be involved in the camp as it allowed me to observe the crews and talk to the coaches re: their training and technique the crews were using. I felt it was a very worthwhile for me to attend the camp and to be involved at that level. It is important that I keep up with any new trends at that level of competition.

In April, I was involved with the new selection process and assisted with timing of the time trials at Carrum May 6 to 14. In addition, at this selection regatta and camp I acted as regatta manager on site and during the camp was in charge of allocating equipment to crews. I provided assistance to the head coach and selectors during the camp at Carrum.

#### Indonesian Trip

The Australian Coaching Council requested assistance with a coaching exchange trip to Indonesia. Due to the fact that the timing of the trip coincided with the first selection regatta an elite coach was not available. The ARC decided the NDCE would go. The trip was for two weeks during which I acted as an advisor to their national team coaches and ran seminars for club coaches.

#### Overseas Tours Committee

I assisted with the Overseas Tours committee the middle of last year. I was to represent the coaches opinions through the National Coaches Commission and I was directed to find a suitable training camp site for the team prior to the World Championships in Indianapolis. Several sites were recommended and the information directed to David Taylor.

#### Conclusion

This past year has been a one of change which has proven to be disruptive at times. Considering that I was learning the procedures of the position during this period, I am satisfied with the progress this year. The job duties have changed with the hiring of the Head Coach. Since, many of my former duties have now been transferred to the head coach, I will be able to concentrate primarily on coaching education. As the office has now been stabilised, I am looking ahead to a more productive year with the ARC.

## Preamble

This report covers the period 19 May to 31 October 1994, during which time the main activities were promotion of the Vienna and Lucerne International Regattas, the trans-Tasman under 23 Regatta in Adelaide, the Nations Cup Regatta in Paris, the World Junior Championships in Munich, the Commonwealth Regatta in London, Ontario, and the 1994 World Rowing Championships in Indianapolis. However, other activities were undertaken and are reported on, and recommendations are made.

## Overview

In order to ensure successful coverage of these activities it was necessary to ensure the established national media 'network' remained intact and the Council's media list was constantly monitored and updated. Contact was maintained with all those in the media network and as many media people as possible. At the time of writing, and following two resignations, there is no official member of the National Media Network for Western Australia or Tasmania. This, however, is being addressed.

My function became considerably more professional early in the period in question when CEO David Schier arranged for me to take delivery of one of Council's fax machines. Until then a somewhat cumbersome system had existed wherein media releases prepared by me were distributed by the office - a time-consuming exercise that detracted from the office's other activities. While in Indianapolis, I also used Council's newly acquired Fax Modem, an even more sophisticated piece of equipment. In time, the acquisition of further such equipment would enable me to be in touch even more directly and frequently with my media contacts than is currently possible.

Coverage of all events and activities was obtained through a constantly refined system of media releases to the media network and media outlets. Australian Associated Press was also regularly used. Where regattas were concerned, a 'preview' release would be followed up by a series of 'results' releases for the duration of the event, which network members would 'localise' to great effect based on State or capital city representation within national teams. Most members of the media network, notably Wal Oakley, Roger Wilson, Michael Wilson, Will Gray and Phil Mangelsdorf also have electronic skills, particularly radio, that they used to great effect. Attempts were naturally made to exploit 'household' names such as the Oarsome Foursome, Peter Antonie, Stephen Hawkins and Adair Ferguson - a feature article I wrote for AAP on Adair, for example, was used or adapted by at least two national newspapers. However, there was also recognition during the international season of the generational change taking place in Australian rowing, hence the increased and deserved attention given to the exploits of athletes such as Amy Safe.

'Controversial' issues' were also exploited to good effect, notably the decision to disband the men's eight originally selected for the world championships and the appeal for the return of rowing to the Commonwealth Games program. It was also interesting to note the additional attention given to rowing by provincial print outlets, particularly in New South Wales, while there were also particular journalists, notably

Rowena Newcomen of the West Australian, who increasingly 'adopted' rowing. That is not to say, however, that 'weak spots' do not remain, and these are being addressed.

Some coverage was obtained on the mainland of the Intervarsity Regatta in Tasmania, while the World Masters organisation successfully took advantage of the 'hiatus' period following the end of football seasons to gain good national coverage of the regatta at Lake Wivenhoe.

All coverage also reflected the gender equity to which Council aspires.

**A comprehensive record has been kept of all print and electronic coverage. This is far too large, however, for it to be distributed individually. A 'master' copy will therefore be presented at the Annual General Meeting, and copies made on request.**

### World Rowing Championships, Indianapolis

Upon learning that I was to be in Indianapolis, I prepared a comprehensive television, radio and print strategy. I was particularly keen, having learned of the television coverage planned by the Organising Committee, to ensure comprehensive coverage for Australia. I therefore arranged through the Seven network that ATN-7 TV, Sydney, should be the 'gateway' station for all five Australian television networks. The service from Indianapolis was to comprise edited satellite 'feeds' via Seven's Los Angeles bureau on semi-finals day and on each of the two finals days, and would be complemented by faxed scripts. All networks were informed of the service - and the results were very rewarding. Good coverage was obtained, and compliments received from all networks. A further bonus is that it appears Seven have borne the satellite costs.

David Schier and I also obtained from the television production company in Indianapolis 20 minutes of Beta (broadcast-quality) file footage. This has been added to a 'master' tape of national and international coverage, but will also be used in the preparation of a variety of promotional tools, eg corporate or promotional videos (see below), news 'file footage' or television commercials.

Similar, although less comprehensive arrangements were made for radio networks and print outlets, all of which were more than ably complemented by the national media network. The result was unprecedented overall coverage.

While in Indianapolis, I also attended, with David Schier, two FISA marketing seminars. These proved very interesting, and the material obtained has already been put to good use.

### Acknowledgements

I am again very grateful to all members of the interstate network for their help, particularly Wal Oakley, Michael Wilson and Will Gray. Their efforts during the world championships were greatly appreciated.

Team officials and managers also rendered valuable assistance. Michael Eastaughffe was particularly effective during the European regattas, while David Taylor came to the fore later in the international program. Graeme Boykett, Steve Hinchy and Peter Huggett sent comprehensive despatches from the Nations Cup and the World Junior Championships that enabled greater than usual coverage of these events.

The Australian rowing community also owes a real debt of gratitude to John Croll, whose company, Croll's Media Monitoring, has provided a remarkably comprehensive and regular press and electronic media monitoring service. While this has already stood us in good stead, it will, I'm sure, prove even more valuable as we increase our sponsor-seeking efforts.

Finally, I am particularly grateful to David Schier, for his continued encouragement and assistance. As was mentioned in my previous report, David has a fundamental belief in the importance of media and marketing operations, and never was this more cogently or ably demonstrated than prior to and during the world championships. Having had the foresight and tenacity to ensure I made the trip to Indianapolis and made arrangements for the necessary phone, fax and other communications facilities to be in place, his efforts in ensuring that the national media network in Australia remained fully informed were unstinting. They also enabled me to concentrate almost entirely on the Australian media. His support has been remarkable, and much appreciated.

#### Ongoing activities

Following consultations with the CEO, I am currently preparing, as part of Council's marketing effort, a short video of Australia's participation at the 1994 world championships in Indianapolis based on the footage obtained while in the United States (see above).

I am continuing to update the biographies list begun earlier in the year. This is important not only in the context of media information but also as a management tool prior to and during the world championships and lead-up regattas. Publications obtained at Indianapolis from the German, Dutch and Canadian teams demonstrate the degree of sophistication possible in this regard.

A further task is the compiling of a photo library. While the press coverage obtained during the period in question was extensive, conspicuous by its absence is pictorial content. Again, this is important in terms both of media liaison and as a management tool.

I have also been giving further thought to coverage of next year's Australian Championships and King's Cup Regatta in Western Australia. I made mention in my first report of the basic facilities required - two dedicated telephones, a fax, desks and chairs and a self-contained cabin - but also believe Council and the WA Organising Committee should be giving consideration to photo/gramming and 'gateway' television facilities. WA is, after all, three hours behind the eastern (target) States at that time of the year, and Collie a long way from Perth. Only if such a facility is available will we be able to provide the service national television will need. I had

preliminary discussions with Berry Durston on this issue while in Indianapolis, and at the time of writing was continuing these negotiations.

I have also completed recently the National Accreditation Scheme for Sports Administrators (NASSA) Level Two course. My major assignment was the preparation of a sponsorship proposal - which was naturally predicated on Australian rowing! I have passed on a copy to David Schier for use by him as required.

It has also become apparent to me during this extremely busy period that while the media operation continues to be very successful, there remains so much more that can be achieved in terms of Council's overall media and marketing operation. With this in mind, and following consultations with the CEO, I have begun preparing a duty statement for such a position, using as a 'starting point' my current media plan, editorship of the national magazine and oversight of Council's marketing operations. This will be submitted to the Board and Council as soon as possible.

