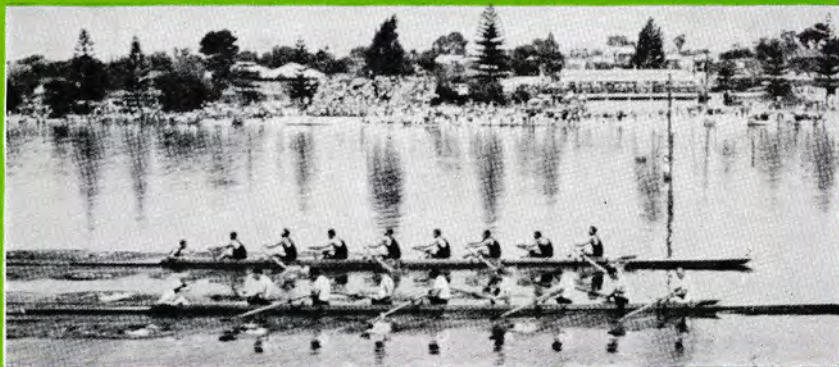


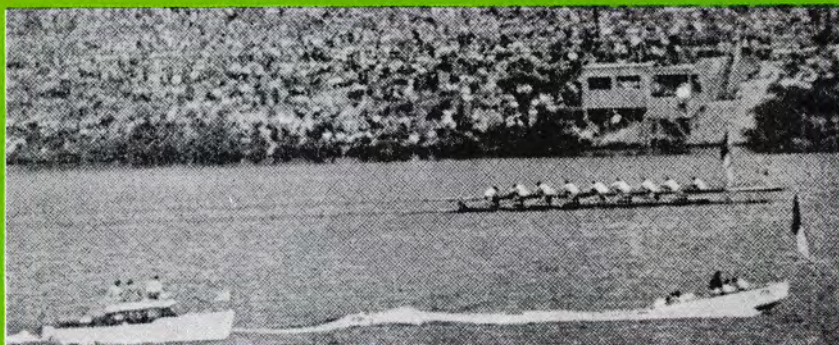

WELCOME TO OUR NEW ZEALAND OARSMEN

On behalf of the Australian Rowing Council, the N.S.W. Rowing Association, and oarsmen in Australia, it is my great pleasure to welcome our visiting oarsmen from New Zealand.

New Zealand and Australia, owing to their geographical situation, have always lacked the International competition which is readily available to other rowing countries in the World, and quite apart from the actual racing they have not had the opportunity of studying the coaching methods or the modern equipment used by the countries which have been successful in Olympic and World Championships in recent years.

Although New Zealand oarsmen have competed in Australia, and Australia in New Zealand on previous occasions, it is felt that the present idea of bi-annual visits between our two Countries will overcome to some extent our geographical disadvantage and certainly give us the opportunity of studying one another's methods of coaching and equipment used.

Parnell (Coach of the Eight), will allow us to cement the good relations already existing between rowing people only separated by the Tasman sea, and gain from the knowledge they can impart to us and us to them, both on the water and in the Seminars which will be held during their visit.

THE AMPOL TRANS TASMAN TROPHY

The Ampol Trans Tasman Trophy has been presented by Ampol Petroleum Limited for perpetual competition between Australia and New Zealand in Rowing and Sculling.

For the present Series, points will be awarded for Australia and New Zealand at each of the International Test Regattas in the Eights, Four Oar With Cox, Pair Oar Without Cox, Double Sculls and Single Sculls. For New Zealand, if more than one crew or sculler is entered in a Test Race, then the No. 1 entry only will be eligible for points. In the Eights and Single Sculls, only the official Australian Entry may be awarded points. In the Fours, Double Sculls and Pair Oar Without Cox, points will be awarded to Australia for the crew or scullers which finishes first of the Australia Club entries.

AUSTRALIA v. NEW ZEALAND 1888 to 1940

Seventy-seven years ago, this 1st of December, 1965 the first International Amateur race between Australian and New Zealand crews, titled the Championship of Australasia, took place on the Parramatta River, Sydney. The Victorian Crew, H. Oxlade (Bow), F. G. Payne 2, J. L. Bannister 3 and George Upward (Stroke), defeated New Zealand Napier Rowing Club, N.S.W. 3rd and Tasmania 4th, time 12 min. 58½ secs., for 2¼ miles. On the evening of the same day the first Conference between the Australian States and New Zealand was held at the Exchange, Sydney. It was resolved, but not unanimously, to "adopt the Victorian Rowing Association definition" of an amateur.