### Recommendations

Given the infrastructure put in place and the coverage gained from the 1994 world championships, it is strongly recommended that in future the National Media Director be regarded as an official member of the Australian team and that this be budgeted for accordingly.

I am also considering a recommendation that Council hire an Australian cameraman to cover the Tampere world championships. While the pictures obtained from Indianapolis were excellent, they were of a generic rather than Australian-specific nature. I shall, however, await reaction to the aforementioned video before pursuing this matter further.

I also firmly believe that in the event Wal Oakley continues to contribute the time he does, particularly during the international season, Council should consider reimbursing at least some of what I know to be his considerable telephone and fax expenses. He was unstinting in his efforts during the world championships, and these are worthy of at least some financial recognition.

### Summary

The period in question has seen further interest in and coverage of our sport. The progressive policies being adopted by the Board and Council and the onset of the Atlanta Olympic Games should provide exceptional opportunities to continue and expand upon our good media performance.

FISA ORDINARY ANNUAL CONGRESS  
HOTEL PYRAMIDA, PRAGUE  
SATURDAY 28th AUGUST 9.00AM

1. Opening of the Congress

The President, Denis Oswald, declared the Congress open at 9.05 a.m. He welcomed the delegates and informed them that FISA was facing a number of important issues following the Budapest Extraordinary Congress of January, and some of those issues would be dealt with today.

Otakar Marecek, the President of the Czech Rowing Association, welcomed Delegates and the FISA Council to the Congress and to the Czech Republic and wished them well in their deliberations. This welcome was supported by Karel Spacek, the Secretary General of the Czech National Olympic committee.

The President reported on the sad death of the Treasurer of FISA, Peter Coni, last July, shortly after the Henley Royal and Rotsee Regattas which he had attended. The Congress observed a minute's silence for Peter Coni, and other rowing friends who had passed away since the last Congress.

The President made some remarks about the procedure to be followed during the Congress.

2. Identification of Delegates and Confirmation of their Authority

The Secretary General conducted a roll call. A list of delegates attending is an annexure to these Minutes. He reported that there were 49 federations represented, and that in all this meant 111 votes. The clear majority would be 56, and the two thirds majority would be 75. The members of the FISA Council were all present, with the exceptions of Leonid Drachevsky and Ivan Dibos who could both not attend for professional reasons, and Paula Oyer and Kurt Hipper who were absent for health reasons.

3. Appointment of Scrutineers for the period of the Congress

The President proposed that Michael Stephanides (CYP), Helmar Hasenoehrl (AUT) and Douglas Calder (CAY) be appointed scrutineers, and this was accepted by the Congress.

4. Approval of the Minutes of the 1992 Ordinary Congress held in Turin, Italy

The minutes for the 1992 Congress had been distributed to all federations. There were no matters raised about the Minutes and they were adopted by the Congress.

5. Approval of the Minutes of the 1993 Extraordinary Congress held in Budapest, Hungary

The Minutes of the Extraordinary Congress had also been distributed to the federations. The Secretary General noted that the list of attendees was wrong in that it did not include the delegates from Slovakia. He apologised and sought to have the minutes amended to this effect. Bernard Janisch (RSA) noted that also the South African delegates were missing from the list, although present, and he sought that the minutes be amended likewise. The Minutes as amended were adopted.

6. President's Report and Report from the Executive Committee Members

The President noted that since writing his report the 1993 World Championships for Juniors had been conducted very successfully at Aarungen, Norway, and he congratulated the Norwegian Federation on their organisation.

Claus Hess had nothing to add to his report.

Roland Weill added that arrangements for the "Other Forms of Rowing" Meeting in Brest (FRA) were proceeding and asked interested federations to contact him.

There were no matters raised by Delegates about the President's or any of the Vice Presidents' reports.

John Boultbee underlined the work done by volunteers from inside and outside of the Council, as mentioned in his report. He mentioned that it seemed rare to find such dedication to hard work in international federations.

The reports were adopted unanimously.

7. Reports from the Chairmen of the Specialist Commissions

Mike Sweeney, Chairman of the Regattas and Technical Installations Commission reported on trials of the new Agostart starting system recently carried out during the Mediterranean Games in France. The system was generally very promising, and further discussions were needed with the manufacturer to ensure that it would work in a failsafe manner.

Borge Kaas-Andersen, Chairman of the Umpiring Commission had nothing to add to his report.

Klaus Filter, Chairman of the Materials Commission, reported on the recent despatching of a container of 25 boats for South East Asia as part of the Boat Collection Scheme. The President emphasised the importance of this scheme and thanked those who had assisted with it.

Denis Masseglia (FRA) reported that the introduction of "big blades" was having a negative effect on the national level, because now all crews of whatever standard wanted to use them, and it was becoming very expensive for clubs. Klaus Filter explained again the reasons behind FISA's principle of free construction, and pointed out that there were simple and cheap ways of converting old oars to big blades. He would write an article for FISA Info on this point. The President noted the problem and that same countries had banned these blades at the junior level.

Denis Masseglia (FRA) made the point that there was a potential conflict between the principle of free construction and the development of rowing, as this case indicated.

Thor Nilsen, Chairman of the Competitive Rowing Commission, noted the work done in development in the last year. He noted, however, that there were only few developing countries at this year's championships because of funding difficulties in a post-Olympic year. He invited the Development Director, Matt Smith, to report in some more detail on the development activities, which he did. He also thanked those countries who had helped with boats for developing countries and countries with financial difficulties at the championships.

Magdalena Sarbochova, Chairwoman of the Women's Rowing Commission reported that at Aarungen there were 41 competing federations, and 31 of them entered in women's events, where there were 66 boats and 189 participants. She reported on the Junior Coaches' Meeting held at the Championships and on the planned Women's Coaching Seminar to be held next March.

Wilfried Hoffman, Chairman of the Junior Rowing Commission, had nothing to add to his report.

Jannus Boelen, Chairman of the Masters Rowing Commission added to his report the comment that his Commission did not agree with recent British moves to increase the minimum age for Masters to 31.

Bo Gammals, Chairman of the Pleasure Rowing Commission, thanked the Norwegian Federation for hosting the recent successful Junior Rowing Tour in Norway.

Fritz Hagerman, Chairman of the Sports Medicine Commission welcomed the new member of his Commission, Axel Urhausen (GER). He requested national federations to embark on campaigns to educate their team staff on doping matters, in particular, and the FISA Rules of Racing in general.

There were no questions raised by the report of Paula Oyer, Chairwoman of the Marketing, Sponsorship and Financing Commission.

Paul Koelliker, Chairman of the Public Relations and Media Commission introduced the new brochure "Rowing - the Ultimate Olympic Sport" prepared by his Commission and mentioned it was available for the use of federations.

The above reports were adopted by the Congress.

## 8. Reports of the Continental Representatives

Kurt Hipper, the representative for Africa was not present, but attention was drawn to the recent developments in Africa, particularly the formation of the African Rowing Federation.

Pablo Span, the representative for North America noted that his report mistakenly referred to Sam Craig rather than Joe Grey as the President of Rowing Canada.

There were no questions about the report of Ivan Dibos, the representative for South America, and Ricardo Ibarra, the FISA Coaching Consultant for Latin America was available to deal with any matters in this area.

Zhang Qing, the representative for Asia noted that the Asian Rowing Federation was now 10 years old, and that China wanted to bid for the 1998 World Championships.

John Coates, the representative for Oceania had nothing to add to his report.

Henrik Lotz (GER) said that the reports were most informative, but did not mention the retirement from activity of two long-standing FISA Commission members, Daina Sveica (LAT) from the Women's Commission and Miljenko Finderle (CRO) from the Umpiring Commission. He expressed his gratitude for their work.

The Congress adopted the reports.

## 9. Accounts, Financial Report and Auditor's Report 1992

The accounts and the financial report had been prepared by the Treasurer Peter Coni, shortly before his death. They were presented to the Congress by the Secretary General. He paid tribute to Peter Coni's careful and thorough work during his term as Treasurer.

He pointed out that over the past years Congress had approved budgets that ate into the reserves of FISA and that some of the Barcelona television income had had to be used during 1992. Careful financial management will be needed during the next four years to re-establish adequate reserves. He was able to report, however, that during 1992 the finances had been so managed that about SFr 160,000 less had to be taken from reserves than the amount the budget had foreseen being taken and this was a pleasing sign.

However, to ensure that FISA's finances can be put on a more solid basis in the future, more funds had to be raised, and this can only occur through professional help.

The Belgian federation was ready to answer any questions on behalf of the auditor, but there were none.

The financial report and the accounts were adopted.

## 10. Determination of Entrance Fee and Annual Subscription

The President pointed out that the services to the federations had improved enormously since the establishment of the professional secretariat, but that there had been no corresponding increase in the annual fee paid by the federations. The Council did not propose any increase in the fee for the coming year, but advised the Congress that during the year it would consider whether there should be an increase in the future.

The Congress approved the Council's proposal for the fees for 1994.

## 11. Budget 1994

The Budget had been circulated and the Secretary General spoke to it. He pointed out that in 1994 there would be no income from Swiss Life as sponsorship of FISA Info, because of a marketing strategy change in that company. He also noted that the Budget proposed an increase of expenditure in the Development Programme area. To make up for these factors savings had to be made elsewhere.

The Congress adopted the budget.

## 12. Elections

### (a) President

Denis Oswald announced that he was standing for re-election. He said he needed a few terms to achieve the results he sought. He expected that a period of 8 to 12 years was adequate for a President of an international federation.

Claus Hess took over the Chair. He noted that this would be his last task as a Vice President in a Congress. He thanked Denis Oswald for his impressive work he had done since the death of Thomas Keller. He said FISA should profit from his good relations with other organisations.

Denis Oswald was unanimously re-elected by a show of hands.

He thanked Claus Hess for his kind words and the delegates for their confidence and support.

### (b) Vice Presidents

The President noted that Claus Hess was not standing for re-election. He had been elected to the FISA Council in 1968 and soon took over the Competitive Rowing Commission. He was very active in the field of development and was able to secure a number of partnerships in this field, notably, recently with the German National Olympic Committee. He had been active in the German Rowing Federation, as a President, and now President of Honour. He is a Vice President of the German NOC and a former European Champion.

The Council proposed that he be elected a Vice President of Honour. This proposal was adopted by applause.

Claus Hess was then presented with a silver salver in recognition of his service to FISA.

Claus Hess thanked the Congress for its generosity and kind thoughts. He said that he hoped that FISA would never lose its sense of fairness, solidarity and independence, and would continue to work for international understanding and peace.

The candidates for election to the three positions of Vice President were presented to the Congress.

Joe Grey, the President of the Canadian federation presented Sam Craig; Frank Coyle presented Anita DeFrantz on behalf of the United States federation; the Russian President, Mr. Dassan-Djalolov spoke in support of Leonid Drachevsky; Janne Hallengren, President of the Danish federation introduced Borge Kaas-Andersen; and Denis Masseglia, the French President presented Roland Weill.

The Congress then adjourned for coffee at 10.45.

At 11.15 the Congress resumed, and voting on the positions of Vice President proceeded by secret ballot.

Whilst the votes were being counted Sjoerd Zittema representing the Dutch Adaptive Rowing Foundation made a presentation to the Congress about rowing for the disabled.

The result of the vote was as follows:

Roland Weill	86 votes
Anita DeFrantz	84 votes
Leonid Drachevsky	72 votes
Borge Kaas-Andersen	55 votes
Sam Craig	22 votes

Roland Weill, Anita DeFrantz and Leonid Drachevsky, all having achieved more than a clear majority were declared elected.

Roland Weill thanked the delegates for their support.

Anita DeFrantz did likewise noting that she was pleased to be back on the team as part of the ultimate team sport.

(c) Treasurer

The President advised that when the nominations for this position closed, Peter Coni was the only candidate. Following his subsequent death, the Executive Committee decided to renew the call for nominations. Nominations were received for Janne Hallengren (DEN), Michael Williams (GBR), and Helma Nepperus (NED) who

were each presented to the Congress by their respective federations. The Congress proceeded to vote.

During the counting of votes, Matt Smith, the Development Director reported on the assistance he had received from federations and boat-builders in providing boats at the Junior World Championships and at the forthcoming Championships for those countries, especially those from the former USSR, who were not able to compete in adequate equipment. He named those who had helped. He noted that FISA Coach was now being translated into several languages, and that the Argentinian federation were sharing their sponsor with the Development Programme in Latin America. He expressed his thanks to those concerned and also to the German federation and the German NOC for their assistance to the former USSR federations. Without all this support the Development Programme could not make the progress it was making.

The first round of voting for Treasurer resulted in:

- Michael Williams:	53 votes
- Helma Nepperus:	38 votes
- Janne Hallengren:	20 votes.

The second round of voting (between Michael Williams and Helma Nepperus) resulted as follows:

- Michael Williams:	62 votes
- Helma Nepperus:	46 votes
- Invalid:	3 votes.

Michael Williams was declared elected as Treasurer.

He thanked the Congress for its confidence.

#### (d) Chairman of the Junior Rowing Commission

The President advised that Wilfried Hofmann was retiring as Chairman of the Junior Rowing Commission after 14 years of faithful service. During this time he was also President of the very successful German Democratic Republic Rowing Federation. A silver salver was presented to Wilfried Hofmann, who thanked the Presidents he had worked with, Thomas Keller and Denis Oswald, the Council, members of his Commission and the federations for their support over the time of his service.

The candidates for this position, introduced by their respective federations were: Ingrid Dieterle (GER), Zoran Emersic (CRO), Helma Nepperus (NED), Hart Perry (USA), and Tomasz Waszczuk (POL).

Several later Agenda Items were taken during the counting of votes. The results of the various rounds of voting, in which, the candidate with the least number of votes was eliminated for the next round were:

First Round

- Hart Perry:	33 votes
- Ingrid Dieterle:	29 votes
- Tomasz Waszczuk:	22 votes
- Helma Nepperus:	17 votes
- Zoran Emersic:	10 votes

Second Round

- Hart Perry:	37 votes
- Ingrid Dieterle:	35 votes
- Tomasz Waszczuk:	25 votes
- Helma Nepperus:	14 votes

Third Round

- Ingrid Dieterle:	41 votes
- Hart Perry:	41 votes
- Tomasz Waszczuk:	26 votes

Fourth Round

- Ingrid Dieterle:	58 votes
- Hart Perry:	50 votes
- Invalid:	3 votes

Ingrid Dieterle was declared elected. She addressed the Congress and thanked Hart Perry for his hard work and paid her respects to the outgoing Chairman, Wilfried Hofmann.

(e) Chairman of the Athletes Commission

There was only one candidate for this position, Martin Cross (GBR). The President pointed out that Martin Cross had been acting as Chairman of the Commission since it had been created by the Congress in Budapest and had proved to be a very strong advocate of the rowers' interests.

Martin Cross was elected unanimously. He thanked the Congress for electing him, and for having introduced an Athletes Commission. He paid a tribute to FISA's reputation as being good at listening to athletes.

under item 7. Martin Cross reported on the results of a survey of athletes carried out at the Rotsee Regatta. From over 100 replies there was more than 90% support for a women's pair in the Olympic programme rather than a women's eight, and over 60% of those who replied favoured retaining the men's coxed four and coxed pair and the women's pair in the World Championships including in the Olympic year. These matters were to be discussed at an athletes meeting to be held during the World Championships.

14. Place and Date of the Next Congress

The Council proposed that the next Congress be held at Indianapolis (USA) on Saturday 10th September 1994. This proposal was accepted by the Congress.

15. Appointment of the Federation to be responsible for Auditing the Accounts for 1993

Patrick Rombaut (BEL) indicated that the Belgian Federation was prepared to carry out this task again for 1993. The Congress appointed the Belgian federation.

The President expressed the Council's gratitude to Mr. Dambrain, Vice President of the Belgian Federation who has done the auditing for a number of years.

16. Reports on Applications for Affiliation and Voting Consequent Thereon

The Secretary General reported that applications had been received from Albania and Monaco, and that the applications complied with the Statutes. Some details were given of both the rowing federations involved.

The Congress elected the Albanian and Monagesque federations to membership, bringing the number of affiliated federations to 90.

13. FISA Championships and Olympic Regattas

1 (a) World Championships, Roudnice (CZE), 1993

Ondrich Vaclavik reported on arrangements for the Championships to commence the next day. There were no questions.

(b) Asian Rowing Championships, Seoul (KOR), 1993

Won-Chul Lee reported on these Championships to be held in October. Importantly, they will be televised.

(c) Central American and Caribbean Games, Ponce (PUR), 1993

Pablo Span reported on the arrangements and especially plans for the rowing course to be used in these Games in December. Six nations were expected to compete in the rowing events.

(cc) First African Rowing Championships, Cairo (EGY), 1993

This event had not been mentioned on the Agenda. Salem Mashhour reported that on 14th December 1993 the newly created African Rowing Federation would hold the first African Rowing Championships in Cairo.

(d) Goodwill Games, St. Petersburg (RUS), 1994

Mr. Gassan-Djalolov reported that plans were progressing for this event to be held in St. Petersburg on 6th and 7th August 1994 with single sculls and eights from Russia and the USA and six other nations.

At 1.45 p.m. the Congress adjourned for lunch and resumed at 2.45 p.m.