In 1896 New Zealand returned to Australia with both a four and a sculler again, Victoria this time with R. Dawson (Bow), C. Donald 2, H. Lindgren 3, A. B. Sloan (Stroke) and V. Jones (Cox), defeated New Zealand and N.S.W. on the Parramatta River, time 12 min. 32 secs., for 2¼ miles. In the Intercolonial Sculling Championship, M. J. Slack of Queensland, scored the first sculling victory for Australia when he and J. L. Bannister, now representing N.S.W., defeated W. McCormick of New Zealand.

In 1910 at Hobart, New Zealand represented by the Wanganui Union Boat Club, competed for the last time in the Australasian Champion Fours, which they won, with J. Cotterill (Bow), E. Ryland, W. Dustin, D. Carby, H. Henley (Cox) and W. Sharpe (Coach).

While both the A.I.F. and New Zealand armies were waiting in England for repatriation home after World War I, two very strong rowing groups were prepared from each country to race both in England and in Europe during 1918-1919. While one of these crews, the A.I.F. No. 1 crew, gained ever lasting fame by its winning of the King's Cup at the Henley Peace Regatta, A. R. Robb, Tas. (Bow), F. House, Tas. 2, T. McGill N.S.W. 3, A. Scott, S.A. 4, H. Hauenstein, N.S.W. 5, S. Middleton, N.S.W. 6, G. Mettam, W.A. 7, H. Disher, Vic. (Stroke), and A. E. Smedley, N.S.W. (Cox), the other, the New Zealand Army crew is not as well known, yet its record is amazing. Its victories include the International Eights at Reading, Putney, Kingston, Walton, Hammer-smith and Marlow in England and its greatest win in the Allied (Pershing) Games in Paris, France, when it defeated the A.I.F. Eight in the final. Great names in these victories included C. A. Healey, W. Coombes, C. Moore, R. Fitzer, R. Forrester, T. Goudie, R. Patterson, B. Rutledge, F. McRoberts, G. Wilson, A. White, C. Lester, A. Trusell (Cox) and J. Brittain (Coach).

Perhaps the greatest sculler in the world in 1919, was the great New Zealander, Darcy Hatfield. He had won the New Zealand Champion Sculls in 1913-14-15 prior to enlisting. His wins in Europe that season included Marlow, and Henley, defeating A. S. Cox of Australia and at the Allied Games in Paris defeating the professional sculler, A. D. Felton, A.I.F. (As this was an Allied Army Games, Amateur and Professional Athletes were allowed to compete together).

On the 14th March, 1925 the first International Eights race, was held on the Parramatta River at Abbotsford. It was grey weather, with a brisk north-easterly breeze, making conditions unfavourable for competitors and spectators, but it needed six large ferry boats, and numerous smaller craft, to hold all the enthusiasts who desired to follow the race. The New Zealand crew, T. Johnson (Bow), F. H. Brown 2, G. St. Clair 3, W. Bayley 4, W. Sergison 5, E. Hegglum 6, B. Sandos 7, C. Healey

(Stroke), A. H. Eastwood (Cox), and Mr. H. Ayres (Coach), won from Mosman stroked by C. B. Callaghan and Drummoyne, W. Livingstone (Stroke). In the Champion Sculls, Jerry St. Clair of Hamilton, N.Z. won by the impressive margin of twenty-five lengths, with C. Lorrimer, Sydney, 2nd and J. Lewis, Leichhardt 3rd.

The New Zealand domination of Australian rowing continued for the next three years when three great New Zealand club crews, Otago Rowing Club (Brough, Werges, McAra and P. Anderson in 1926); Waitemata B.C., 1927, and a great Wanganui Union Crew (W. Kruse, A. Moss, M. Galbraith and Clarrie Healey 1928) won the Stewards Challenge Cup at the Australian Henley Regatta, Melbourne.