(e) World Junior Championships, Munich (GER), 1994

Klaus Ulbrich gave brief details to the Congress to supplement the documentation which delegates had already received. He drew attention to the plan for special assistance for the developing countries which the Organising Committee is providing with support from the German Rowing Federation and coordination from FISA.

(f) Commonwealth Rowing Championships, Victoria (CAN), 1994

Joe Grey explained that these Championships would be held on August 4th, 5th and 6th 1994 on Elk Lake, Victoria. The event is fully sanctioned by the Commonwealth Games Federation and Games Medals will be presented. Boats will be available for rental.

(g) 1994 World Rowing Championships, Indianapolis (USA)

Geoffrey Bannister addressed the Congress. So far five sponsors have been obtained for the event. He encouraged people to book early and pledged to assist developing nations where possible.

(h) Asian Games, Hiroshima (JPN), 1994

Norio Kimura reported that the Games would be held from 2nd to 16th October 1994, with the rowing events from 7th to 10th October. Accommodation would be in universities with a sub-village for rowing and football. 300 rowers from 21 nations are expected to participate in 12 events.

(i) Pan American Games, Mar del Plata (ARG), 1995

Francisco Mangialardi advised the Congress that the Games would be held in March 1995. Boats will be available free of charge for Latin Americans and the accommodation charges will be \$30 per day.

(j) World Junior Championships, Poznan (POL), 1995

Jerzy Makowiecki indicated to the Congress that the accommodation fee at present stood at \$40 per person per day, and that this price may change.

(k) World Championships, Tampere (FIN), 1995

Borje Thorstrom introduced the representatives of the Tampere City Council which is fully supporting the Championships. A brochure distributed gave all relevant details.

(l) Olympic Games, Atlanta (USA), 1996

The President reported that the FISA Council had always held the view that Atlanta was the best of the cities bidding for 1996 as far as rowing was concerned. The Stone Mountain venue was attractive as being close and a venue for some 7 sports. Since then 5 sports have moved out, or been moved out by the Organising Committee. Now there are two possible rowing venues: Lake Lanier and Rockdale County and the Council will make its decision later in the week.

(m) World Junior and Lightweight Championships, Strathclyde (GBR), 1996

Martin Brandon-Bravo introduced Peter Morrison who indicated that accommodation would be in single rooms and that the Organising Committee would happily accept more events if FISA so requested. He mentioned that Stan Gilmore from the Strathclyde Council was present.

(n) Mediterranean Games, Bari (ITA), 1997

Mr. Pintabona had no details to present.

(o) Olympic Games, 2000

The President noted that the decision would be made next month. The candidates were now consulting the international federations much more than before.. Most seek a letter of approval from each international federation. The Regattas Commission and the President had visited most of the venues proposed.

2 (a) 1997 World Junior Championships - to be allocated

There was only one candidate for these Championships, Hazewinkel, Belgium. Patrick Rombaut presented the candidature. He noted that Hazewinkel was already looking at the acquisition of a new starting installation such as used in Beaucaire. Internal transport will be provided free of charge. The Organising Committee is negotiating with clubs and other countries about boats for the developing countries.

The bid was accepted by the Congress by acclamation.

(b) World Championships 1997 - to be allocated

There were three candidates each of which made its presentation.

Svetla Oztetova introduced Plovdiv, Bulgaria. Bulgaria had provided 127 medalists in the last 15 years and needed a boost to keep rowing prospering in that part of the world. Balkan Airlines would offer special airline deals. A video was shown, and a brochure had been distributed.

Perrine Pelen presented Aiguebelette, France. The plans included doubling the size of the boat park since the Junior Championships were there in 1990. Also the finish area would be enlarged for spectators and the best possible arrangements would be found to watch the races. New prices for accommodation were shown in a brochure and information sheet issued today. The prices were 1993 prices and inflation was estimated at 2 to 3%. There would be a minimum of 250 beds at the minimum price. The Organising Committee would study with FISA how best to help the developing countries.

Henrik Lotz introduced Hans-Georg Roehrig who made the presentation on behalf of Cologne, Germany. He advised that the prices in the brochure were full board prices. There would be a special arrangement for the developing countries along the Munich model. 360 beds would be available at the minimum price.

The President explained the Council view. It is not the Council's intention to say which candidate is slightly better, but rather to indicate if any was not suitable. The Council assessed this on the following criteria:

- Quality of the course
- Accommodation and transport
- Organising Committee
- Political and economic situation
- Interest and support for rowing
- Previous Championships

Based on these criteria all three candidates were suitable even though some had their disadvantages which he outlined.

A roll call was conducted and the number of votes remained the same.

Jan Steinhauser (NED) explained that Amsterdam had withdrawn as a candidate as it wished to wait for approval from the City of Amsterdam to widen the course before pursuing its candidature.

The Congress proceeded to vote. The result of the vote was:

Aiguebelette	58 votes
Cologne	31 votes
Plovdiv	22 votes

Aiguebelette was declared the venue for the 1997 World Championships.

Denis Masseglia, the President of the French federation expressed the gratitude of the French Rowing Federation, the Department of the Savoy and the Organising Committee.

An indication was sought of possible candidates for 1998 and the following were noted:

17      Reconsideration of Decisions taken by the Council in accordance with the provisions of Article 44 (g) or by the Executive Committee in accordance with the provisions of Article 46 (f) of the Statutes

The Swiss Federation had requested the review of Bye-Law 1.9 to Article 27 of the Rules of Racing. Bye-Law 1.9 required that as from 1996 all eights used in World Championships, Olympic Games, Regional Games and Continental Championships be sectioned. The Swiss sought the deletion of this Bye-Law.

Walter Kägi (SUI) argued that already in Bye-Law 1.5 there was a new requirement as from 1996, namely that the weight of eights be 96 kg instead of 93 kg, as it is now. This provision meant that already there was enough incentive for federations to use sectioned eights without making sectioning completely obligatory.

Klaus Filter explained that the reason for introducing these two Bye-Laws was to ensure that eights used for major events are able to be transported by container, and also by road in many countries where there are length restriction. John Boultbee pointed out that it was only for World Championships etc that this Bye-Law applied and therefore Clubs did not have to change all their eights to be sectioned.

The Congress voted on the proposition that Bye-Law 1.9 be deleted. There were 10 votes in favour and the proposal was LOST.

The Swiss federation also sought a reconsideration of Anti-Doping Bye-Law 4.6 which provided that rowers who were listed as being retired from competition would not be eligible for World Championships for the following two years.

Walter Kägi pointed out that if someone stopped rowing for one year, it was unfair that he should not be able to row for a further two years. John Boultbee explained that only rowers who had retired completely from competition should appear on the retired rowers list, and then they would not be subject to doping tests. A rower who stopped rowing for one year should not be on the list, and therefore should remain subject to doping tests. In any case, the listing system for out-of-competition doping controls needed to be reviewed after this year's experience and this matter would be taken into account.

Walter Kägi said that in the circumstances the Swiss Federation did not require the matter to be voted upon.

18.    Information on the Olympic Qualification System and the programmes of future Olympic Games and World Championships

19.    Proposals from National Federations

Because these two items covered a lot of common ground they were taken together.

The President explained that the Budapest Congress had approved the Qualification System proposed by the Council in principle, and that this system, in principle had been approved by the Executive Board of the IOC. The details needed now to be worked out by the Council, as they were Bye-Law matters, but the input from Federations and others was sought. He revealed to the Congress the numbers of boats per boat class that he had put to the IOC, but these numbers are to be considered by the Council.

The British Federation had proposed that, subject to IOC agreement, the women's open coxless pair should be reinstated as an Olympic boat class with a quota of not less than 9 boats, and that the quota for the women's open eights should be reduced to a maximum of 6 boats maintaining the same total quota of athletes.

It also proposed that the matter of the boat classes in the World Championships should be decided in a further extraordinary congress this year or, alternatively, that this Congress grant to the 1994 Ordinary Congress the power to make amendments to Article 17 of the Regulations for FISA Championships together with any consequential amendments to be implemented as from 1995.

The Norwegian Federation proposed that the men's coxed pair and the men's coxed four be removed from the World Championships programme (senior and junior) from 1995.

Martin Brandon-Bravo (GBR) proposed that the Norwegian proposal and the second British proposal be considered together, after the first British proposal. He argued on the first British proposal that somehow FISA must try to get the women's coxless pair back into the Olympic Games. The developing nations can usually only boat small boats at the Olympic Games. The British Federation would agree if Congress preferred an amendment to the proposal which deleted the part referring to the reduction of the number of eights, leaving a proposal for the re-introduction of the women's pair, without specifying how it might be achieved.

Reg McKay (AUS) moved an amendment to the British proposal to this effect, namely, that the proposal now should read: "Subject to IOC agreement, the women's open coxless pair should be reinstated as an Olympic Boat Class with a quota of not less than 9 boats (18 athletes) and that the Congress instruct the Council to negotiate the best possible terms."

The President accepted the amendment and noted that it would give the Council more flexibility. It may be that the Council would be faced with choosing between the women's eight and the women's pair, but this was not the only possibility. The final position should be determined by next year. He suggested that the Congress also grant to the 1994 Congress power to make amendments to the Regulations for FISA Championships in this matter as well.

The Congress voted on the British proposal as amended together with the proposal that the 1994 Congress have power to deal with this matter. There were 96 votes in favour of the proposal which was therefore ADOPTED.

The Norwegian federation indicated that it agreed with the British proposal that all questions relating to the World Championship programme be deferred to the 1994 Congress.

The President opened the matter for discussion. Norway indicated that they had nothing to add, and the British said merely that they were not convinced that the Junior programme had to follow exactly the Senior programme.

Danko Djunic (YUG) reminded the Congress that the coxed four and coxed pair were removed from the Olympic programme on just one vote, and we should be slow to remove them from the World Championships programme. There are important events in national, international and junior competition. Lightweights have events in the World Championships which are not Olympic events, so why should the same not apply to heavyweights?

Matt Smith spoke on behalf of the Competitive Rowing Commission in emphasising that this was an important decision and needed one year's discussion.

Douglas Calder (CAY) mentioned that this issue made it clear that we should reconsider our voting rules - only those who vote should be counted, not all present whether voting or not.

Jan Steinhauser (NED) supported the remarks of Danko Djunic. He asked if in 1996 it was possible time-wise to compete both in the Olympic Games and the World Championships?

Denis Oswald said there was clearly a need for world championships for lightweights in the Olympic year because there were only a few lightweight Olympic events, but that the considerations may be different for heavyweights.

John Boultbee pointed out that in 1996 the Olympic Games and World Championships finals are two weeks apart, as they were in 1992.

Zhang Qing (CHN) said we should not be too quick to make changes. It could wait until 1997.

Denis Oswald summarised the matters that had to be considered under these headings:

1. Deletion of 4+ and 2+ from World Championships?
2. Deletion of womens 2- or 8+ from World Championships?
3. Should the same programme apply for Juniors?
4. World Championships in the Olympic year?

5. Qualification regatta
- number of boats per class
  - how many qualify at World Championships and how many at qualifying regatta
  - one or two qualifying regattas

The Congress then voted on granting power to the 1994 Congress to deal with these matters and make the appropriate amendments to the Regulations for FISA Championships. There were 100 votes in favour of the proposal which was therefore ADOPTED.

The Swiss Rowing Federation had proposed that Junior World Championships should not be held every year but every second year and that in the other years there should be continental junior championships.

Denis Oswald outlined the Council's opposition to this proposal, and Walter Kägi (SUI) proposed that the matter should be referred to the Junior Commission to report to the next Congress.

Henrik Lotz (GER) said Germany supported this proposal.

The Mexican and United States Federations proposed the addition of a women's lightweight coxless pair to the World Championship programme.

The President said it would be logical to defer this matter to the 1994 Congress as well so that all the programme matters could be considered together.

Jos. Manuel Huerta (MEX) agreed to the postponement of the matter, but emphasised that the small boat is important for women, just as it is for lightweight men.

Frank Coyle (USA) accepted the postponement, but asked if it would be possible to hold a demonstration event in this boat class in the 1994 Championships in Indianapolis, in view of the likely participation of Latin American countries.

The President agreed that the Council should consider this.

The Congress voted on the deferral of this matter to the 1994 Congress. There were 96 votes in favour and it was therefore ADOPTED.

20. Any Other Business


Reg McKay (AUS) gave some information on the Masters Games to be held in Brisbane (AUS) in September and October of 1994.

The meeting opened at 9.35 am.

The Chairman welcomed all participants to the meeting and thanked them for attending at such short notice.

Appreciation was also extended to the Victorian Rowing Association, David Pincus, Bill Waterfield and Noel Donaldson for their work in calling and arranging the meeting.

### Objectives of the meeting

Over the last fifteen years Australian Rowing has experienced major growth in all areas. Results at international competition, the establishment of the AIS and state sports institutes and academies and the development of international standard rowing facilities throughout the country and the 1990 World Rowing Championships in Australia have been important components of this progress. Today we look to the future of Australian Rowing to Olympic Games in Sydney 2000 and beyond. Funding from both the Government and the corporate sector is the key to improving our current programmes and establishing new initiatives. A united and common approach is essential to achieve both national and state objectives.

**Objectives:**

1. To agree on the main principles for rowing in relation to the GMP 2000.
2. To identify the steps which will need to be taken immediately to activate this Plan.

**Background and current position**

Ray Hammon (Director Finance) presented to the meeting the current proposal for rowing that was with the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC), a financial overview of all Olympic sports' funding proposals and the recommendations from the AOC forum held on the 21st and 22nd of October 1993.

The Executive Board of the ARC met on Friday 12th of November to discuss it's position in regard to changes to the GMP and Mr Hammon reported the following resolutions:

- \* That the GMP submitted to the AOC should be principally a financial document not a planning document and therefore contain minimum future planning narrative.
- \* That the GMP provide sufficient detail as required by the AOC but that detail would not be binding on the ARC.
- \* The Executive Board are satisfied that the proposal amount of \$40.2M is sufficient subject to the decisions of this meeting.

The ARC's final proposal must be with the AOC in Sydney on Friday the 19th of November.

Reinhold Batschi (Head Coach AIS Rowing Unit) also attended the AOC forum and highlighted to this meeting some areas that were discussed there.

He emphasised that the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) and the AOC required each sport to receive professional administration support to ensure that programmes could operate efficiently and effectively.

In looking forward Mr Batschi stressed that we must not dismantle all of the current structure as there are many components that are working well for the sport. He fully supported the establishment of a Head Coach with proper accountability and administrative support. He also spoke of the need for a more unified and supportive approach to the management of the sport.

Dennis Hatcher (Chairman - Selection Commission) attended the AOC forum on behalf of the ARC and spent much time preparing the submission that is currently with the AOC.

Mr Hatcher described to the meeting the structure of the forum.

- \* The AOC emphasised the need for a truly national plan, direction and structure to facilitate it. The National Federations are to control and manage all areas of these plans.
- \* Throughout the forum it became clear that sports do not want to have to apply to more than one group to receive funding. ie. AOC, ASC.

- \* The forum devised the proposed management structure for the operation of the collective GMP.

Mr Hatcher felt that the role of this meeting should be to bring the views of our sport together to enable a unified submission to be made.

Simon Gillett presented a plan that had been discussed and supported by the ARC Coaching Commission. It focused on the Head Coach being the core component of the GMP with an extensive coaching structure and network below. The Head Coach must have autonomy in all decision making particularly in the areas of national team selection, overseas tours and the operation of the Intensive Training Centres.

To achieve the results that are being suggested between now and the Olympics in 2000 the employment of 45 coaches is required to foster the programmes and produce the athletes. Talent identification is one of the most important programmes and must be given immediate priority. Communication and a common direction between all the State Institutes and Academies of Sport is crucial to the success of any GMP.

With the increasing number of athletes moving through the programmes additional equipment will be required. It is planned that this would take place during the first three years of the GMP in each centre, starting with enough equipment for the TID programmes.

Mr Gillett outlined the advantages of this style of GMP:-

- \* It would provide co-ordination between the ITCs where there currently is none.
- \* All states would receive equal access to funding eg. athletes travelling to camps from Western Australia would not be financially worse off than those travelling from the eastern states.
- \* All National Team expenses will be controlled by the main centre run by the Head Coach.
- \* The increased number of coaches will mean greater continuity to the athlete which will encourage them to remain in the sport for longer.
- \* Rowing will become much more marketable.
- \* It provides a much clearer career path for both coaches and athletes.

Discussion of all the GMP proposals was held.

It was agreed by the meeting that its immediate role was to produce a financial statement according to the criteria set by the AOC, not a detailed future development plan.

Ray Hammon will revisit the figures and identify and remove any double counting of funds and reconsider the areas that the meeting felt should be amended the meeting resolved that it required a higher priority to be given to funding in the areas of intensive training centres; coaching projects; sports medicine and science and it sought more support for full time managers of the Australian team and for medicos.

Margot Foster, Andrew Guerin and David Schier were appointed by the meeting to write the narrative which will accompany the GMP financial statements. These are to be faxed to the ARC office by 12 noon Wednesday 17th November.

The GMP will be compiled and faxed immediately to the following contacts in each state:

Once the proposal is confirmed by the Board it will then be submitted to the AOC. It was resolved that the proposal be signed for and on behalf of the ARC by the CEO. It was noted that the Chairman of the meeting and the Director of Finance would confer over the weekend in relation to the financial adjustments proposed by the meeting.