1930 saw a change in fortune, A. G. K. Jackson, Wanganui Boat Club came to Australia to race the Olympic and Empire Games Champion, Bobby Pearce. In the Champion Sculls of N.S.W., Jackson trailed by some twenty lengths, and Pearce repeated this victory at the Balmain Regatta the following week.

In 1934, New Zealand and England caused a white wash of Australian rowing, when the two overseas crews from London Rowing Club, and Wanganui Union, defeated all Australian crews to fight out the Grand Challenge Cup at the Melbourne, Henley. Clarrie Healey was again in the stroke seat, and although the New Zealand crew lost the final at the Victorian Centennial Regatta, they proved a great rowing combination a week later at the Sydney Regatta to defeat Mosman and Sydney Club by a length and a half, in 6 minutes, 26 and 4/5th seconds. Herb Turner representing the N.S.W. Police Rowing Club did score for Australia in the sculling events, winning from Bob Smith at Henley, and Pat Abbott of Petone Club, in Sydney, time 8 minutes, 12 and 2/5 seconds.

For the first time in Australian history a major Games was held in this country, with the rowing events of the 1938 Empire Games being contested on the Nepean River at Penrith. The Eights resulted England 1st, Australia 2nd and New Zealand 3rd. All other Gold Medals went to Australia. Jack Fisher stroked a powerful crew which used its length and power to great advantage, against the strong head wind, which sprung up during this event. N.Z. were second and Canada third. Cecil Pearce and Bill Bradley had a runaway victory of nine lengths to England, and New Zealand in the Double Sculls, and Herb Turner sculled right up to his top form. Both Jackson of England, and Bob Smith of New Zealand, showed great fight in trying to hold Turner, but his excellent condition and faultless sculling gave him a five-lengths margin at the finish in 8 min. 24 secs., into the strong headwind.

AUSTRALIA v. NEW ZEALAND

1940 to 1965

The last pre-World War II rowing clash between the two Nations came with the invitation for an Australian crew and Sculler in 1939 to tour New Zealand and compete in the Centennial Games in Wellington. The N.S.W. crew stroked by Lance Robinson, (who has played a major part as advisor and assistant to Australia's coach, Owen Ruffels in the preparation of this 1965 Eight) and coxed by Bill Kerr, won the New Zealand Champion Eights to become the first overseas crew to win a New Zealand Championship. Two of this crew, Brin Jay and Terry Gordon Classford were killed in action while serving as pilots with the R.A.A.F. over Europe. The All Blacks had their revenge in the Single Sculls, when Bob Smith defeated the 16-year-old Kevyn Webb, in the New Zealand Sculling Championship.

As with oarsmen, after the first World War, it took several years to start International events between the two countries. Unlike World War I however, service crews at the close of the war did not have the same opportunity to race. R.A.A.F. Eights raced at Henley and other Regattas in England, N.Z. Army crews raced in Austria and Italy, and during the war itself, an A.I.F. Eight stroked by Vic Mossong, won the Champion Eights of Palestine.

In 1948 however New Zealand accepted an invitation to send an Eight and Sculler to Australia. The Aramoho Boat Club represented by D. Morrison, W. James, J. Brown, W. Carroll, J. O'Brien, L. Clarke, T. Preator and Ted Johnston (stroke), who won the N.Z. Champion Eights, at both Picton and Port Chalmers, and the Aramoho Sculler, Joe Schneider, who was also the New Zealand Champion, arrived to race in a series of three Regattas. Haberfield, holders of the Australian Championship (one change from the crew that won the King's Cup in Hobart) won the first, Aramoho the 2nd, and in the N.S.W. Champion Eights, the New Zealand crew clinched the series, to win the title by 6 feet. The Sculls were divided, Joe Schneider winning at Haberfield (after a dramatic race in which K. Webb leading by $1\frac{1}{2}$ lengths tipped from his boat in a wash only 10 feet from the finish. Webb won from Wood and Schneider in the International Sculls at Sydney Regatta, from Schneider and Ron Rawlins at the Metropolitan Regatta, with the Olympic and World Sculling Champion, Merv Wood, coming back in the final race for the N.S.W. Championship, to win by 1 length from Schneider and Webb who finished together.

The 1950 Games at Lake Karapiro was all Australia, 4 Gold Medals and 1 Silver from 5 starts. The great Eight-oared race went to Australia by the narrow margin of three feet, this first ever Gold Medal Australia Eight was boated: Bob Tinning (bow), P. Cayzer, A. P. Holmes à Court, B. Goswell, R. L. Selman (present Secretary, N.S.W.R.A.), E. O. Longley, E. O. Pain, A. W. Brown (stroke), J. E. Barnes (cox), and Bill Thomas (coach). Merv Wood scored his great double, first in the Singles, over Tony Rowe of England and Tris Hegglin, N.Z., then with Murray Riley in the Double Sculls. Australia's fourth great victory went to Wal Lambert and Jack Webster (both of whom has represented Australia in the fours at the 1948 London Olympic Games) over the New Zealand crew of brothers D. C. and A. H. Gould of the Avon Rowing Club. The Aramoho Boat Club four, all of whom had been in Australia in 1948, saved the day for New Zealand with a win over Haberfield, in the Coxed Fours. Coxed by Col Johnstone and coached by D. Holmes it was W. Carroll, W. James, J. O'Brien and Ted Johnson (stroke).

1951 was one of Australia's greatest rowing years. An invitation had been received for a full rowing representation at the Canterbury Centennial Games, to be held at Kerrs Reach, Christchurch. The University of California coached by Ky Ebright, one of the World's Greatest Coaches, (he coached the Gold Medal Eights for U.S.A., in 1928, 1932 and 1948) had also been invited. The impressive string of victories on this tour, consisted of International Eights, (Australia boated: R. Tinning, D. Anderson, D. Palmer, N. Greenwood, M. D. Findlay, E. O. Pain and Phil Cayzer (stroke), and Tom Chessell in the dual role of Cox and Australia Coach), and the Champion Eights of New Zealand, at Akoroa. The International Pairs, Ernie Chapman and Vic Middleton, at Christchurch, and a repeat of the Eights great double, by Norm Cannon and Kevyn Webb, who won both the International Double Sculls, and the New Zealand Championship, also at Akoroa. Reg Douglas of Mercer Club, gave notice of the start of his own great rowing career, by winning the International Single Sculls.

Australia and N.Z. did not clash at Helsinki, Finland at the 1952 Olympic Games, when Australia gained a bronze medal in the Eights, and Wood a Silver Medal in the Sculls. But at the 1954 Commonwealth Games in Canada they did. A year earlier the West End Crew, K. Ashby, W. Tinnock, M. Ashby and L. Culpán had won the N.S.W. Champion Fours during a brief Australia tour, and Don Rowlands had amazed the rowing world, by his defeat of Peter Evatt and Mervyn Wood in the Champion Singles. At Vancouver the score was two all. Rowlands repeated his Australia victory over Peter Evatt, and the great pair crew, five times Champions of New Zealand, Bob Parker, and Reg Douglas of the Mercer R.C., defeated England & Australia, Williamson and Anderson, Merv Wood and Murray Riley, won the Double Sculls and Australia's Coxed Four (a combination of our small boat oarsmen) won a spirited final from New Zealand.

In the Melbourne Olympics, Australia came out best with five crews in the final four. N.Z. failed to make a final. Although we did have the example of Douglas and Parker, defeating the Australian pair, M. Grace and P. Raper in a heat, to miss the final, by being defeated in the semi-final. Grace and Raper going on to take fourth in the Olympic Pairs. Stuart McKenzie on the start of his six months world rowing tour in 1957 (from which he has yet to return to Australia) started his grand

slam of that year, which included the Diamonds at Henley England, and the European Championships in Germany, by winning the New Zealand Single Sculls Championship, from Don Rowlands on Lake Karapiro.