### Future Planning

The new development plan for the ARC 1994-2000 is to be approved by the ARC at the General Meeting of Council in May 1994 so work must commence immediately.

It was resolved by the meeting that "a working party be appointed, forthwith, to work on the production of the 1994 - 2000 development plan, incorporating the concepts of the GMP as discussed at this meeting."

The meeting will submit to Council for approval the following names as the working party:-

Margot Foster (Convenor)  
Reinhold Batschi  
David Yates  
Representative of the National Coaching Commission (to be advised)  
1 additional committee member (to be appointed)  
Head Coach (when appointed)

It was resolved that the meeting request that the working party receive full administrative support from ARC Headquarters. States were invited to present any early submissions direct to the convenor.

Simon Gillett said that the most important factor of this plan was that it have wide-ranging support from all sections of the rowing community - clubs, states, athletes, coaches.

Noel Donaldson stated that as has been the case in Victoria, if rowing can improve the elite end of the sport the rest will follow.

David Rattray felt that states will find it much easier to put together their own development plans when they know the direction of the national plan.

The Chairman felt that it was imperative that the GMP be immediately promoted within rowing schools to inform current and potential school age rowers the ARC Plan to 2000.

The Executive Board will pursue the possibility of holding international competitions, ie. World Championships and World Junior Championships in Australia before 2000 and the FISA Coaches Conference in 1998.

It was agreed that research into expanded pacific rim competition should continue and that there should be greater opportunity in Australia for national competition in the junior and youth categories.

### Logistics

All those who wish to participate in the airfare equalisation process should have flight costings to David Schier by 26th of November.

The following resolution was also passed:- "That the Board consider the reimbursement of equalised expenses to State Associations from AOC/ASC funding for meetings in relation to GMP 2000 provided that the needs of the working party are not excessively depleted so as to thwart it's function."

The Chairman closed the meeting with a vote of thanks to all participants. He noted that it had been a harmonious and cooperative meeting which much positive discussion towards a common goal for Australian Rowing. Mr Schier felt that the meeting was indicative of the direction that the ARC is heading and the ability of States to work closely and at short notice with national objectives.

There being no further business the meeting closed at 5.30 pm.

## AUSTRALIAN ROWING COUNCIL ADAPTIVE ROWING PROGRAMME

### 1993/94 CO-ORDINATOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

The past season has been a mixture of highs and lows within our programme which is about "integration" of able bodied and disabled athletes and as this is unique, the active support of State Rowing Associations is most critical.

Our current programme has progressed in several states while others lay dormant, due to lack of personnel to take on the role of State Co-ordinator, this area must be pursued by the State Rowing Association's A.R.C. delegate. It is essential that each State have their own Committees under the control of their State Co-ordinator who in turn reports to the Australian DISROW Committee. For the benefit of new Councillors who may not be fully appreciative of the significance of the programme it should be pointed out that rowing was the first able bodied sport in Australia to implement a programme of integration of able bodied and disabled athletes into its activities.

Accepting the concept that rowing is for everyone we should give consideration to develop rowing on a wider base and provide ongoing and easy access to rowing facilities for all members of the community.

Following our success at yet another Australian Championship where eight athletes participated our highlights were to be dampened by the cancellation of our adaptive events at the World Rowing Championships in Indianapolis U.S.A.

However on a brighter note through the support of the A.R.C. and the generosity of interested personnel, I was able to participate in an Orientation Day at the Nepean Rowing Club N.S.W. where sight impaired and physically handicapped athletes participated in what now appears to be rejuvenation of our adaptive programme.

This has been brought about due to the interest by the Nepean Blind Sports Club in association with the N.S.W. Sports Council For the Disabled and the co-operation of the Nepean and North Shore Rowing Clubs.

The enthusiasm shown gives a clear indication that N.S.W. shall be able to provide representation in future Australian Championships where numbers shall enhance stronger competition.

Tasmanian Rowing Council Inc., have followed the lead of W.A. by providing events in two categories within their State Pennant regattas. Six athletes, representing four clubs created history at the seasons first pennant regatta. The foresight of the T.R.C. is most appreciated and adds strength to our GROWING programme.

The workload that has developed over the past two years requires far more attention, therefore I have severed my ties from other rowing activities of which I previously shared. This should enable me to pursue matters that have been previously overlooked such as:

- a) Recruiting and teaching coaches is another area that requires attention as these people may have a good understanding of the individual's disability yet they may not come from the rowing circle.
- b) Investigation of insurances (coaches liability).
- c) Major sponsorship should be sought so that financial support may be shared to lighten the burden and encourage Committees to be formed.
- d) In conjunction with the Council we seek to capitalise on the spontaneous development that has taken place during the last three years by applying to the Australian Sports Commission for a future grant so that additional equipment may be provided in establishing programmes within other states and rekindling of areas where a lack of interest was evident.
- e) Establish future categories (classifications).
- f) Provide guidelines for international participation:
  - (i) World Championship Event distances.
  - (ii) Work in conjunction with the Australian Team.
  - (iii) To be inclusive with all media releases and be counted as one.
- g) Investigate SALES TAX EXEMPTION on purchasing of equipment.

In conclusion appreciation is expressed for the continued support from Ted Hale Racing Boats for providing competitive craft for Australian Championships plus his sponsorship towards our national newsletter which has a distribution throughout: N.S.W. & Tas 20; W.A. 9; Qld 5; Vic 4; A.C.T. 3; S.A. 2; Switzerland, Rotterdam, New Zealand & Great Britain 1 each; a total of 67 representing an increase of over 50% in two years.

Our newsletter which was established at our first national meeting 1993 (Qld) brings enquiries from far and wide through its further distribution within disabled organisations and state rowing associations.

As Co-ordinator I feel that our aims and objectives of our adaptive programme are being fully covered due to the response of the participants over the past two years.

REPORT TO AUSTRALIAN ROWING COUNCIL  
ANNUAL MEETING 1994**

**1. OVERVIEW**

1.1 Health support for the Australian International Rowing Program has assumed a much more important and significant role since the GMP/OAP programs have been established. The health support strategies will protect the increasing investment of money by the community through government and AOC grants and sponsorships and the investment of time by volunteer administrators, coaches , support personnel including team managers and health practitioners, and, of course, the rowers.

As Australia spends 9% of its GDP on health care it is reasonable, as a guideline, that the ARC allocate a similar percentage of the financial resources available for the international ,intensive training centre and TIP programs to the provision of health care / support to ensure optimum performance of participating rowers through strategies relating to recognition , diagnosis of illness and injury, health maintenance, health enhancement and monitoring their adaptation or failure of adaptation (recognised by developing illness, stress fractures etc) to ensure optimal performance and (especially in the case of Juniors) development - Recommendation 1.

Failure to implement and support appropriate health strategies may lead to failure of the International, ITC and TIP programs because of failure of the rowers to adapt appropriately to the stresses of the program.

1.2 In 1994 health support staff were provided for the following International teams:

1.2.1 Junior Trans-Tasman - in NZ - 1 doctor, Dr Geoff Graham (Adelaide) who had been appointed team doctor to the Junior Trans-Tasman team competing in Adelaide in 1993.

1.2.2 Senior B - in Adelaide - 1 doctor, Dr George Bulyga whose appointment was consistent with the policy of appointing a doctor (from the Medical Network) residing nearest to the venue for the Senior B (and Junior Trans-Tasman) series when held in Australia. The doctor is also responsible for providing medical service to other visiting crews.

Unfortunately it appears that the Senior B team manager overlooked officially including Dr Bulyga as part of the team. This should be corrected.

1.2.3 Senior B - Nations Cup, Paris - no doctor was appointed because of lack of funds for travel and accommodation. Dr Steve Hinchy (Junior World Championship Team) was able to attend members of the team in Paris (because the Junior team was competing there) and on the occasion of a serious medical problem occurring in Paris was able to leave the Junior team in Switzerland for a short time to go to Paris, fortunately just before the Nations Cup. In Lucerne members of the Senior B team were attended by the Senior A team medical staff. However, it is unlikely that these coincidences will recur and it is recommended that a doctor accompany the Senior B team to the Nations Cup.- Recommendation 2.

1.2.4 Junior Team - World Championships - 1 doctor, Dr Steve Hinchy was appointed. He is a very experienced general practitioner with particular knowledge of rowing and experience in managing the health problems and touring challenges.

1.2.5 Senior A Team - European Tour and World Championships in North America. The challenge was that the team was selected in mid-May and the decision to tour Europe was made in late May leaving little time to ascertain the availability of appropriately skilled and experienced doctors, physiotherapists and masseurs. The total length of time for both trips precluded any one doctor or physiotherapist from undertaking both tours.