For the next clash Australia and New Zealand travelled more than 12,000 miles each, to remote Lake Padarn in North Wales in 1958. Taking the Australia v. New Zealand results only McKenzie defeated Hill in the Singles, Wood and McKenzie defeated Jim Hill and the late Norm Suckling in the Doubles. Parker and Douglas retained their Empire Pairs title defeating K. Webb and S. Roll, and Australia defeated New Zealand (3rd and 4th) in the Coxed Fours event. In Australian—New Zealand rowing relations, the largest club party ever, of 38 Haberfield oarsmen, toured both the North and South Islands of New Zealand in early 1958, racing at Auckland, Hamilton, Wanganui, Wellington and Christchurch. Only major events won, were by Ian Tutty and Kevyn Webb, who won several Double Scull events.

With the withdrawal of Stuart McKenzie from Australia's Olympic Team in Rome, the last chance of Australia meeting N.Z. in 1960 passed. Jim Hill did go on to race in the Olympic Single Sculls final, and just fail to gain a Bronze Medal for New Zealand. This Olympics showed vast advances in both speed and training methods, and thinking officials in both our countries, agreed that more International racing was needed if we were to catch up. So in 1961 Australia accepted an invitation to race a three Test Match Series in New Zealand. This tour with Geoff McIntyre (Manager), Dr. Eric Longley (coach), and Roger Ninham (sculler), and Mosman Club Eight, representing Australia proved the strength of New Zealand Rowing. The All Blacks won all three Eights Tests, with Jim Hill gaining three wins also over Ninham.

In 1962 on the Canning River, Perth, a great Victorian Eight, I. Douglas (bow), C. Lehman 2, D. Stankovich 3, T. R. Davies 4, M. Guest 5, G. McCall 6, M. G. Tomanovits 7, Neville Howell (stroke), D. Palfreyman (cox), and coached by A. Jacobsen, came back to defeat N.Z. by 2ft. A repeat of the great race of 1950 to win the Commonwealth Games Gold Medals. In all other events New Zealand finished in front of the Australian entries. Hill defeated Ian Tutty, M. & G. Lawrence, the Otago Pair, defeated W. Hatfield and R. Ninham, and M. & P. Watkinson defeated G. Squires and B. Wade. The Coxed Fours final was a repeat of the Eights race, with the narrow margin in favour of New Zealand, the Oamaru crew G. Paterson, W. Smedley, K. Heselwood, W. Stephens and D. Pulman Cox being three feet in front of Australia's Corio Bay, Victorian crew at the finish.

And so to Tokyo and the 1964 Olympic Games. Murray Watkinson, the N.Z. Sculler for this tour, gained fifth in the Olympic Singles Final to finish ahead of Australia's Peter Edwards. In the row off for the minor places, 6th to 12th, the Australian Eight defeated N.Z. and even up N.Z. Coxed Four, defeated Australia.

Three Tests are planned in this 1965 International Series—Leichhardt, N.S.W., Penrith, N.S.W., and Lake Wendourie, Victoria. Further great races can be anticipated, and more will be added to the History of Australia v. New Zealand at Rowing. We wish, Good Rowing to all crews.

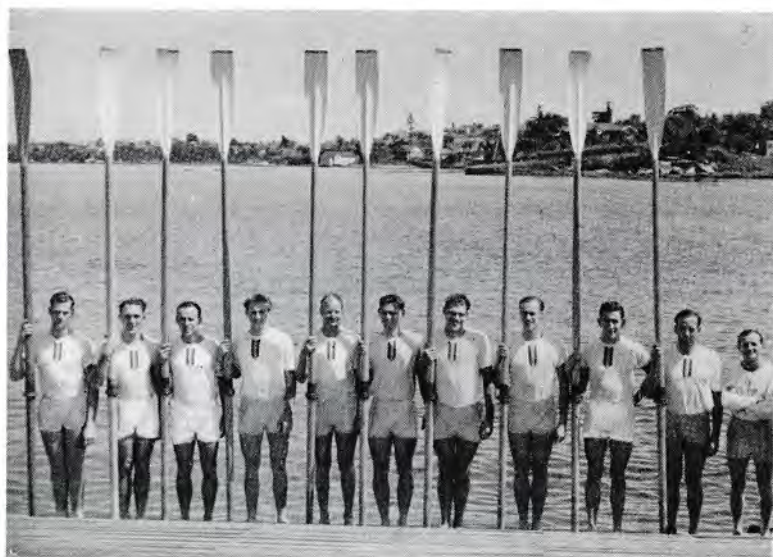