There was even the economics-driven suggestion that only a doctor accompany the team to Europe! The number of medical services provided and the problems which arose during the tour vindicated my insistence that full medical support accompany the team.

1.2.5.1 European Tour - 1 doctor, Dr Robin Yarrow who rowed for GB at the 1968 Olympics and accompanied the senior B team to NZ in 1993. [Medical coverage for those attending Henley was arranged with Dr Peter Thomas former GB Team doctor (1980 - 1992) and Olympic rower who practices in Reading and lives in Henley].

- 1 Physiotherapist - Allan Bourke who is a very skilled and respected manipulative therapist who has worked with me and therefore with rowers for over ten years. Unfortunately he had been previously unavailable because of his commitment to his young family and establishing his physiotherapy practice in Penrith.

- 1 masseur - Luke Attwell who has been masseur to the Senior A team since 1991 and who is justifiably well liked and respected by rowers, management and health support colleagues and whose work is first class.

1.2.5.2 Commonwealth Regatta and World Championships - doctor -(i)Dr David Coles, Canberra, for the Commonwealth Regatta. David has accompanied Junior teams to the World Championships 1989 - 1993 and was assistant team doctor Senior A team 1990.

(ii)Dr Bill Webb took over after the Commonwealth Regatta. Has been Senior A team doctor since 1981, Principal Medical Officer since 1983 and member of FISA Medical Commission since 1985.

- physiotherapist - Henry Wajswelner has been Senior A team physiotherapist 1990, 91 and 93 and accompanied the team on the pre-Olympic tour in 1992. He had been the only manipulative therapist available to accompany the team in those years and had experience at the AIS until 1992.

- masseur - Luke Attwell

The ARC, wisely, in 1993 approved the policy of not requiring the team manager nor doctor to tour for longer than four weeks limiting the time of absence from private business/practice . I believe this should now be extended to other support staff in order that more skilled practitioners in private practice will make themselves available. NB The time rowing requires support staff to be on tour with the Senior A team exceeds the time required to be on tour with senior teams from other sports. There are actually more members *in* the Senior Rowing Team than there are in other Senior national sporting teams.

## 2. HEALTH SUPPORT 1994

2.1 It is noted that the program for national camps, selection camps and overseas tours for 1994-95 has been produced. This should make it possible to make touring team appointments before the end of 1994. To this end I have forwarded a form of expression of interest to the CEO for distribution to members of the Medical Network.

2.2 The Medical Information form must, as agreed by the selectors and coaches in 1993 be returned by the rowers nominating for national selection with his/her nomination form ie by Monday 12/12/1994. Many rowers selected in National Teams in 1994 especially Senior A, never returned a medical form. Too many rowers were found to have previously unnotified medical problems on arrival in Europe in June.

The completion and submission of the medical form will allow appropriate medical strategies for management of these problems to be implemented. It must be emphasised that the information provided will be used to assist the rower through appropriate health management strategies not to exclude them from the team - Recommendation 3.

2.3 Clinical records on tour use a card system and in Australia whatever system is used by the attending practitioner.

Because of the increasing member rowers in national teams and taking part in the ITC and TIP programs it is considered desirable to establish a computerised system.

- (a) for recording information from the medical form - personal details
  - health summary
- (b) recording details of current illness or injury and management
- (c) recording results of health monitoring strategies eg blood tests.
- (d) recording relevant physiological and performance data relating to health status.

This project will require assistance from the ARC administration and the Marketing Commission.- Recommendation 4.

3.4 The management strategy for the Senior A team was that priority for massage would be given to the rowers who regularly used massage as part of their training program and in preparation for and recovery from racing. This worked well in rationalising the distribution of massage services which had tended to be over-used previously (as is the case with the Olympic Team generally) because "its something that makes me feel good that I dont usually have available" or "it fills in time" or "it saves me having to stretch."

Another important factor in the more rational use of massage services was the lack of boredom due to the wisdom of the team manager's choice of top quality accommodation and its ideal central location with plenty of attractions nearby to occupy leisure/free time.

3.5 The policy in relation to treatment including physiotherapy was that the team doctor - who is responsible for the health of the team and accountable to the coaches, manager and the ARC - should be consulted before treatment was given. Unfortunately this did not happen. A factor may have been non-compliance of some team members - Recommendation 5.

3.9 Junior - Trans - Tasman Team in NZ

3.10 Types of medical problems in decreasing order of frequency :

3.10.1 Upper respiratory tract - infection/allergy

3.10.2 Musculo-skeletal - mostly back/spine but others related to inappropriate physical activity eg running and personal equipment.

3.10.3 gastro-intestinal upset

3.10.4 various other problems - skin infection; blisters; ingrowing nails etc

There were fewer asthmatics in Australian teams than in previous years.

There were four stress fractures of ribs - all women - two of which may have been pre-existing before leaving Australia. All were managed according to strategies developed over the last ten

years and all competed without danger to themselves and without compromising their racing performance.

The most frequent physiotherapy treatment was for low back and other spinal problems. In my opinion those problems could have been prevented or management programs put in place before leaving Australia. Such programs would have considerably reduced the need for physiotherapy treatment which was relied upon by many athletes (and seemingly not discouraged) rather than active rehabilitation and preventative programs being established and adhered to. This will be the subject of revised strategy and guidelines for team medical staff, especially the physical therapists, and coaches and rowers.

#### 4. MEDICAL SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT

Once more these were virtually all supplied free of charge through the generosity of Pharmaceutical, Surgical Supply and Therapeutic Equipment/Product Companies and individuals. Their continuing generosity and support is appreciated. The value of their contribution is close to \$10 000.

Perhaps a suitable certificate of appreciation could be developed and forwarded to these supporters - Recommendation 6.

A team plaque is customarily given to those providing major assistance eg pathologists. This year Coca Cola supplied large quantities of Powerade and have been presented with a team plaque.

4.2 Physical therapy equipment (apart from the two portable treatment plinths owned by the ARC) continues to present some problems. Allan Bourke provided his own tools of trade but Henry Wajswelner was able only to provide an ultrasound. The remaining equipment for the North American tour was provided by me or was loaned by supply companies. This is unsatisfactory as it appears that some of the equipment did not function reliably.

It has been suggested that the ARC purchase the necessary electrotherapeutic equipment. The difficulties I see are

- (a) capital cost
- (b) maintenance
- (c) meeting the individual preferences of different physiotherapists.

My experience with other sporting teams is that the touring physiotherapist arranges the supply of his/her preferred equipment.- Recommendation 7.

4.3 It is impossible to arrange donation of supplies in the name of the Australian Rowing Council - this does not strike a sympathetic chord regarding sponsorship. The donations of supplies and equipment are made on the basis of personal and professional standing of the practitioners for the Australian Rowing Team. Perhaps the ARC would consider a name change eg Australian Rowing or Rowing Australia to make sponsorship more attractive.

## 5. THE NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

### 5.1 1994 - LAKE BARRINGTON

- (a) Excellent service was provided - the best I have experienced at a National Championship Regatta
- (b) Dr Ian Beltz arranged the coverage and was in attendance each day the week of the regatta.
- (c) Physiotherapy services were provided by Mr Tony Hennessey.
- (d) Massage services were provided by Mr Roman Meyer.

A copy of Dr Beltzs report is attached .

I wish to thank these gentlemen and St Helens Private Hospital for their assistance during the Championships.

### 5.2. 1995 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS - COLLIE WA

- (a) Dr Ian Waite is coordinating medical services.
- (b) a copy of his proposal is attached.

## 6. FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

The increased funding available to sport, including funding for professional administration and coaching (and financial support for athletes) has resulted in increased demands on time, knowledge, expertise and experience of volunteer (honorary) administrators, coaches and support personnel including managers and medical staff.

This is being recognised but must be budgeted to compensate for time away from business/practice and to reward expertise and experience. eg sitting fees for councillors and Board Members, compensation for on-going costs (cost recovery) and payment for knowledge, skill, experience and responsibility for support personnel.

In the case of the health care of the athletes and team this should be part of the budget for the rowing program.

It is understood, but I have no official confirmation, that the ASC has funds available to compensate health practitioners for foregone income when travelling with national sporting teams. I am not aware of the guidelines for its payment..

This appears to be a flat \$500 per week to health practitioners without acknowledging differences in qualification, knowledge, skill, experience or responsibility and does not differentiate between salaried practitioners(who stand to make a profit) and private practitioners, where the most able practitioners work, who have the problem of on-going costs usually considerably more than \$500 per week.

In fact, when this concept was first mooted a year or so ago it was in the context of payment being made to the employer to contribute to the cost of a replacement practitioner ( locum).

This matter should be explored and clarified and a fair system of remuneration for administrators and support personnel should be established. - Recommendation 8.

## 7. MEDICAL NETWORK

7.1 The Medical Network held a successful inaugural meeting in Melbourne in May 1993.

The meeting was valuable

- (a) in allowing members to meet each other
- (b) identifying medical problems
- (c) developing strategies for the management and prevention of health problems.
- (d) developing strategies for communication of experience in caring for rowers in Australia and on tour.

It was resolved that a meeting be held each year as proposed and budgeted in the Five Year Plan ratified by Council and endorsed by the ASC in 1991-1992. However the previous administration claimed that the Five Year Plan was only notional and that there was no budget for a meeting in 1993 -1994 - although I understand that the ASC did allow for such a meeting in its grant to the ARC.

7.2 I am grateful to the Head Coach and the current administration for facilitating a meeting of members of the Medical Network on the occasion of the national coaches meeting on 14 and 15 October 1994.

The opportunity to sit in on some of the coaches debriefing sessions was valuable and the opportunity to meet and talk with national coaches was appreciated.

The Network received and considered reports from the medical staff of various national teams and discussed various medical problems and specific problems of some individual team members with their coach(es).

The following points were presented to the coaches :

(a) The importance of coaches communicating early with a member of the Medical Network (or team medical staff) when a health problem is recognised which prevents the rower from completing the requirements of the national program with respect to training and competition.

Ideally this should be to a doctor who will establish a diagnosis and then co-ordinate the appropriate management always aiming to keep the rower in the boat or to minimise time out of the boat while continuing appropriate training.

(b) This is particularly important for rowers who are part of a national crew or team

(c) It is important to continually assess the effect on health of adaptation or failure of adaptation (overtraining, stress injury) to changes in training program, changes in boat class or changes to equipment and rigging.

(d) Attendance of members of the Medical Network at National Training Camps is suggested - Recommendation 9.

- (i) for health assessment of rowers
- (ii) observation of rowers performance
- (iii) "getting to know you"
- (iv) education programs for rowers and coaches.

(e) When coaches propose to use an ergogenic aid (eg medication, nutritional supplementation or manipulation or physiological manipulation) this should be referred to a member of the Medical Network and the PMO before it is used in competition to allow assessment - Recommendation 10.

- (i) for health reasons
- (ii) for ethical reasons - is it legal ?
- (iii) does it work ?

and coaches are asked to supply copies of the scientific (or trade) references on which they based their decision to use the ergogenic aid or manipulation.

It was emphasised that such notification and associated information would be kept confidential in order to preserve any advantage a coach may have discovered during the domestic season.

(f) The FISA substitution rule should be used in the case of genuine illness or injury in local and national regattas and selection trials.

7.3 The relationship between members of the ARC Medical Network and health practitioners at various state and National Sports Institutes or Academies should be clarified in relation to care of athletes in the ITC program - Recommendation 11

7.4 The Medical Network should meet annually - when possible at the National Championships on the basis of my budget submission. ~ RECOMMENDATION 14.

## 8. ROWING RESEARCH

8.1 It was agreed at the Medical Network meeting that a working group be established to consider the rowers back and related regions eg ribs. It is appropriate that the working group be based in Sydney and the members be

- (a) Dr Bill Webb - PMO - Convenor
- (b) Dr Bob Tinning - Orthopaedic surgeon and former Australian rower
- (c) Allan Bourke - physiotherapist
- (d) Richard Smith - biomechanist.

This group will consider information available on problems related to the back and associated regions in rowing and evolve strategies for their management and prevention. Progress reports will be made to members of the Medical Network and the coaches via the Head Coach or Director of Coach Education - Recommendation 12.

8.2 The Rowing Research Group met in June. A separate report has been provided.

## 9. SPORTS SCIENCE AND MEDICINE CO-ORDINATOR

The CEO has outlined a proposal that the ASC will provide \$60 000 to fund the employment of a co-ordinator of sports science and medicine. Before accepting this offer a number of aspects should be considered

- (a) the salary would not attract a suitably experienced applicant
- (b) it is estimated that for the co-ordinator to function effectively on-costs would amount to \$90 000 - presumably to be funded by the ARC.
- (c) it is doubtful whether a graduate in Sports Science/Human Movement could effectively communicate with health care professionals.
- (d) therefore it is reasonable to anticipate that more work would be generated for the PMO requiring time to implement.
- (e) the scheme was apparently devised and is administered by Ross Smith of the ASC, an institutionalised bureaucrat with no relevant experience in the delivery of health care in the community or in private practice and who is not, himself, a health care professional.
- (f) it would be more appropriate to pay part of the available \$60 000 to a member of the Medical Network - probably the PMO - to take time from his/her practice to co-ordinate the health care of members of the ITC (and TIP) program. This would involve contracting a specified amount of professional time to the co-ordination of sports medicine and related sports science matters. A precedent exists for this sort of arrangement within ASDA - Recommendation 13.

## 10. FISA

10.1 The FISA Medical Commission meets at least twice a year - once at the Combined Commissions meeting held on the first weekend in March every year and once during the World Championships.

10.2 Matters presently under consideration are

- (a) the apparent increase in use of asthma sprays
- (b) aspects of doping control regulations especially concerning
  - (i) the use of bicarbonate loading
  - (ii) the use of local anaesthetic injections
- (c) relations with the IOC Medical Commission
- (d) development of a sports physician/team doctor program for developing countries. This is my responsibility at present.

10.3 I have been asked by (a) the Australian Head Coach

(b) FISA

to attend the FISA Coaches Conference in Sweden 28 - 30 October because of the medically related topics.

10.4 I have been requested to act as the FISA doctor for the World Junior Championships in Poznan 2 - 6 August 1995. I intend to visit Poznan to check on regatta facilities, accommodation and food etc after the FISA Coaches Conference.

10.5 I intend to visit Tampere after the FISA Coaches Conference to check on regatta facilities, transport, accommodation and food etc.

I consider that attending these championships will pose a challenge and that a preliminary visit at this stage is advisable.

10.6 I thank the ARC for its continuing support of my involvement with the FISA Medical Commission.

## 11. CONCLUSION AND ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

1994 has been a challenging year because of the sudden increase in size of the national team(s) and the magnitude of the program facilitated by the increased funding.

In general the team performed to realistic expectations. Perhaps the performance of some members of the team would have been enhanced by earlier notification and therefore management of medical problems.

The Head Coach and Team Manager were decisive in their respective roles and team discipline was good.

The Head Coach Simon Gillett and the coaching staff were dedicated to their tasks. I wish to thank them for their friendship and courtesy and interest in the health of their crews.

The accommodation in Indianapolis was the best quality and the best location I have experienced in my 14 years with the Senior A team and the team manager is to be commended for his prompt action in booking the particular hotel in 1992. Arrangements had been confirmed earlier in the year on visits by the team manager and by myself.

Apart from the first meal at the hotel, when the food was simply too rich, the meals were excellent, again justifying the preliminary visits by the team manager and myself.

I believe the quality of the accommodation and the food and central location of the hotel were significant contributions to the comfort, happiness and elimination of boredom of team members.

I wish to thank the team manager David Taylor and assistant team manager Michael Eastaughffe for their courtesy, friendship, assistance and interest in the health of team members.

This was a happy team and I was unaware of any substantial complaints.

Finally I wish to thank the ARC for its continued confidence in my performing the duties of both PMO and Senior A team doctor and I look forward to continuing to assist the ARC in the development and success of Australian rowing.

### *Scope*

We disclaim any assumptions of responsibility for any reliance on this report or on the financial statements to which it relates to any person other than the members of the Council, or for any purpose other than that for which it was prepared.

The accounts of the Australian Rowing Council Incorporated ("the Council") have been prepared as a Special Purpose Financial Report for use by the Board and the Members of the Council and to fulfil the Board's responsibility under the Constitution to prepare accounts. The accounts have been prepared on the basis that the Council is not a reporting entity because there are unlikely to be any other users of the accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards except for AAS 22 - Related Party Disclosures.

**(b) Basis of Accounting**

The accounts have been prepared on the basis of historical costs.

**(c) Income and Expenditure**

Income has been brought to account on a due and receivable basis. Expenses have been brought to account as incurred.

Government grants have been brought to account as income when received. For the year ended 30 June 1993 Government grants were brought to account as income only to the extent that they related to the administration of the Council.

All other grants have been brought to account as income when received. For the year ended 30 June 1993 all other grants were netted off against the disbursements to which they related.

**(d) Income Tax**

The Council is an exempt body under the Income Tax Assessment Act, as amended.

**(e) Investments**

Debenture securities are included in the accounts at cost.

**(h) Comparatives**

The accounts for the year ended 30 June 1993 were prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards except for AAS 22 - Related Party Disclosures, and AAS 28 Statement of Cash Flows. The accounts for the year ended 30 June 1994 have been prepared in accordance with the policies as set out above and comparative figures have only been included or amended to accord with the presentation in 1994 where this has been practicable.

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




